Western Producers Desire That Reductions Be Made

AN ATTACK EXPECTED

CAPE HAYTLEN TO BE THE CENTER OF AN ATTACK-FORIGNERS WARNED.

CAPE HAYTLEN, Hayti, July 22.—The local authorities have notified the Consular Corps that Cape Haytien is to

be attacked by land and sea, and that they cannot guarantee the safety of foreigners.

Machias Gets Orders

Washington, July 22.—Orders of today will bring the gunboat Machias northward to Cape Haytien. The Machias has a detachment of Marines on board, and these together with the sailors stand ready to make up a landing party in case it is needed at Cape Haytien.

THE IOWA FLOODS

AWFUL DEATH OF A CHILD

Fell Into a Bonfire and Was Fatally Burned

OREGON CITY CHILD DIES

Refusal of a Spokane Woman to Secure a Physician

RESULTS IN THE DEATH OF HER CHILDREN AND AN INQUEST WILL BE HELD—BIG REWARD OFFERED FOR TWO MISSING MINERS.

OREGON CITY, Or., July 22.—Rhea Grace Wilson, the six year old daughter of William J. Wilson, was fatally burned this afternoon. She was playing around a bonfire, tripped and fell on the fire. The clothes were completely burned from her body.

Will Hold Inquest

SPOKANE, Wash., July 22.—Coroner Baker has ordered an inquest to determine the cause of the death of the three children of Mrs. G. E. Graham, of this city. It is claimed the mother belongs to a religious denomination which does not believe in medicines, and that she refused to give them a physician's aid when they were dying with diphtheria.

Big Reward Offered

TELLURIDE, Colo., July 22.—The board of county commissioners has offered a reward of \$5,000, and the Liberty Bell and Smuggler-Union Mining Companies a similar amount, for information leading to the cause of the death or disappearance of W. J. Barney and W. E. Smith, miners who mysteriously disappeared from this place about a year ago.

Charged With Kidnaping

BUTTE, Mont., July 22.—A special to the Miner from Billings says, Mrs. Edna Hall has been arrested upon a dispatch from the authorities of Paris, Ill. Mrs. Hall is charged with kidnaping her younger sister, Effie Carnaby.

He Died Cursing

GREENVILLE, Miss., July 22.—Ashley Cocks and Tom Lauderdale were hanged today for the murder of Engineer G. W. Wray. When the sheriff and the doomed men mounted the scaffold, Cocks began to berate those about him and turning to the crowd said: "It is all a plot to kill me, do you all, do—n everybody, I'm going to die like a man. They have murdered me, but revenge, revenge, revenge."

FRIAR LANDS NEGOTIATIONS

Archbishop Ireland Discusses the Progress Made

ROME IS HIGHLY PLEASED

With Governor Taft and With the Work That Has Been Done

THE PRELATE TAKES TO TASK CERTAIN CATHOLIC INSTITUTIONS THAT QUESTION THE FAIRNESS OF THE ADMINISTRATION—TRIAL OF TWO OFFICERS.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 22.—Archbishop Ireland, in an interview, reviewed the progress of the negotiations between Governor Taft and the Vatican and took to task certain Catholic institutions that have assumed to question the fairness of the administration toward their co-religionists. The Archbishop said:

"The news from Rome is quite satisfactory. Private advices coming to me from a reliable source confirm in all respects the dispatches given by the Associated Press. The Sovereign Pontiff and other Roman authorities are delighted with Governor Taft personally, and with the negotiation in the course of progress between him and the Vatican. The reports sent out by the representatives of London papers, that the Pontiff was displeased with the manner of the acting of the Commission of Cardinals, appointed to treat with Governor Taft, were absolutely unfounded."

For Water Cure

Washington, July 22.—Secretary Root today sent to the President the proceedings and finding in the court-martial cases of Major Edwin F. Glenn, Fifth Infantry, and Lieutenant Norman E. Cook, of the Philippine scouts.

