

## THE TURNER CAMPMEETING

Will Meet in the Tabernacle During This Month

AN EMINENT MINISTER FROM CHICAGO WILL DELIVER DAILY SERMONS AT THE ANNUAL GATHERING OF THE HOSTS OF THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH.

The "Oregon Christian Missionary Convention will meet in Turner on Friday, June 20th, and remain in session until Monday morning, June 24th. The meetings of this organization, popularly called the Turner campmeeting, are held in the Turner Memorial Tabernacle, and usually attract considerable interest. The meetings are really the annual convention of the Christian church of Oregon, and some of the most interesting and able sermons of the year are delivered from the platform of the Tabernacle, which was constructed for the use of this organization, and together with a beautiful grove, 15 acres in extent, presented to the Christian church, by the late Geo. E. Turner, and his brother and sister, as a memorial to his parents, who, in life, held their church membership with that denomination.

During the past the meetings have had added interest injected into them by the appearance, for the principal discourses, of able ministers from outside the state, and for this year the chief speaker will be Rev. Charles R. Scoville, A. M. L. D., pastor of the Metropolitan church of Christ, of Chicago. He is one of the ablest speakers in the denomination, and much good is expected to result from his coming here.

Prof. George A. Wirtz will conduct the music to the sessions of the convention, and this feature, it is hoped, will be as usual, aid greatly to the pleasure of the visitors.
