

## BUREAU OF CHEMISTRY

SERVICE EXAMINATION TO BE HELD.

(From Saturday's Daily.). The United States Civil Service Commission announces that on July 8, 1902, an examination will be held for the position of engineer, Bureau of Chemistry, Department of Agriculture.

The examination will consist of the subjects mentioned below, which will be weighted as follows: Subjects-Weights.

#### Thesis .....

Practical questions of strength of building materials, etc .. .. ... .. 25 Technical education, training, and experience .. .. .. .. .. .. .. .. ..... 50

Each competitor should submit a thesis, not to exceed 3000 words, on some problem embracing laboratory tests which he has personally conducted on the strength of materials of construction, showing the commercial and scientific value obtained. An affidavit should accompany the thesis, to the effect that it is the unaided work of the competitor.

The position will require an engincer competent to conduct tests on the strength of building materials. Age limit, 20 years or over.

From the eligibles resulting from this xamination it is expected that certification will be made to the position of engineer, Bureau of Chemistry, Department of Agriculture, at a salary of \$2000 per annunm, and to other similar vacancies as they may occur.

This examination is open to all citizens of the United States who comply First District.

ties when the college opens this fall. Professor Warfield is a graduate of the Nebraska Wesleyan University and also of the Nebraska State University; he then took his A. M. He is 30 years of age and is an experienced teacher in Latin and Greek of which department he will assume the head at the Willamette University. He was very highly recommended, especially by Prof. F. S. Dunn, of
