THE WORLD OF POLITICS

The Big Furnish Rally in This City Next Friday Night

GOVERNOR T. T. GEER WILL PRESIDE AT THE REQUEST OF THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE OF THE YOUNG MEN'S CLUB AT ITS MEETING LAST NIGHT.

Preparations for the reception of Hon. W. J. Furnish, Hon. C. W. Fulton and the party of candidates expected here on next Friday evening are under way, and the occasion promises to be the biggest outpouring of enthusiasm yet heard in Salem. The reception committee of the two local clubs have appointed a member each to act with a representative of the Republican County Central Committee in receiving the visitors and escort them to the hotel.

C. A. Murphy has been appointed to act as chief marshal of the parade and procession during the evening, prior to the meeting, and he has power to appoint his aids.

The meeting will probably be held in the armory hall, and Governor T. T. Geer has been invited by the chairman, W. J. Culver, of the county central committee, to preside, and he has accepted. He will call the meeting to order, and introduce the speakers of the evening.

The young men's club of the Young Men's Republican club last evening, in the police court room of the city hall, there was a large attendance and a considerable amount of business of importance was transacted. It was reported that all of the standing committees were putting forth their best efforts and realizing good results, and that while nothing definite had been reported, everything is progressing satisfactorily, the club's membership is steadily increasing and all plans for the club to participate actively in the campaign are being formulated.

Quite a pretty home wedding was celebrated in Silverton last Wednesday evening, when Miss Temperance E. McCorkle, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. McCorkle, became the wife of Mr. George H. Riches, of that city. The ceremony was performed by Justice of the Peace R. C. Ramsby at the home of the bride's parents in the presence of only the immediate relatives and a few intimate friends of the popular young couple.

FROM A FOREIGN VIEW. According to Austrit-Hungarian official data, great progress was made in the pacification of the Philippines during the year 1921. Civil administration has for months been introduced in thirty to forty provinces while those parts of the country where the revolutionary movement has not yet been completely suppressed are left under military government. The latter comprises the lagoon regions, Batangas in Luzon, and the islands of Samar and Mindoro, to which the military operations of late have been almost exclusively confined.

SOLDIERS INJURED. WALLA WALLA, May 12.—Mike McClellan, a member of the Tenth Battery of Fort Walla Walla, died from injuries yesterday in a most distressing manner. While hitching his horse to a gun Saturday morning in the regular drill the horse reared and fell upon McClellan, crushing him terribly, breaking an arm, a leg and a rib, crushing his skull and bruising his body. In an unconscious condition McClellan was removed to the hospital, and although he lived nearly twenty never regained consciousness.

THE SUPREME COURT HOME

The Pendleton Term Closed After One Week's Sitting

The justices of the supreme court returned from Pendleton yesterday, where they held the May term of the court for Eastern Oregon, during last week. There were thirty-four cases on the docket, but only sixteen of them were heard, and three dismissed, the remainder being transferred to Salem for hearing. This was done on stipulation for the reason that the attorneys in the several cases were all engaged in the campaign, and wished to get away from court, and it was decided to hear the cases so transferred in this city on or about July 1st, after the campaign is done.
