

COUNTING OF THE BALLOTS

Will Be Commenced at The Court House This Morning

THE ELECTION BOARD FAILED TO OBSERVE THE LAW IN SENDING IN THE RETURNS, AND SERIOUSLY HAMPERED THE COUNTY BOARD.

All of the ballot boxes containing the ballots and the tally sheets, are now in the hands of the county clerk the last one, that of Elkhorst precinct, arriving yesterday afternoon.

A law passed at the last session of the Legislature provides that the tally sheets shall be sent in a sealed envelope to the county clerk.

Sec. 25.—Immediately after canvassing the votes in the manner aforesaid, the judges and clerks to complete the count before they separate on adjourn shall inclose the poll books in separate covers and securely seal the same.

When the count is completed, the ballots, counted and sealed, and enveloped and marked for identification as aforesaid, shall be packed in two ballot boxes, and nothing else shall be put into the boxes.

Sec. 28.—One complete set of the tally sheets and the poll book which was kept by the second clerk, ballots and stubs, ballot boxes and remaining supplies, shall be forthwith conveyed by one of the judges or clerks of the election, to be agreed upon for that purpose by the judges, to the county clerk of the county.

Sec. 29.—One complete set of the tally sheets in the ballot boxes, sealing the latter as provided by law, County Clerk W. W. Hall, seeing the difficulty confronting him, consulted District Attorney J. H. Hart, as to what course to pursue, and that gentleman instructed him to open the ballot boxes when the board meets, take therefrom the tally sheets, then relock and reseal the boxes, as this would be the only course possible in this emergency.

STILL ANOTHER MERGER

THE BRITISH JUBILATE

New York, June 3.—There is no mistaking that Colonial Secretary Joseph Chamberlain is now the dominant personality in the Unionist party, says a London dispatch to the World.

The reason given for the Boers' surrender of independence is that they are practically bankrupt, and if they could prolong the war for two or three years more they still would be unable to reconstitute their states from the condition of ruin into which the devastation policy has landed them.

It is felt, too, that all the rebels will be amnestied and that every franchise disqualification cannot be maintained for more than two years.
