

TWENTY CENTS ON CONTRACT

Marion County Hops Sell at the Highest Figure

YET QUOTED IN THE WILLAMETTE VALLEY IN A DECAD— FIVE NEW CONTRACTS PLACED ON THE COUNTY RECORDS YESTERDAY.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

The contract price for hops, of the coming crop, is gradually and steadily on the advance and there appears to be no check, nor evidence of it, in the advance which threatens to mount still higher and the dealers are unable to set a limit to the price. This fact is very stimulating to the growers, who have heretofore been grudging along in a sort of "hand-to-mouth" manner very much discouraged, but still persevering in the hopes of better days, and now that those long dreamed of and nighted for days are about to be realized they are feeling very jubilant.

Five more contracts of the 1932 crop were filed with the county recorder yesterday, in three of which the consideration being 20 cents per pound, the highest price of record up to date. The five contracts aggregate a total of 74,000 pounds, or about 410 bales, of Marion county hops, and all were in the name of one firm. They follow: C. G. J. R. and M. J. White, of Monro, to Lillenthal Bros., of New York, 20,000 pounds of the 1932 crop at 20 cents per pound; 7 cents advance for picking purposes. Fong Poy (Chinaman) of Butteville, to Lillenthal Bros., of New York, 20,000 pounds, 1932 crop, at 20 cents; 7 cents advance for picking.

O. S. Pomeroy, of Woodburn, to Lillenthal Bros., of New York, 10,000 pounds, 1932 crop, at 20 cents per pound; 7 cents advance for picking.

H. B. Geary and A. J. Van, Washenove, of St. Paul, to Lillenthal Bros., of New York, 12,000 pounds, 1932 crop, at 11 cents; 5 cents advance for picking.

H. B. Geary and J. A. Hamar, of St. Paul, to Lillenthal Bros., of New York, 12,000 pounds, 1932 crop, at 11 cents; 5 cents advance for picking.

The Eugene Register, of Sunday, says of the hop market there:

"Hops are hopping up serenely to a good figure. Yesterday local buyers were offering to contract for future delivery at 20 cents, with prospects of few takers at that price. Growers expect their product to soar as high as 22 cents this fall. Quotations are now higher than at any time since 1882. There have already been two short crops of the crop and the outlook is not very bright this year. England had the largest yield in years last season but the quality was very poor. Her best hop was quoted at 17 and the poorest at 3 cents. The Oregon hop is noted for its uniform quality and silky appearance, due largely to the equable climate and to a uniformity of the alluvial soil."

FRIENDS' YEARLY MEET

IN SESSION AT NEWBERG — AN INTERESTING TIME HAD — THE ALASKA MISSIONS

The ninth annual session of Oregon Yearly Meeting of the Friends Church opened here Monday, July 7th, and the regular sessions are now in progress. The attendance is hardly up to what it has been in other years, as the urgency of work on farm and in orchard calls many from the attendance of the meetings who would otherwise be present. However, several members are present from a distance, and about twenty from the other yearly meetings. At the Tuesday afternoon session these latter were called upon to rise and introduce themselves to the meeting. All were given a hearty welcome.

The first session was the meeting on Ministry and Oversight. The opening thought seemed to be a thorough consecration to the Lord and his work.

The opening session to the public was held Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock. This meeting was led by Rev. Thomas Armstrong, of California. He was followed by James Price and Anson Cox. The epistles from California and Iowa Yearly Meetings were read. These epistles are letters between the different Yearly Meetings, which tend to keep the meetings in touch with one another. In regard to their work and are also a source of encouragement. At 2 p. m. the yearly meeting assembled in its first business session. After the preliminary business of calling the names of delegates and caretakers, and the appointing of some committees, the epistles from New York and Baltimore yearly meetings were read. In reading these epistles an advance step was noted in these old and rather conservative yearly meetings. A letter was read from John Henry Douglas, who is now visiting some of the Eastern yearly meetings.

The Tuesday evening meeting was led by Thomas Armstrong, who took for his text the first verse of the 23d Psalm: "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want."

