TIMELY SUGGESTIONS.

If you find that a plant has become badly infested with red spider, it is a good plan to give it a bath in water heated to one hundred and twenty degrees. Dip the plant in all over, and allow it to remain in the bath for about a quarter of a minute. You will think from the feeling it gives your hand, that the plant must be "cooked" by it, but no harm will be done if you are careful to have the water no warmer than one hundred and twenty degrees. Test it before putting any plants in to make sure.

Be constantly on the lookout for insects. When any are found, wage warfare against them at once. Delays are dangerous.

Do you want a plant of shrubby habit which will bloom all Summer and late into the Fall? Then get a hibiscus. The single varieties have flowers shaped something like that of the hollyhock, and almost as large, of bright crimson, with a blotch of darker color at the base of each petal. The plant has foliage of a rich, dark, shining green, against which the brilliant flowers stand out vividly. To grow the hibiscus satisfactorily you must give it the best of drainage. Stagnant water at its roots will cause it to drop its buds. Lack of sufficient water will bring about the same result. Therefore, aim to keep the soil moderately moist throughout at all times.

If you want symmetrical plants, keep watch of them while they are growing. If a branch is inclined to get the start of others, pinch off the end of it, promptly, and keep it from lengthening until the other branches have had a chance.

If a plant refuses to branch to suit you, give it to understand that you are going to insist on its doing what you want. Pinch off the ends of whatever branches it may happen to have, and keep them pinched off until you get the number of branches you want. Some plants will endeavor to have their own way, but patient, persevering persistence on the part of the owner will almost invariably overcome their stubbornness.

Go over the petunias and cut away all branches which seem to have developed most of their buds. In a short time new branches will take their place. These plants can be renewed two or three times during the season and kept strong and vigorous by close pruning. Let the nasties rest if the weather is hot and dry. Cut away all the old growth and remove any buds which appear. In September, when the weather is cooler, they will begin to grow and bloom with all the vigor of young plants. —Home and Flowers.

RUN OF BAD LUCK

THE GRAY EAGLE, THE O. C. T. COMPANY'S STEAMER IS WRECKED.

The steamer Gray Eagle, Captain A. W. Graham commanding, belonging to the G. K. Spaulding Co., of Newberg, while being run from Oregon City to Portland, Wednesday evening, ran onto the rocks and, had she not been beached immediately, would have been sunk in deep water. The O. C. T. Co. had leased the Gray Eagle from the owners for a specified period and at the time she met with her misfortune, she was on her way to the ship yards to be put into good repair pursuant to putting her into commission between Oregon City and Portland.

The O. C. T. Co. has had a run of ill-luck of late with its boats; the new boat Avonia, which was being constructed to ply to the upper Willamette river points, having been destroyed by fire in Portland during the big fire of Saturday night last.

HEARING OF MURDER CASE

Preliminary Examination to Be Held Before Judge O'Donald

GROVER LEWIS RECENTLY ARRESTED ON A CHARGE OF BURGLARY, DISMISSED BY THE JUSTICE OF THE PEACE FOR WANT OF EVIDENCE.

J. F. Markley, charged with the murder of J. D. Fain, at Champoeg, on Wednesday morning, June 25th, and brought to this city and placed in jail on the same day by Deputy Sheriff Colbath, was yesterday morning, at 10 o'clock, arraigned before Justice of the Peace J. O'Donald, Deputy District Attorney J. H. McNary, appearing for the state, and John A. Carson for the defendant. He entered no plea and his preliminary hearing was set for 11 o'clock this (Friday) morning.

Mr. Markley is held in jail here, and he is the coolest man connected with the case, and asserts his innocence emphatically. He says this is the first time he has ever been incarcerated, and he is hopeful of a favorable termination of his case.

The deed to the tract of land, over which the trouble is believed to have arisen and the sale of which to the Jettas was mentioned in the testimony given before the coroner, was yesterday recorded at the court house. The deed made by J. D. Fain was dated June 24, 1902—last Tuesday—and for the consideration of \$1000, transferred to Mrs. Elizabeth Jette, (wife of C. W. A. Jette.) 2 acres of land in section 2, t 4 s, r 2 w; also a tract 70 by 70 feet in block 1, Champoeg; and another small tract of land in Champoeg. Following the description of the land an endorsement appears on the documents in these words: "Permitting J. F. Markley to remove a certain store building, now on said premises and occupied by him, within six months from the date hereof—June 24, 1902."

Grover Lewis, who was arrested on Saturday morning last by Constable J. H. Lewis upon a warrant issued from Justice O'Donald's court on January 12, 1902, charged with burglary, was given a preliminary hearing in that court at 11 o'clock yesterday morning but was released by Justice O'Donald through lack of sufficient evidence to convict him of the crime charged.

The complaint was filed by John Darling, on January 12, 1902, charging the defendant with having, on January 10, 1902, broken into Darling's house, situated about four miles north of this city, and taking therefrom an overcoat and a pair of gloves to the value of \$3.

Only a few witnesses were examined on both sides of the case and the court was of the opinion that there was not sufficient evidence to convict the defendant before a jury in the Circuit Court.

