Mr. Campbell, at the moment the child fell into the well, arrived home from his work, and he immediately secured a rope, and with the aid of a light in the hands of his wife was enabled to locate the little girl in the pitch-dark well, secure her and bring her to the surface with only a scare and thoroughly saturated clothes. where the child's mother, who had arrived on the scene, received her as one risen from the dead.

The escape of the little one was a miracle, for had she broken through the thin covering of floating boards lost her life, as it would have been impossible to come through the debris by the helpless child.