The 5 o'clock devotional meeting on Wednesday morning was led by Anson Cox, of Idaho. He read from Phil. 1:12 to 2:8. His theme was self-denial. He believes Oregon Yearly Meeting ought to deny herself and push out into the work. At the 10 o'clock business session the devotional part was led by Daniel Drew. The delegates proposed the following persons for officers of the yearly meeting: H. Edwin McGreer, Presiding Clerk; Mabel H. Douglas, Reading Clerk; Rebecca H. Smith, Recording Clerk; John S. Ritchie, Announcing Clerk.

The reading of the Quakeres and answers called forth many thoughtful and helpful remarks. A good firm and wholesome discipline in the home was emphasized. The attendance of week day and Sunday evening meetings was encouraged. In the Sunday evening service especially, the church hopes to reach the unconverted and the pastor needs the example and backing of the mem-

bers. The statistical report was also read at this session. While the church has not gained many in numbers, yet it has made some advancement.

The afternoon session was devoted to temperance and the temperance committee reported. This report was most gratifying and showed much thought and preparation. The main address was given by Rev. Kelley. He showed that the church is to attack sin wherever it is found in politics as well as elsewhere. His address was clear, logical and full of energy. S. L. Packwood followed with a few remarks. He had formerly been a bartender and could paint the picture from the other side. His advice is, not to put into office those men who will not enforce the laws. The evening service was conducted by Rev. John Danks.

On the Thursday morning session the uniform discipline was discussed. After a great deal of discussion it was adopted. It is thought that by a uniform discipline the Yearly Meetings will be united into a closer union and shall be a mutual help to one another.

At 2 p. m. the subject of Missions came before the meeting. An address was given by Thomas Armstrong. He gave an interesting account of California's Yearly Meetings' work in the Alaska field.

Prof. Francis K. Jones spoke of the work in Cuba; of the ignorance, filthiness and priest-ridden condition of the people.

On Friday, the early morning meeting for devotion was led by Cassa Commons, of Scott's Mills. The devotional exercises of the 10 o'clock business session were conducted by B. F. Hinshaw. The subject of Peace and Arbitration came before the meeting. The subject of Literature also came before this session. At the beginning of the afternoon session a "Memorial Service" was held. The Sabbath school work then came before the meeting. The night session was in charge of F. M. George.

On Saturday, the regular sessions were held and the usual Yearly Meeting services were conducted on Sunday. On Monday the meeting held a business session in order to finish the business in time for the Salem people to take the boat up the river. The reports of various committees were read. W. P. Smith resigned his position as yearly meeting correspondent and Chas. Townsend was appointed to fill the vacancy. The closing minute was read and this closed our ninth annual session. R. E.

BIG MINING COMPANY

FILED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION IN THE STATE DEPARTMENT YESTERDAY.

In the State Department, yesterday, articles of incorporation were filed, as follows:

BUILD A NEW HATCHERY

MASTER FISH WARDEN GOES TO ONTARIO TO ESTABLISH A NEW STATION.

State Fish Warden Van Dusen left yesterday morning for Ontario, where he proposes to establish a hatchery on the Oregon side of the Snake river. He has been given permission by the General Government to stop all salmon at that point, and expects to add several million to the output of fry next year. He says the run of salmon is now exceptionally good on the lower Columbia, and that the canneries have all they can take care of.

The Linderberger cold storage plant at Astoria has more than it can put away, and so the price has dropped to seven cents a pound. It was eight cents. Mr. Van Dusen attributes the fine run of salmon to the work of the various hatcheries, and he has become an enthusiast in favor of artificial propagation. He will do all he can toward establishing hatcheries on both sides of the upper Columbia as well as on the Oregon side of the Snake. He looks for this year's pack to be a record-breaker, as there is every sign of the run keeping up well for the remainder of the season.

H. H. McALLISTER DEAD

SUCCUMBED TO TYPHOID FEVER EARLY YESTERDAY MORNING— LEAVES A FAMILY.

H. H. McAllister passed away at the family home, No. 48 Canby street, this city at 1:30 o'clock yesterday morning, of typhoid fever, aged 43 years.

Deceased was born in Rensselaer Falls, New York, May 12, 1853. He was married to Lucille Munger, at Erwin, South Dakota, November 23, 1883, and came to Oregon in the fall of 1897, locating in the Waldo Hills. Here he lived until last April, when he moved to Salem.