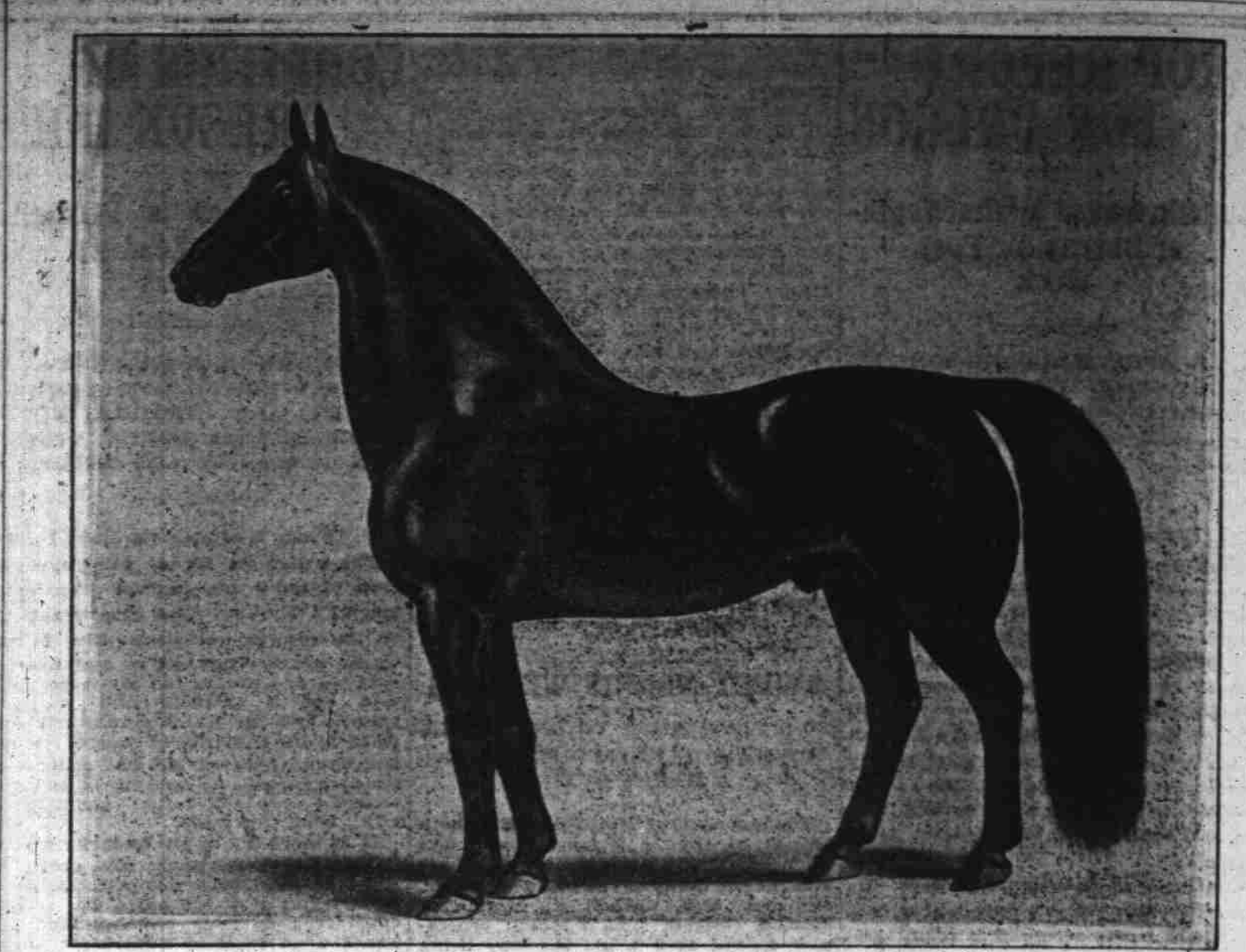

TWO NEW SUITS FILED

BOTH ARE FOR MONEY—REAL ESTATE ATTACHED IN ONE OF THE CASES.

D. B. Steeves, by his attorneys Bonnam & Martin, yesterday filed an action in department No. 1 of the State Circuit Court demanding judgment against W. A. Irwin, the defendant, for the sum of \$151.50 with interest at 10 per cent from the date of filing the complaint; for the sum of \$35 attorney's fees and for his costs and disbursements in the action.

The plaintiff alleges that the defendant executed a certain promissory note in plaintiff's favor, on January 12, 1899, for the sum of \$150 bearing interest, and as security for the satisfaction of the judgment, should it be obtained, the plaintiff has caused real and personal property belonging to the defendant and valued at \$225, to be attached.

In the second department of the Circuit Court an action was also filed wherein the plaintiff, Phoebe A. Tolman, asks for judgment against the defendants, Mary A. and Harvey L. Wright for the sum of \$500 with interest at 8 per cent from August 1, 1901, and for \$50 attorney's fees. The plaintiff alleges in her complaint that the sum she asks for is due upon a promissory note and that, as security for the payment of the same, the defendants executed a mortgage upon a fractional part of block No. 3, of addition A, to Woodburn, and the plaintiff demands the foreclosure of this mortgage. E. P. Morcom is the plaintiff's attorney.
