

TRACY STILL A FREE MAN

He Has Eluded His Pursuers
Near Seattle

HIS PROVISIONS ARE FOUND

Stored In a Building Where
Search Had Been
Made

THE OUTLAW SEEMS TO HAVE
CONFEDERATES ASSISTING HIM—
HUNDREDS OF MEN ON THE
TRACK OF THE DESPERADO—
BLOODHOUNDS SENT FOR.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 5.—A special to the Post-Intelligencer from Bothell says, Tracy is in the vicinity of Bothell almost beyond a doubt. A tract of territory fifteen miles in circumference is enclosed by a strong cordon of armed men. Unless the convict stole through the lines last night, he can hardly make his escape without a bloody conflict.

Every bridge and crossing, every place of strategic importance in a pursuit of this kind, is guarded by men lying in ambush. Others are patrolling the country. A mysterious buggy with three lights which appeared, on the county road this morning about 12:30 o'clock and suddenly disappeared, has added zest to the situation.

Tracy changed his clothes yesterday morning at Maple Leaf, near Pontiac, at the home of Farmer Fisher. He then took the county road for Bothell.

A man answering his description was seen by John Rogers on the county road, traveling toward this place yesterday afternoon. While many other reports have come in, Sheriff Cuddehe has held here principally by the incidents given.

The finding of Tracy's provisions in the cabin where Thursday's battle occurred, gave rise to a mild controversy today. The cabin was reported searched by the Bothell deputies yesterday. They stated it contained nothing whatever. Today Deputy Sheriff Nelson, of King, entered the place and found Tracy's outfit in the loft. The friends of the Bothell men declared that the outfit was left there by Tracy last night.

The mysterious buggy is connected with the finding of the outfit. It was driven rapidly along the county road in the black of night from this direction. It stopped at the cabin for a few moments and then quickly doubled on its course. The buggy was seen by Deputy Sheriff Frank P. Brewer and Deputy Sheriff Woolery.

The Bloodhounds Again.

Walla Walla, Wash., July 5.—Warden Catron tonight received a call from the sheriff's office at Seattle, for the bloodhounds at the prison here. Every effort to get a special train proved

unavailing, and the dogs will leave here tomorrow.

Tracy's Wife.

Tacoma, July 5.—Tracy's wife in Tacoma has been located. She goes by the name of Ely, and lives on an alley in the rear of Tacoma avenue. She has been following the newspaper accounts of the convict's twenty-seven days of flight, but declares that she has no further interest in him. She says that when she read in the papers the report that Merrill had secretly given information to the police which resulted in Tracy's conviction, three years ago, she knew that Tracy would settle with Merrill, if the opportunity offered. The fleeing convict's wife was shown the statement of Mrs. Van Horn, of Seattle, at whose house Tracy stopped for several hours Thursday night. Tracy said to the woman that a few days after he escaped, a man met him on the outskirts of Portland and gave him a newspaper with this report of Merrill's duplicity.

When this was read to Mrs. Tracy, she said, "You may put it down for truth that Tracy killed Merrill just as he said he did."

Tracy's talks with the persons whom he has forced to assist him astonish men who knew him during his career here. He was then the most close-mouthed of crooks.

The Boat Found.

Seattle, Wash., July 7.—At the extreme head of Millers Bay, the White-hall boat which carried Tracy and Anderson away from Port Madison Saturday night has been found. The boat had been pulled in from the beach and stowed away in a clump of bushes, and Tracy evidently felt secure in the belief that it would not be found for several days at least. This very fact may lead to developments somewhat earlier than anyone had hoped for.

The head of Miller's Bay is four miles overland from Port Gamble. It is directly north of the Port Madison Indian Reservation, where, according to an Indian woman, Tracy was seen yesterday afternoon. Sheriff Cook, with a posse, left Port Madison early this morning to search the Miller's Bay district.

Immediately after finding the boat, the party discovered a fresh trail leading into the forest. The tracks of two men are plainly discernible, and there was no doubt in the minds of the members of the posse that they were hot on the track of Tracy and his unwilling partner, Anderson. Shortly after noon Deputy Sheriff Cook and party made their way into the dense forest, and it may be hours before they will again be heard from.

Every point on the Sound has been furnished with carefully prepared descriptions of Tracy and Anderson. The authorities of the Northern counties bordering the Sound have taken up the chase and considerable additions have been made thereby to the pursuing force.

The Hood Canal country is being patrolled by two squads of officers.

Not Merrill.

Tacoma, Wash., July 7.—Sheriff Hartman has been investigating several stories relative to the presence of Convict Merrill at Stellacoon and other points in this vicinity and says there is nothing in them, and that the descriptions of the mysterious strangers do not answer for that of Merrill.

FREIGHT MEN ON A STRIKE

Chicago Railroads and Their
Men Have Disagreed

SETTLEMENT LOOKED FOR

The State Board of Arbitration Takes a Hand

RAILWAY MANAGERS AND COMMITTEES REPRESENTING THE MEN EXPECTED TO MEET IN CONFERENCE—COAL MINERS' STRIKE IN PENNSYLVANIA

CHICAGO, July 7.—Hopes of a speedy settlement of the strike of the Freight Handlers Union, which was declared today, are entertained by the officials of the Union and the members of the State Board of Arbitration. The officials of the Union, at a conference tonight, told Chairman Job, of the Board of Arbitration, that they were willing to permit the employees of different companies to meet the officials of the same to discuss the wage scale, providing a joint conference should be held at which the officials of the Union would be permitted to act as advisers to the men. The Arbitration Board is now working on the matter in an effort to bring about a conference between the railway managers and committees representing the men. There is little doubt the strike can be settled satisfactorily to both sides of the conference as arranged.