THE CROPS AND WEATHER

Weekly Bulletin for the Past Week in Oregon

CONDITIONS OF THE CROPS GENERALLY ARE GOOD — PRUNES WILL OT AVERAGE AS WELL AS ANTICIPATED EARLIER IN THE SEASON.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

The weekly crop bulletin for Oregon, issued by the Weather Bureau, Oregon Section of the United States Department of Agriculture, for the week ending Monday evening, July 11th, is given below. The general summary shows favorable weather conditions and predicts larger yields than last year. The bulletin is as follows:

The past week has been rainless and moderately mild. The maximum, or day temperatures in Western Oregon ranged between 70 and 82 degrees, and the minimum, or night temperatures between 42 and 56 degrees. In Eastern Oregon the maximum temperatures ranged between 64 and 82 degrees and the minimum temperatures between 28 and 62 degrees.

The weather has been favorable for haying and this work has progressed actively. The crop because of an increase in acreage will probably give total yields larger than last year, although in many places individual meadows will produce slightly less than the average. Pastures are slowly getting short and a slight shrinkage is taking place in the supply of milk being delivered at the creameries.

Fall grain of all kinds is filling and ripening nicely. Some fall oats and barley have been cut, but harvesting will not become general for about two weeks. Spring wheat is growing fast and it has a good color. The complaints of fall wheat lodging are not numerous and but little rust is reported. The outlook on the whole, is favorable for a large crop of grain of an excellent quality in both Eastern and Western Oregon.

Hops are making a good growth, and but few lice are reported upon the vines. Corn has done well during the week. It has a good color, but it is still small for the season of the year. Potatoes, onions, sugar beets, gardens, and all root crops have made favorable advancement. The Italian prune crop is almost a total failure, but the French prunes give promise of yielding a fair crop. Apples also promise well. But few reports regarding peaches were received during the week and they were favorable.

Coast District.

Trask, Tillamook county, E. J. Guber.—Haying is progressing rapidly; an excellent crop of fine hay is being put up; the fruit crop will be very light though of excellent quality.

Marshallfield, Coos county, Thos. Buskman.—The weather has been very fine since the rains. Crops are in fine condition and give promise of good yield; that is grass, potatoes, and small fruit; apples and pears are only about a fourth of a crop.

Willamette Valley.

Brownsville, Linn county, O. P. Co-show.—The recent rains did lots of good; some grain and grass lodged, but these will be but little damaged. The rains will insure a good spring crop in most cases. Crop of cherries below average; no Italian prunes; fair crop of apples.

Willitsburg, Multnomah county, W. E. Willis.—Weather cool and cloudy; crops growing finely; cherries mostly gone.

Buxton, Washington county, P. H. Buxton.—Weather warm, but with occasional clouds. Haying well under way, with average crop; fall wheat ripening fast; spring oats look well since the rains; prunes and pears above average.

Liberty, Marion county, T. C. Davidson.—The past week has been warmer, with some cloudy weather, but no rain. Haying being pushed along; hay cut before the rain not badly damaged; cheat is a good crop and will be cut this week; fall grain generally good and heads filling well, although bad spots are to be seen in some fields; spring grain growing fast and promises good yield; pastures revived by the rains and feed is fairly good; stock doing well; prunes promising, some orchards to the south of Liberty being over-loaded, which will make small sizes. Gardens doing well.

Southern Oregon.

Wellen, Jackson county, H. Von der Hellen.—The temperature has turned seasonably warm and wheat is ripening fast under its influence, promising a full yield of very fine quality. Corn is doing well with warmer weather, and making a good growth.

Wilderville, Josephine county, J. M. Hoxie.—It has been very warm, with corn looking well and is making a good growth. Farmers are cutting grain hay and saving it in good order; but very little hay lost in this section; grain hay is about two-thirds of a crop. Gardens are doing finely.

Rice Hill, Douglas county, L. H. Calame.—Haying is the general order of the day, and considerable is being housed. No grain has been cut yet, although some is about ripe. Fruit prospects continue fair; wild blackberries are ripe. The past week has been clear and quite cool. Pastures are drying up slowly.

Columbia River Valley.

Hood River, Wasco county, P. D. Hinrichs.—Strawberry harvest is nearly over; the crop was the largest ever gathered in Hood River. The pear and apple trees are loaded and the fruit has to be thinned or the trees will break down. The first crop of hay is nearly all cured and hauled to the barn or in stock. Wheat and oats are ripe and in shock.

