

JUDGMENT FOR A SMALL SUM

Breach of Promise Suit Decided in Circuit Court

MISS BURSSELL SECURED TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS DAMAGES FROM AUGUST LINDHOLM, FOR HIS REFUSAL TO MARRY HER—DAILY GETS SIX YEARS.

(From Saturday's Statesman.)

The first department of the State Circuit Court continued in the regular June term yesterday. No new cases were taken up but the verdicts in the two cases which were tried on Thursday were brought in and read, and motions in other actions were heard.

The sealed verdict which was brought in by the jury at 11:30 o'clock Thursday night in the breach of promise suit of Edith R. Bursell, plaintiff, vs. August Lindholm, defendant, wherein the plaintiff asked for judgment against the defendant in the sum of \$15,000 to which extent she alleged her affections had been trifled with by reason of the defendant's failure to marry her and marrying another girl instead, was opened in court and found that the verdict was for the plaintiff in the sum of \$25. W. H. and Webster Holmes were the attorneys for the plaintiff, and Carson & Adams for the defendant.

In the case of the State vs. John Daly, wherein the defendant was charged with having assisted another to escape from legal custody, which was tried on Thursday evening, and submitted to the jury at 4:30 o'clock, the jury remained out until 11:15 o'clock yesterday morning bringing in a verdict of guilty. The jury came in twice yesterday for instructions, and the last time the instructions of the court were given so plain that when the jury retired it was but a few minutes until a verdict was agreed upon and submitted. The defendant waived time for sentence and was sentenced to serve a term of six years in the State Penitentiary. District Attorney J. N. Hart was the prosecuting attorney and L. K. Adams was the counsel for the defendant.

In the case of Van B. Sears, plaintiff, vs. John J. Daly, et al., defendants, a suit to recover the sum of \$200 with interest on a promissory note, which was tried in this department on Tuesday and a verdict rendered for the plaintiff and against the defendants Phya Daly, for the sum of \$224.38, the defendant, Phya Daly, yesterday by her attorneys, Kaiser & Slater, filed a motion for a new trial. This was a Polk county case and originated in the justice of the peace court where a verdict was rendered in favor of the plaintiff, but the defendant, Phya Daly, appealed to the Circuit Court contesting the case on the ground that her name was forged to the note. It was tried before two juries in the Polk county Circuit Court but in each instance the jury failed to agree and the case was transferred to the Marion county court upon a motion for a change of venue. The defendant filed her motion for a new trial yesterday upon the following grounds: Because of the failure of proof at the trial in that no evidence was offered by the plaintiff tending to show that the plaintiff, as executor of the estate of Isaac Ball, was or is now the owner of the note sued upon or that as such executor he ever had any interest therein, or that any consideration ever passed from the plaintiff to any one on account of the note; that no evidence was offered by the plaintiff tending to prove that he ever was or is now the executor of said estate. Because of insufficiency of evidence to justify the verdict rendered herein, and because the court erred in admitting in evidence over the defendant's objection the note sued upon, without any evidence of the assignment by the payee named therein to the plaintiff, in allowing one of the plaintiff's attorneys to state to the jury in effect that the defendant admitted that she had full knowledge of the transaction, and consideration for which the note had been given at the time that the note was delivered to the payee named therein and to the effect that the defendant did know of the indebtedness having been made; in instructing the jury to the effect that all private transactions are presumed to be fair and regular and that it would be presumed that this note was regularly executed and also presumed that a person is innocent of any crime or wrong and that the person who signed that note, if not Mrs. Daly, was innocent of the crime of forgery, which she alleges was the cause of her signature or name being at the foot of the note, and in refusing to instruct the jury, as requested by the defendant, that the plaintiff having submitted no evidence as to his representative capacity could not recover against this defendant. Butler & Co. of Dallas, are the attorneys for the plaintiff.

In the case of James Finney, plaintiff, vs. Wm. H. Egan, defendant, a suit to recover real property and in which the plaintiff demanded damages to the amount of \$254 by reason of the defendant's encroachment upon his property and damage to his grain crop, tried on Tuesday, June 10, and a verdict rendered for the plaintiff and against the defendant for the sum of \$20 on the same day, yesterday the plaintiff's motion for judgment on the verdict, for possession of the real property, for damages and for costs and disbursements was allowed and judgment entered for plaintiff accordingly. The defendant's motion for judgment in his favor for costs was overruled.

Motions were argued and minor orders made in other cases on the docket as follows: T. M. Hurd, plaintiff, vs. Ilma R. Hurd, et al., defendants, an action for money; plaintiff's motion to strike out part of the amended answer overruled; plaintiff's motion to require defendant's amended account to be made more certain overruled. Demurrer to new matter in the second further and separate amended answer overruled. Mary J. Shaw, plaintiff, vs. J. E.

Ferris, defendant; an ejectment suit; motion of plaintiff to strike out part of amended supplemental answer argued.

