THE GOVERNOR MAKES REPLY

If He Issues a Call For an Extra Legislative Session

ONE OF THE OBJECTS WILL BE TO PROVIDE AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE LEWIS AND CLARK EXPOSITION — THE FLAT SALARY SYSTEM.

(From Saturday's Daily.)

Governor T. T. Geer has answered the request of the special committee of the Lewis & Clark Exposition Committee...

In making the call for the extra session of the Legislature, incorporate therein a statement of the necessity of an appropriation for the exposition.

The Governor's letter is addressed to Mr. A. H. Devers, chairman of the committee, and reads as follows:

"I hereby acknowledge receipt of letters sent by yourself and the other gentlemen forming the committee of the Lewis and Clark Centennial Association, asking that I issue a call for a special session of the Legislature...

"I desire to say that whether a session shall be called is not being definitely considered as yet, but that I am waiting somewhat upon public expression concerning it."

"I think your suggestion forms one of the best reasons perhaps for calling a special session. Regarding the flat salary system, my idea is that it should be adopted at a special session if, at all, or more definitely speaking, it is doubtful if some of the reforms included in the bill could be passed if these officers were in office."

"I assure you if I conclude to call an extra session for the Lewis and Clark Fair will be one of the features of such a call."

Your suggestion that this appropriation should be entirely disconnected from the many questions that will occupy the regular session, amounts almost to a necessity, if the appropriation will be secured."

"Take it all in all, I am inclined to think that the reasons for an extra session decidedly outweigh those that have been urged against it, but as I said, that is yet to be determined, but whatever seems to be the best interests of the state will, finally decide the matter."

THE TURNER CAMPMEETING

First Day at the Big Annual Church Convention

INTERESTING SERVICES HELD IN THE BIG TABERNACLE — CHAS. REIGN, SCOVILLE, OF CHICAGO, WILL DELIVER DISCOURSES DAILY DURING THE SESSIONS.

TURNER, Or., June 20.—The annual convention of the churches of Christ in Oregon, commonly known as the Turner campmeeting was opened this morning at 9:30 by brief song service...

Friday and Saturday being allowed on the program for the Ministerial Association, Rev. G. S. O. Humbert, of Corvallis, president of this organization, called on Rev. J. S. McCallum, of Eugene, to offer prayer...

The church speaker of the convention, Dr. Scoville, had not yet arrived, and as he was to speak at 11 o'clock, the order of the program was departed from for the day.

"How I Prepare My Sermons," was the topic of a very interesting address by Allyn Esson, J. S. McCallum followed with a discussion, and others spoke also.

It is necessary to have an object in view in preparing a sermon as also in delivering it. A book one reads may suggest a line of thought profitable for a discourse.

Questions asked a preacher often indicate the need of a sermon to answer and explain.

One undergoes a course of uncommon preparation. The subject becomes a source of inspiration and even in the study the audience seems present to the mind.

Illustrate enough to enforce and explain clearly, but be careful not to weaken the scripture teaching or line of thought.

Sermons are not made but grow. J. B. Holmes spoke on "Finance and the Official Board." He recommended the apportionment plan as the best one to use in raising money.

For church work and in that he had the approval of the ministers present. It is business like, practical, scriptural, and it works. It requires a person adapted to the work to carry it out successfully.

Two things must be considered in all church finance. To raise the money and to leave the people in good condition after it is raised.

The convention then adjourned, having completed the forenoon work, and went to meet Dr. Charles Reign Scoville at the train as he came from Portland.

At 2:30 in the afternoon W. T. Matlock led in a devotional service. Chas. Reign Scoville, of Chicago, one of the foremost of American evangelists, was then introduced to the convention.

He read a paper on "Hebrew Poetry" to which very close attention was given by those present.

To attempt to characterize this address on this great topic would be to do it an injustice. He brought out many beautiful things in reference to the psalms and other writings of the Old Testament.

Dr. Scoville does not often read to an audience. He is to speak at 11 o'clock a. m. and 8 p. m. each day during the convention. The program for tomorrow is as follows:
