CANNERY SHUTS DOWN

THE PACK OF BERRIES THIS YEAR THE LIGHTEST IN MANY SEASONS.

The last cans of the season's run of the Salem Canning Company were put through the retorts last evening completing the lightest run the factory has made for a number of years past. Since June 15th and up to and including yesterday, July 13th, the factory has packed only 4000 cases of strawberries and cherries against 19,000 cases last year between June 15th and July 31st.

The management is very much disappointed over the result of the run, the brevity of which was due to the lightness of the crops in both varieties of the fruit and the damage which they sustained through the unusual lateness of the spring and the cold rains, and feels that the company will suffer loss in consequence. However, contracts with the growers had been entered into and the company was bound to fulfill them whatever the cost.

In speaking to Mr. Holcomb, the manager, last evening, that gentleman said that, at present, it was very difficult to determine as to whether or not the factory would make a run on pears and apples in the fall which matter depended entirely upon the conditions which exist when those fruits are approaching maturity but until that time no definite decision would be reached.

He expressed himself in terms of regret over the fact that the fruit growers, up to date, had devoted all of their land and attention to either the very early or late varieties of fruits and said that if a sufficient acreage would be devoted to the culture of the best canning varieties of blackberries and raspberries, to warrant the operation of the factory to close up the long gap between cherries and pears, it would enable them to make a six month's continuous run which would prove profitable to all concerned.

To encourage the introduction and culture of these last mentioned fruits the company proposes to offer the growers a rate of 3 1/2 cents per pound upon the first twenty-five acres contracted, whether in tracts of one or more acres or all in one tract and a rate

of 3 cents per pound for all over twenty-five acres contracted and Mr. Holcomb thinks this offer will be the means of inducing many of the growers to set out a quantity of plants and hopes that, by next season, the factory will be able to make a continuous and profitable run.

A SNEAK THIEF'S WORK

WALKED INTO RAILROAD OFFICE AND CALMLY CARRIED OFF CASHIER'S FUNDS.

NEW YORK, July 13.—A sneak thief has marched into the offices of the Southern Pacific Railway at 348 Broadway, this city, and although there were an hundred people there at the time, he calmly marched out again, taking with him the cashier's money box. The box contained the day's receipts. Usually it holds \$25,000 to \$50,000 in negotiable paper and cash. On this occasion, however, it held only about \$500 in checks and notes, and the cashier thinks less than \$100 in cash.

As a rule the box is kept in the safe of the office, but the cashier had taken out and placed it on his desk, intending to return it to the safe in a moment. He left his compartment for a short time and when he got back the box was gone and trace of the thief could not be found. The checks can, it is thought, be readily cashed, as many of them are for small amounts and the cashier has no record whereby he can stop payment.

THE NATIONAL GUARD CAMP

Troops Will Gather at Albany for the Annual Drill

SALEM'S MILITIA COMPANY LEAVES BY SPECIAL TRAIN THIS MORNING FOR THE CAMP OF INSTRUCTION—REGULAR ARTILLERY TO BE THERE.

(From Thursday's Daily.)

The annual encampment of the Oregon National Guard begins today, at Albany, and before the next issue of the Statesman goes to press, the military strength of the state will be in camp on Goltra field, in Linn county's beautiful capital, for an eight days' school of instruction and drill.

The Salem guardsmen, the members of Company F, met at the Armory last night and received final instructions regarding the encampment, and packed their haversacks for the trip. Captain H. A. Kurtz was present and oversaw the work, and instructed the men to be in readiness early this morning. A special train leaves Portland at 5 o'clock this morning for Albany, carrying brigade commander and staff of the Third Regiment, and the separate battalion stationed in Eastern Oregon. At Wadburn Company D, Fourth Regiment, Captain W. E. Finzer, will board the train, and the Salem company will join the party here for Albany.

The Seventh Battery, U. S. A., from Vancouver, B. C., has been ordered to join the militia and will march to Albany. It will consist of 100 men, 120 horses, six guns, six caissons, and four wagons. They will probably be in camp three days. This will add an interesting feature to the camp and be of great benefit to the National Guard Battery in drills.

On next Sunday Gilbert Camp, Spanish-American War Veterans Association, will run an excursion from Portland to Albany, where the veterans of the Philippine campaign will visit the guardsmen and enjoy camp life for a day. The veterans' excursion trains will pass Salem at 10 and 10:15 a.m. on Sunday, and a large number of the Salem veterans and their friends will take advantage of the cheap rates and go to Albany on the excursion. Tickets for this excursion are on sale at the Waters Clear Store, the Wiprut Cigar Store, and Patton Bros., and from the number already sold, the indications are that many Salem people will visit the encampment and cheer the boys in their arduous duties of soldiers in camp.

