SUPREME LODGE MEETS

UNITED WORKMEN IN SESSION IN PORTLAND - AN EXCELLENT BUSINESS RECORD.

PORTLAND, Or., June 10.—The Supreme Lodge A. O. U. W., for the United States and Canada convened here today.

The annual report of the Supreme Recorder shows the total number of lodges on January 1, 1921, was 5462, the total increase for the year of 152. The total membership is 127,428. Members admitted during the year, 53,228; members suspended, 1,428; members withdrawn, 51,728; died, 5071; net increase for year, 3,806. Amount paid on death losses, \$9,473,374; balance on hand, \$235,397.

THE CIRCUIT COURT'S WORK

George Barker Pleads Guilty Aiding Prisoner to Escape

IS SENTENCED TO FIVE YEARS IMPRISONMENT—THE FINNEY-EAGAN LAND CASE DECIDED BY A JURY FOR THE PLAINTIFF.

(From Wednesday's Statesman.)

The first department of the State Circuit Court continued in regular session yesterday morning, and one case was tried on its merits and in full, one criminal case disposed of and sentence imposed, and motions heard in other cases.

George Barker, upon whom an information was filed charging him with having conveyed a saw to the prisoners in the county jail for the purpose of assisting them to escape, was arraigned, plead guilty to the charge, waived time and was sentenced to serve five years in the State Penitentiary.

John Daly, also charged with assisting another to escape from the county jail, was arraigned and L. K. Adams was appointed as counsel for the defendant.

The case of James Finney, plaintiff, vs. W. H. Egan, defendant, wherein the plaintiff asked for \$250 (\$100 general damages and \$150 special damages) by reason of the defendant's alleged encroachment upon his premises and for the loss of a crop of grain, was tried before a jury composed of F. P. Whitlock, N. Lambert, W. B. Brown, W. F. Buckner, C. J. Atwood, Jesse Maey, O. S. Pomeroy, John Butsch, Jay Bishop, G. W. Vedder, G. Sommers and W. H. Pettitt. This was a case which was introduced in this court several months ago, but was tried in the equity department of the Circuit Court upon motion of the defendant and a verdict was rendered in favor of the plaintiff in this case. The jury went out about 2 o'clock and returned in about two hours, bringing in a verdict for the sum of \$20. Carson & Adams and P. H. D'Arcy represented the plaintiff in the case and W. H. and Webster Holmes the defendant.

Emery Sharp, who was bound over from Justice Peace Johnson's court, of Jefferson, upon a charge of rape alleged to have been committed upon Miss Birdie Fuller, was discharged from custody yesterday. District Attorney J. N. Hart being unable to secure evidence sufficient to cause a suit.

Motions in other cases on the docket were heard as follows:

Mary J. Shaw, plaintiff, vs. J. E. Ferris, defendant; ejectment; defendant's demurrer to the supplemental answer of plaintiff, argued and sustained.

Studebaker Bros., plaintiff, vs. Joseph Schell, defendant; for money; defendant's motion for judgment on pleadings overruled and plaintiff's motion for leave to reply sustained. Plaintiff was given leave to file reply during the day.

The motion of the defendant to strike out parts of the amended complaint in the case of Louise E. Combest, plaintiff, vs. Statesman Pub. Co., defendant, was argued and sustained. This is the case in which the plaintiff seeks to recover the sum of \$5000, in which amount she alleges her character has been damaged by reason of the publication of a certain specified article in the daily and weekly Statesman and the motion, as sustained strikes out all of the material portions of the complaint including the second cause of action for which the plaintiff demands the sum of \$2000.

The defendant in the case of Edwin A. Jory, plaintiff, vs. Josie Jory, defendant, yesterday filed a demurrer to the plaintiff's demand for a decree of divorce, upon the ground that said complaint does not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of suit against the defendant. W. T. Slater and W. M. Kaiser are the defendant's attorneys.

IN CIRCUIT COURT

A POLK COUNTY CASE HEARD BY JUDGE BURNETT ON A CHARGE OF VENUE.

(From Thursday's Statesman.)

The case of Van B. Sears, plaintiff, vs. J. J. Daly and Phya Daly, defendants; a suit to recover the sum of \$200 and interest, alleged to be due the plaintiff on a certain promissory note, was tried before a jury composed of G. Sommers, S. A. McFadden, J. W. Pate, C. S. Hamilton, John Whitney, F. P. Whitlock, W. F. Buckner, T. Y. McClellan, C. J. Atwood, M. Lambert, George Morley and Moses McKay, in the first department of the Circuit Court yesterday and took up the entire forenoon.

This is a Polk county case and originated in the justice of the peace court where a verdict was rendered in favor of the plaintiff but the defendant, Phya Daly, appealed to the Circuit Court contending the case on the ground that her name was forged to the note. It was tried before two juries in the Polk county Circuit Court but in each stance the jury failed to agree and the case was transferred to the Marion county court upon a motion for a change of venue. The jury retired at noon and came in at 6 o'clock last evening with a sealed verdict. Butler & Coad, of Dallas, are the attorneys for the plaintiff and W. T. Slater, W. M.

A motion for a new trial in the case of J. W. Henry, plaintiff, vs. Yamhill county, defendant, was argued yesterday afternoon by the attorneys in the case, J. J. Spencer, of McMinnville, and G. G. Bingham for the plaintiff and McCain & Vinton and J. N. Bart, of Dallas, for the defendant.

This suit was originally brought in the Yamhill county court for the sum of \$1186, salary due one D. C. Saling, who acted as deputy for the plaintiff while the latter was in office as sheriff of that county from 1896 to 1898. The case was tried before a jury in Polk county which resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff and today the motion of the defendant for a new trial on the grounds that the jury had disregarded the instructions of the court and that the court had erred in the admission of incompetent testimony, was argued and submitted.

The nine cases in this court wherein the State of Oregon is plaintiff, and the Hartford Fire Insurance Co., the Royal Insurance Co., the Pennsylvania Fire Insurance Co., the Law Union & Crown Fire Insurance Co., the Springfield Fire & Marine Insurance Co., the Fire Association of Philadelphia, the Aetna Insurance Co., the Sun Insurance Co., and the Liverpool & London Globe Insurance Co., are the defendants, and wherein the plaintiff demanded judgment against each of the defendants for the sum of \$1964 to cover the loss caused by fire to the State Reform School on December 18, 1920, was compromised between the parties contending, the State to be paid \$9000, and the cases were dismissed.

John Daley, defendant; charged with having assisted another to escape from the county jail, was brought into court, entered a plea of not guilty and was admitted to bail in the sum of \$500 and trial set for 9 o'clock this morning.

In the case of the State of Oregon, plaintiff, vs. John Daly, et al., defendants, criminal larceny; dismissed by the district attorney.