The man named Butler whom Sheriff Durbin arrested on Tuesday morning last upon suspicion of being implicated in the escape of Tracy and Merrill from the Penitentiary and upon whose person some toilet articles were found which, it was thought, he had purloined from one of the local lodging houses, was yesterday dismissed by the district attorney.

Dick Horner, who was bound over to the Circuit Court in \$250 bonds, from Justice of the Peace W. H. Queener's court, of Stayton, upon the charge of giving intoxicating liquors to a minor, was also examined by the district attorney and discharged.

THE SCHOOL ELECTION

Dr. W. H. Byrd Permits His Name to Be Used

HIS FRIENDS RUN HIM FOR DIRECTOR NEXT MONDAY—ANNUAL MEETING WILL BE HELD ON THAT EVENING UNDER NEW LAW.

(From Saturday's Statesman.)

Dr. W. H. Byrd has been urged by many citizens of school district No. 24, to stand for the election of school director for this district, to succeed H. A. Johnson. Dr. Byrd has on several occasions served the school district as director and so well did he perform his duties, that he has often been impetuned to again stand for re-election, but he has persistently refused. He, however, has now consented to run for the place, and his supporters, who know what an excellent official he makes and how well he will look after the interests of the schools, will do all in their power to give him the election. Since Dr. Byrd's acceptance of the nomination, preparations have been made by his supporters to bring out all his friends to the election next Monday and insure his election.

Heretofore the annual school meeting was held on the first Monday in March and the election of a director in a district of the first class, was held the following Monday. The new school law changed this, so that now the annual school meeting and the annual election are held on the same day—the third Monday in June, which is next Monday. The law specifies that the election must be by ballot at the polls, and must take place from 2 o'clock to 6 o'clock p. m. The meeting may be held at any time during the day. The second meeting will be held at the city hall on Monday night at 8 o'clock.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOLS

REPORT OF THE COUNTY PRESIDENT FOR THE YEAR CLOSING ON FIRST OF MAY.

Robert Reid, president of the Marion County Sunday School Association, has issued his report for the year ending May 1, 1902, showing the amount contributed by each Sunday School in the county during the year, together with the attendance in each. In concluding the statement President Reid says in part:

"The total receipts for the last year were \$127.75. Of this amount there was appropriated to the payment of our county pledge to the state association \$100, for printing \$13, typewriting \$2.50, postage stamps and cards \$12.25. Total disbursements \$127.75. The Sunday schools of the county as far as reported have contributed for their own expenses, and for missionary work \$1485.12.

Only about two-thirds of the Sunday schools contributed to the association work, and on account of the negligence of the other third some of those contributing liberally, paid in double their assessment, and individual contributions had to be called for in order to raise the required amount."

"Now if all do their part and contribute the small amount asked—only five cents per member of your enrollment—the amount needed will be easily raised without inconvenience to anyone."

"Attend your conventions, district and county, for in these conventions, our Sunday school workers get an inspiration for greater and better work. If you are perfect in your methods of Sunday school instruction, you are all the more needed in these conventions, in order that you may impart to other Sunday school workers a knowledge of your methods. Thirteen conventions have been held in the county during the last year, in attending which your county president traveled over 200 miles, all at his own expense, as he gets no remuneration for his services."

"Marion, the banner county in association work for the last year. Such was the verdict of the state executive committee. The attainment should not puff us up, but enable us to thankfully acknowledge the goodness of our Heavenly Father in making us the means of doing some good in His name, and encouraging us to go forward in His work. Every Sunday school in the county should co-operate heartily in the association work. It is to their interest to do so. No other agency is doing so much work today, aside from the church—to promote the Sunday school interest."

"Do not delay to send your contribution in early, so that the work of the Association be not hindered. Our state field worker must be provided for, and other necessary expense in the work. "Flat" Salaries.

Editor Statesman: I notice, that an effort is being made to induce the Governor to call a special session of the Legislature for the purpose of putting all state officials on "flat" salaries, whatever that means. Let me ask just here: If all salaries are not "flat." What is the difference between a "flat" salary and a sound salary, or a salary which is neither flat nor sound? Who invented the word, anyhow? It is becoming very nauseous.

Well, I do not know whether I am in favor of the call of the Legislature or not. I heartily approve of placing all the state officials on salaries, and turning into the state all the fees and perquisites they have been taking. In other words, I am in favor of abiding by the Constitution. In connection with this subject several things require to be seriously considered: First, can any assurance be given that the Legislature will enact a "flat" salary law if they are called together?

Second, is it certain even if they should pass a law fixing the salaries of the officials (when the fees are lopped off) that it would be constitutional? Nobody, for instance, would ask the treasurer to do the work of his office for \$800 a year, and could the Legislature give him any more when the Constitution says "he shall receive an annual salary of \$800." But must receive "no fees or perquisites whatever for the performance of any duties connected with his office."

Third, is it not possible, before putting the state to the expense of a