Glenn was found guilty of administering the water cure to natives, or permitting it to be done, and was sentenced to one month's suspension from duty and fined \$50. Cook was acquitted on the charge of giving orders to kill three Filipino prisoners.

In forwarding the cases to the President, the Secretary recommended that the sentence and findings be approved, but that no other action be taken.

Back From Manila

San Francisco, July 22.—The transport Sumner arrived today from Manila. She brought more than 1400 cabin passengers, mostly officers and army families; 203 enlisted men of the Seventeenth Infantry and 225 of the Twenty-fourth.

Ravages of Cholera

Washington, July 22.—The War Department has been informed from Manila, that between May 9th and June 11th, seventy-six enlisted men of the army died. Of these sixty-two deaths were caused by cholera.

DENIED IN WASHINGTON

SECRETARY SHAW BRANDS AS FALSE STATEMENTS ALLEGED TO BE HIS.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—The following statement was made public today:

Numerous inquiries have been received today at the Treasury Department relative to the truth or falsity of the alleged assertion of Secretary Shaw that he was in favor of a five-year limit for service in the Treasury Department. The original newspaper article and those that followed it, stating that the Secretary believed a departmental employe lost his usefulness after five years in Government work, were so ridiculously improbable that they were never dignified by denial.

To avoid further misconception of the facts, it may be announced on absolute authority that no such remark or expression was ever made by Secretary Shaw, and that the articles purporting to represent his attitude as a headman are made out of whole cloth.

It may be said with equal authority that Secretary Shaw is heartily in accord with the civil service in every respect.

WILL FIGHT HENDERSON

EX-SPEAKER HAS MADE ENEMIES AMONG THE AMERICAN MILLERS.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 22.—H. S. Kennedy, Secretary of the National Federation of Millers, tonight announced that the milling interests of the country are in league to procure the defeat of Speaker Henderson in the race for re-election to Congress.

The resentment of the millers arises from Henderson's action in holding up the London Dock scheme amendment to the harbor bill, designed to do away with what American exporters regard as an unjust discrimination against United States flour in unloading charges at London.

A FAST ROAD RIDER

WONDERFUL SPEED FOR ONE THOUSAND MILES MADE ON A MOTOR-CYCLE.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 22.—A. A. Hansen, "the rainmaker," completed his 1900 miles of road ride on a motor-cycle against time today, elapsed time being 82 hours, 26 minutes, 50 seconds, and the actual riding time 54:59:30. This is believed to be the fastest road rider for the distance on record, on any vehicle that does not run on a prepared track.

GAME IS SLAUGHTERED

COLORADO AUTHORITIES WILL TRY TO PREVENT INDIAN DEPREDATIONS.

DENVER, Colo., July 23.—The following telegram was received today at the office of the Game Commissioner: "Indians are slaughtering game forty-five miles southwest of Delta."

An order was sent to Chief Game Warden Norton, at Montrose, to organize a posse and go after the Indians at once.

OVER A HUNDRED

HAMBURG, July 22.—The steamer Primus has been partially raised and brought nearer the shore. The total number of missing is now placed at 104. Sixty-one bodies have been recovered.

ROOSEVELT IS THE MAN

Senator Foraker Is His Enthusiastic Supporter

OPPOSITION VERY LIGHT

And Will Be Extinguished by the American People

HE SAYS THERE ARE A FEW FLICKERING FLAMES, FANNED BY PARTISANS, BUT THEY WILL NOT BURN—MISSOURI DEMOCRATS IN CONVENTION.

CINCINNATI, O., July 22.—Senator Foraker today asked:

"Are you correctly quoted as to the Republican candidates of 1904, namely, that nobody is seriously thought of but Roosevelt?"

"Yes, the statement is correct. Roosevelt is the only man seriously thought of by the great masses of the people. There are a few flickering flames that some ambitious partisans are trying to fan into a blaze, but they cannot make them burn steadily, and they must all get out in due time, extinguished by the freamp of American politics."

CHOLERA IN MANILA
