### SALEM NURSERY PEOPLE

INCORPORATE AND WILL DO BUSINESS IN TWO COAST STATES.

(From Wednesday's Statesman.)  
In the State Department yesterday, articles of incorporation have been filed, as follows:  
The Chicago Nursery Company will operate water powers, canals and irrigation works in Oregon, California and elsewhere; do a general development business on the Pacific Coast, and plant orchards and deal in fruit trees of all kinds. Salem is the headquarters, while branch offices and nurseries will be maintained at Chico, California. The company has a capital of \$50,000. A. McDonald, A. McGill and Leon Girod are the incorporators.  
The Ducky Boy Gold Mining Company will operate in mines and mining property and do a general development work, with headquarters in Sumpter. The capital is \$1,000,000. Al P. Jones, E. E. McCammon and Sam R. Stott are the incorporators.  
The Oregon Free Gold Mining Company will engage in gold mining and irrigation, own townsites and erect and operate electric plants, smelters and mills, with headquarters at Baker City. The capital stock is fixed at \$150,000. W. J. Hughes, John Waterman and H. I. Innis are the incorporators.  
The Bethany Free Methodist church will maintain a church organization at Bethany. The property on hand is valued at \$500. Herman Schulze, Samuel Schulze and C. Brisco are the incorporators and trustees.

### FEDERAL LABOR UNION

HELD AN INTERESTING MEETING LAST EVENING—MANY NEW APPLICANTS.

Salem Federal Labor Union at its regular meeting last night passed an enthusiastic resolution endorsing the strike of Portland planing mill men for shorter hours and promising them financial assistance if necessary to the extent of this union's ability.  
The meeting was as usual, very enthusiastic, and many new candidates for membership were favorably voted upon.  
Delegates were elected to a central body soon to be organized. Through this body all matters of interest to the various labor organizations are brought from their original source to the notice of all unions for discussion and action.

E. C. Miller, of Boston, for many years a union worker, and one of the first organizers of the A. F. of L. being in the city, was present and made a very encouraging talk.  
A lively discussion took place on the ways and means of inducing all business men to secure and handle union made goods. The plan deemed most advisable was for each to see to it that every article he purchased bear the union label, wherever possible.
