BRYAN TALKS OF CLEVELAND

And the Democratic Harmony
Meeting in New York

HIS OPPOSITION APPARENT

To Compromising With the
Gold Wing of the
Party

NEBRASKA POPULIST AND DEMO-
CRATIC STATE CONVENTIONS
IN SESSION AT GRAND ISLAND
TODAY—THE QUESTION OF FU-
SION IS UPPERMOST.

LINCOLN, Neb., June 23.—The ab-
sence of W. J. Bryan from the Demo-
cratic harmony dinner at New York
is pretty well explained by a state-
ment given out by Mr. Bryan tonight,
commenting on the dinner. At the out-
set, Bryan says, there is no such thing
as Democratic harmony where former
President Cleveland is concerned. He
says:

"The banquet given on June 19th by
the Tilden Club, of New York, was ad-
vertised as a 'harmony meeting,' but
it turned out to be what might have
been expected of such a gathering—an
ovation to the chief guest, a former
Democrat, Grover Cleveland. There can
be no such thing as harmony be-
tween men like him and those who be-
lieve in Democratic principles, and he
is frank enough to say so.

"He is not only defiant, but he in-
sists that party success can only be
secured by an open avowed return to
his ideas. Harmony is to be secured,
not by suppression of differences, but
by the elimination of those who differ
from him."

Bryan says he will print in his pa-
per Cleveland's speech, "to show that
re-organizers don't want harmony,
but control, and that their control
means abandonment of their party's
position and a return to the policies
and practices of Cleveland's second ad-
ministration."

Nebraska Fusionists.

Grand Island, Neb., June 23.—Dele-
gates to the Populist and Democratic
State Conventions, which will be held
here tomorrow, begun pouring in to
this city today. Over 200 delegates are
accredited to each convention, and at
least 2000 are expected to attend. The
question uppermost in the minds of
the great majority of delegates is
whether or not fusion can be accom-
plished, and candidates selected that
will be satisfactory to all the factions.
The accomplishment of this result has
been seriously questioned by a number
of party leaders, but tonight a num-
ber of Populists and Democrats, who
are considered authority, profess to be-
lieve that there will be little oppo-
sition to fusion. It is still the unani-
mous opinion that if Mr. Bryan will ac-
cept the nomination for Governor,
there will be little left to do, but to di-
vide the rest of the ticket.

THE ESCAPED CONVICTS

HAVE ABANDONED CAPTURED
GUNS AND SUPPLY THEM-
SELVES BY ROBBERY.

LA CENTER, Wash., June 23.—Tracy
and Merrill are still at large, but a de-
termined posse is after them. The two
guys, a Winchester shotgun and a re-
peating rifle, stolen from Dr. White, at
Gervais, Oregon, over ten days ago,
were found in the brush near here as
were some clothes worn by the con-
victs during the past month.

The two escapes appeared Saturday
night at the farm house of the McGee
brothers, near Pioneer, and took all
the provisions in sight, also clothing.
The McGees were absent from the place
and the convicts ransacked it. The lat-
est trace of the outlaws was had Sun-
day morning, when they broke into the
farm house of Mr. McGuire, near La
Center, stealing \$20, new hats, shoes
and bacon. The McGuire family were
also absent. Their tracks show that
the men are headed for the head waters
of the Lewis river. Sheriff Marsh has
abandoned the trail until the men are
seen again. Others of the posse are still
guarding the Lewis river. Rain is fall-
ing, which makes it possible for the
dogs to do better trailing.

A DANGEROUS UNDERTAKING

Effort to Draw Water from a
Lake's Bottom

BY MEANS OF A TUNNEL

Came Near Causing a Most
Horrible Dis-
aster

THE SHELL BETWEEN TUNNEL
AND LAKE BROKE THROUGH,
CAUSING A STREAM OF WATER
SIX FEET SQUARE TO RUSH OUT
AND FLOOD THE COUNTRY.

BAKER CITY, Or., June 23.—A party
of fishermen, returning from Rock
Creek report what might have been a
frightful disaster at Lake Kalamacue,
Friday night. An irrigation company
has been engaged in boring a tunnel
under the bottom of the lake, a distance
of about 250 feet, so that the water
could be used during the months of
July and August. The tunnel was so
planned that it would strike a point
sixty feet below the bottom of the lake.
An uprising was started from the end
of the tunnel to strike the lake bottom,
supposed to be sixty feet above. Fri-
day evening a shot was put in the solid
the water of the lake broke through in-

rock in the uprising. With a mighty roar
to the tunnel, and a moment after the
men gained a place of safety a stream
of water six feet square was spouting
several hundred feet down the canyon.
Fortunately there were lots of trees in
the lake, which were uprooted by the
rushing water, and carried into the
tunnel thus stopping to some extent
the outflow of water. Had it not been
for this hindrance much property be-
low would have been washed away. The
lake is now empty.