Company F will be well represented at the encampment. Captain Kurtz said last night that practically the entire company would be in the camp. Two members will be absent. Edwin Thielsen is in Eastern Washington, engaged in surveying, and R. E. Patten, another enlisted man, has been excused from attendance. The roster of the company is as follows:

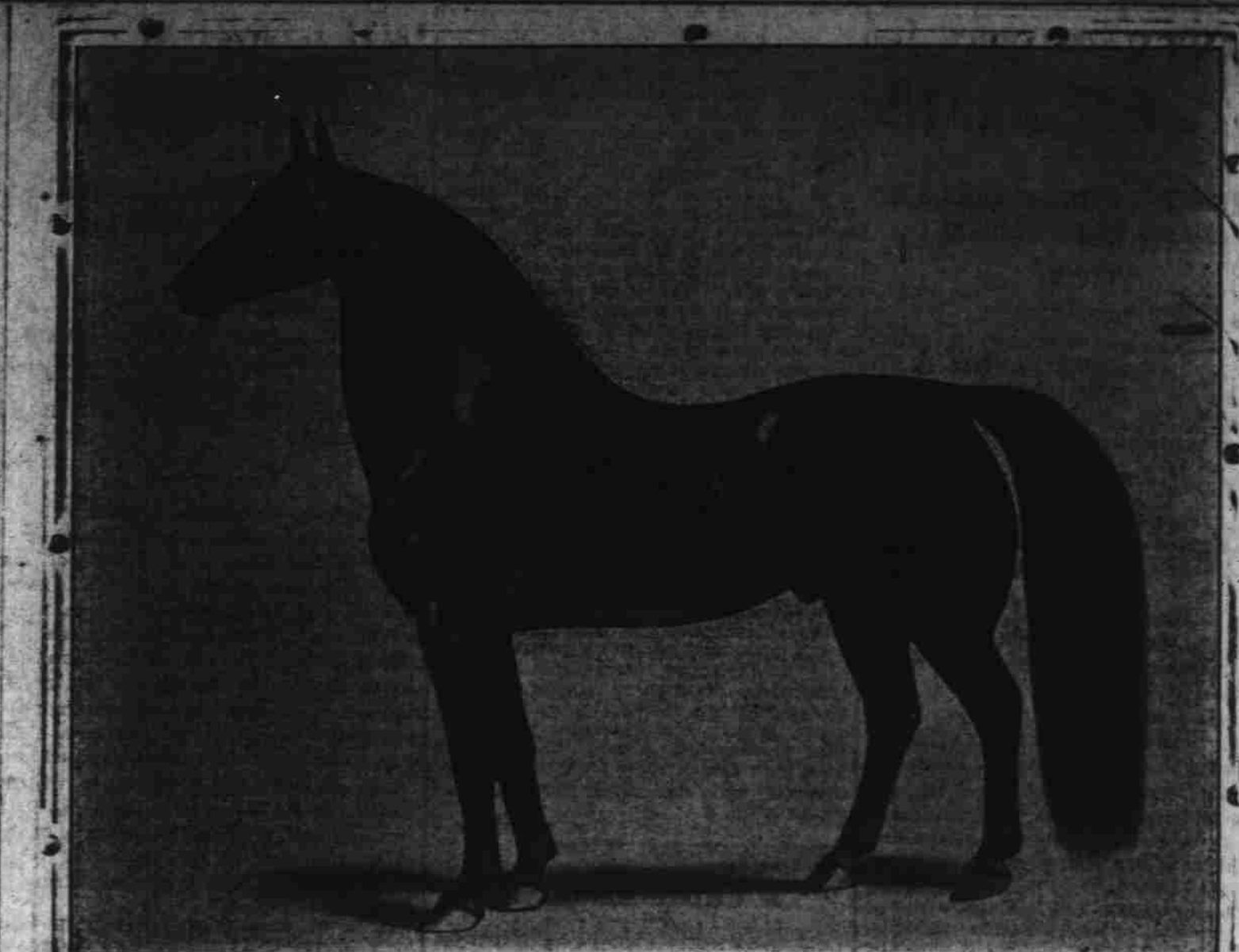

WASHINGTON REPUBLICAN SPOKANE COUNTY CONVENTION IN A FIGHT ON THE RAILROAD QUESTION.

SPOKANE, Wash., July 17.—Interest in tomorrow's Spokane county republican convention is at fever heat tonight. Governor McBride and ex-Governor McGraw are here, watching the convention's attitude on the railroad question. The friends of the Governor will press an unequivocal plank, commending his fight against the merger and for a regulatory commission. This is opposed by John L. Wilson, candidate for United States Senator. I wish has drafted a plank which the friends of McBride regard as a straddle. An effort was made tonight to bring about a compromise, but the Governor declared that the matter was entirely beyond his control, and the supporters of the Governor's policy declared that the fight would be to a finish. Aside from the railroad question, it is thought that Wilson will control the convention, nominating a Legislative ticket that will support him for the Senate, and naming the delegation to state convention.
