FROM A FOREIGN VIEW.

According to Austrit-Hungarian offiial data, great progress was made in he pacification of the Philippines during the year 1901. Civil administration has for months been introduced in thirty to forty provinces, while those parts of the country where the revolutionary movement has not yet been completely supressed are left under military government. The latter comprises the lagoon regions, Batangas in Luzon, and the islands of Samar and Mindoro, to which the military operations, of late ben almost exclusively confiCned. The nature of the country in the south of Luzon may enable the insurgents to force their way into the neighboring provinces, but even that would not involve a revival of the revolutionary spirit. The natives are gradually assuming a less dubious attitude as the hopelessness of further resistence is becoming mor clear.

There is consequently no reason to fear a recrudescence of the revolution on a scale calculated to interfere with trade and commerce. The prospectors who have been exploring the country in all dirCctions are agreed as to the existence of metals and minerals. The question is whether it will pay to work them, and that can only be ascertained by practical experiment. There is a superfluity of valuable timber of various kinds, the demandfor which increased last year in consequence of grater activity in the building trade, particularly in Manila.-London Times.