Pendleton, Umatilla county, E. M. McDonald.—The warm days and cool nights are filling and ripening grain nicely. Heading of barley and wheat in light soils, well under way. General harvesting will begin in two weeks.

Grass Valley, Sherman county, T. W. Wilcox.—Weather warm all week, with west winds. Grain filling finely. Fall grain has commenced to turn yellow. Have commenced cutting hay; indica-

tions are for a large yield of grain — all kinds and of first quality.

Plateau Region.

Arcadia, Malheur county, B. W. Graybill.—Fine weather all the week, but not as warm as usual for this time of the year. First cutting of alfalfa all in stack; second crop is growing nicely; also corn; some spring wheat is very fine. Garden crops look well.

Haines, Baker county, Lee A. Dunnean.—Grain of all kinds is looking fine. Haying has begun here and the crop is reported good. The weather has been favorable for crops during the past week. Threshing will not commence here for about a month.

PROVINCIAL SUPERVISOR

FOR THE PHILIPPINES WANTED BY UNITED STATES CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that on August 12, 1932, an examination will be held for the position of provincial supervisor in the Philippine service, at salaries of \$1,300 to \$2,000 per annum.

The subjects and weights of this examination will be the same as those of the junior civil engineer examination given in section 99 of the Manual of Examinations, revised to January 1, 1932.

The position of provincial supervisor is a responsible one, as extensive public improvements and expenditure of considerable money are contemplated. It is desired to secure as applicants civil engineers who have had not less than four or five years' experience in classes of engineering similar to that required in the Philippine service. Road and bridge building will constitute an important part of the work of the provincial supervisors, but the structural material of bridges is generally wood instead of iron. Age limit, 30 years or over.

This examination is open to all citizens of the United States who comply with the requirements. This examination offers an excellent opportunity to enter a service which has many attractive features and to see a most interesting part of the world. The Philippine Service is classified, and the law contemplates promotions on the basis of merit from the lowest to the highest positions.

Thirty days' leave of absence is granted each year, exclusive of Sundays and holidays, and those employees who are promoted to \$1800 per annum are entitled to thirty-five days, or about forty days including Sundays and holidays. Leave is also cumulative, and at the end of three years those who have to their credit cumulative leave for two years may visit the United States without having the time in going to and returning from San Francisco charged against their leave. China and Japan are near at hand and are favorite places to visit during vacations. Saturday is a half holiday.

Appointees will be required to pay their traveling expenses to San Francisco, but the Government furnishes them transportation free of charge on its transports from that place to Manila, but exacts a charge of \$1.50 a day for meals while en route, which is returned to the appointee upon his arrival at Manila. Employees who are promoted to the United States at the time of their appointment shall, after six months' satisfactory service, be reimbursed for their traveling expenses from the place of their residence to the point of embarkation for Manila.

The Philippine climate is good, and nearly all of the employees are in excellent health. Medical attendance, when required, is furnished employees without cost. Good accommodations (room and board) can be secured in Manila for about \$35 a month, while employees assigned outside of Manila obtain cheaper accommodations. The same accommodations in Manila are good, and the work is done under pleasant conditions.

Persons who desire to compete should at once apply either to the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or to Miss Zaidie Palmer, the secretary of the local board of examiners, for application Forms 304 and 475, which should be properly executed, including the medical certificate in Form 304, and filed with the Commission at Washington prior to the hour of closing business on August 2, 1932.

HOLINESS CAMPMEETING

WILL BE HELD ON TWELFTH STREET DURING THE NEXT TEN DAYS.

INDEPENDENCE, Or., July 15.—More complete information has come to hand in regard to the accident to Earl Henry. His condition has so materially improved as to justify his being brought to the town of Falls City from the mountains this week. With his father, young Henry was following a bear, which the dogs were already bay-

ing. On hearing their prey the older man's gun was in some way discharged the bullet, which was from a 22-caliber cartridge, striking his son on the nose, slightly on the right, and taking a downward course passed through the upper jaw, knocking two teeth out of the lower jaw and passing out under his chin and striking in the shoulder. Mr. Henry is a veteran of the Philippine war, and draws a pension for a shattered arm, which still shows the marks of a Mauser bullet. He is Government mail carrier for the rural towns of that section.