The Coal Miners.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., July 7.—President Mitchell in New York, and the other miners' leaders at Nanticoke attending the annual convention of district No. 1, strike headquarters was a quiet place today. The ninth week of the suspension of anthracite coal mining shows no change in the situation, there not being the slightest indication that either party is ready to quit.

Differences Settled.

Omaha, Neb., July 7.—The carbuilders settled their differences with the company today, by accepting for one year the scale offered. This is considered final by both sides. There were no developments today in the strike situation, and quiet prevails at the shop yards, both sides evidently waiting for the other to act.

Advance Granted.

St. Paul, Minn., July 7.—The Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha Railroad Company has granted the boiler-makers, machinists and helpers an advance of 25 cents a day in wages.

Strike a Failure.

Providence, R. I., July 7.—Having voted after a strike of two months' duration to return to work, the motor-men and conductors of the United Traction Company here lost no time today in making application for their old places. At the offices of the company the men found less than 150 vacancies for about 400 or 500 applicants. The railroad officials re-employed as many of the old men as were needed without displacing those who had been taken on during the strike, and others were placed on the waiting list.

In Pawtucket the strikers refused to abide by the decision of the street railway union and they will not return at present.

The strike began early in May when the Union Traction Company, being compelled to reduce the hours of its employees under a new labor law, refused to grant the demand of the men for the same pay as was received for the longer day.

JEFFRIES AND FITZ

WILL MEET IN THE PRIZE RING IN SAN FRANCISCO THIS MONTH.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7.—Ground was broken today for the erection of a temporary arena at Fourteenth and Valencia streets, where Jeffries is to meet Fitzsimmons on July 25th. The ring will be in plain sight of all who attend the fight. Here is to be a seating capacity of 8000.

From Harbin Springs, where Jeffries is training, and from St. Paul, Minn., where Fitzsimmons is preparing for the struggle, come reports that both pugilists are bending to their work with increased zeal.

INDIANS ARE ANGRY.

GUTHRIE, O. T., July 7.—The Cheyenne Indians near Calumet, in Canadian county, are reported to be holding a council of war, angry over the order issued by Major Stouch, Indian agent, prohibiting them from practicing the tortures, so-called, incident to their sun dance. The Indians are excited and the whites near Calumet are becoming frightened. Major Stouch has apprised the War Department of the situation. About 2000 Indians took part in the dance last week in celebration of their religious festival and the tortures were to have closed their doings. This is the first time that the dances of the Cheyennes have been stopped by the Government authorities.

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THE POLICE LAID DOWN

Officers in Walla Walla Declined to Serve

AND ARREST THEIR CHIEF

For Fifteen Minutes the City Was Without Protection

CITY MARSHAL AND POLICE JUDGE QUARRELED, AND FORMER WAS ARRESTED—A FULL PARDON BY THE GOVERNOR RESTORED ORDER IN THE CITY.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., July 7.—For fifteen minutes this evening there was no police force in the city. The chief was under arrest, and each officer rather than take charge of his former superior took off his star and turned it over to the city police judge. To save law and order from a complete rout the mayor extended executive clemency to the chief. Then the force resumed its stars and took up again the discarded administration of the office. The trouble grew out of an altercation in the police court between Chief of Police Kauffman and Judge Glasford.

WARSHIPS COME HOME

NAVAL FORCES IN ASIATIC WATERS TO BE MATERIALLY REDUCED.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—The Navy Department contemplates making a material reduction of the Naval forces on the Asiatic station, in the near future. It is thought that the large number of American warships in Chinese and Philippine waters is much above the proper ratio, but ships brought to the United States will probably only include few, if any of the largest vessels now stationed there.

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ALASKA MINING CLAIMS

APPELLATE COURT REVERSES THE DECISION OF JUDGE NOYES AT NOMES.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7.—A decision rendered today in the United States Circuit Court of Appeals, reversed the injunction order made by Judge Noyes, of the District Court of Alaska, which gave the possession of a valuable placer mining claim to a set of men who claimed to own it, to the exclusion of a number of miners who were working it. The higher court holds that the decision of Noyes "was an exercise of judicial power unknown to American jurisprudence." By the decision the appellants, who were ousted by the injunction order of Noyes, are restored to the possession of the claims.

THE GAMBLERS OF PORTLAND

Compelled to Close Up Their Houses Last Night

BY THE MAYOR'S ORDERS

SUICIDE OF AN HEIR TO AN ESTATE IN MICHIGAN

IN AN EAST PORTLAND LODGING HOUSE—A DENVER MAN TAKES HIS OWN LIFE IN ARKANSAS BECAUSE OF A FEAR OF BEING CRIPPLED.

PORTLAND, Or., July 5.—By order of Mayor George H. Williams, all the gambling houses in the city were closed tonight.

Fred T. Grosshans, of Detroit, Mich., committed suicide in a lodging house on the East Side today, by shooting himself. It is said Grosshans was the heir to a large estate in Detroit. It is said he killed himself because he was out of employment.

He Had Fears.

Little Rock, Ark., July 5.—Colonel J. N. Smith, of Denver, was found dead in his room this afternoon. A pistol clamped in his right hand, and a bullet hole through his head explained the manner of his death. A note near by gave this further explanation: "For cripples, paupers and mendicants I have no use. Fearing I may get into one of those classes by reason of an injury by which I was recently visited, I end the doubt."

While in New York several months ago, Colonel Smith injured his ankle by a fall. In 1878 he was the unsuccessful candidate for Governor of Arkansas.
