PERRY CARD PASSED AWAY

Mr. Edward Dekum of Honolulu in Letters Received Yesterday

WRITERS OF THE LAST HOURS OF THE DECEASED—THE REMAINS WILL ARRIVE IN SALEM ABOUT AUGUST 1ST, HAVING BEEN SENT TO SAN FRANCISCO.

The Statesman is in receipt of a letter from Mr. Edward Dekum, of Honolulu, formerly a resident of Portland, announcing the demise in that city, at the Victoria Hospital, of Mr. G. Perry Card, notice of which was briefly mentioned in this paper a few days ago. Mr. Dekum attended the bedside of the deceased for many days, and was in the death-chamber when the spirit took its flight. He writes that the remains will reach Salem about August 1st, leaving Honolulu on the steamship Alameda, on the 23d (last Wednesday). A clipping enclosed, from the Pacific Advertiser, of Honolulu, published on Monday, July 14th, says:

"Mr. G. Perry Card, of Salem, Oregon, who has been quite ill for the past two months, died yesterday afternoon. The remains will be taken to Oregon on the next steamer leaving for the coast. Mr. Card was formerly connected with the hardware department of Lewers & Cooke, and had many friends in Honolulu."

Mr. Card was an honored member of Salem Camp No. 118, Woodmen of the World since 1894, and this order will probably have charge of the last obsequies over the remains. The time of the funeral will, of course, not be fixed until their arrival.

Mr. Dekum writes that he will send a long letter to the Woodman Camp on the next steamer, giving the details of the last sickness of the deceased. He has also written to the relatives, appraising them of their loss.

In a letter received by Messrs. E. C. and H. D. Patton from Edward Dekum under date of July 15th, from Honolulu, that gentleman says:

"No doubt you will have learned of Perry's death ere this, as I have telegraphed from San Francisco to Levi Card in Portland. The remains will not be ready to go by the same steamer as this letter and will leave here on the steamship Alameda, leaving here on the 23d, and should reach Salem on or about August 1st, if not sooner. I was with him constantly even to the last. Poor fellow; he had a very peaceful death. Simply falling to sleep. The last night on earth he seemed cheerful and up to within three hours of his death sat up in his chair, so that I could wash his face and comb his hair. On Friday, the 11th, he went out for a ride with a friend, for an hour, and on his return seemed very cheerful and happy. He had a game of cribbage with one of the nurses at 5 p. m. After he had a very bad hemorrhage, which caused up on Saturday morning. I was with him all day Saturday, and we talked over common events of the day; I read him the papers, etc. Two friends, Messrs. Rittenhouse and Sullivan, called at 7 p. m., and I made them stay until midnight, as I wanted to get some sleep. He did not wish to be alone at any time. At 12:30 I took my turn and sent his friends home, so that I had the watch all alone from midnight on up to 8 a. m., when I went home to get an hour's sleep. All during that time he seemed bright and very cheerful, and I had not the least idea his death was so near at hand. Helped him up in his arm chair some three or four times during the time, and it seemed such a relief to him to get out of bed.

"At 10 a. m. I was phoned to, and hurried to the hospital to learn that it

would soon be over. He was then unconscious and breathed quite hard, but had no pain whatever. At 11:30 a. m. he passed away, Sunday, July 15th.

There was a steamer in from the coast today, but I did not get a single letter from any one of his folks. No doubt there are some for Perry at the hospital, and as every minute tells, I cannot go to get them till later and return to the writers.

"I have yet to write some letters to his father in California; his mother in Salem; brother in Portland, and wife in Pennsylvania. So, you see, I have all I can attend to, as the steamer that takes this mail will leave here in four hours. The next one following this will take his remains. Everything that could possibly be done for him was done."

PRUNES IN CALIFORNIA

THE DROP OF THE FRUIT LATER THAN USUAL—IT IMPROVES QUALITY.

The San Jose (Cal.) Mercury, of July 21st, in discussing the prune crop in that section, and the prospect for a good yield, says:

"Fruit growers say that the drop of prunes which occurs usually in June was deferred for some reason until July this year and the result is that the drop is now occurring. Major W. A. Coulter said yesterday that he believed the crop would be smaller by 10 per cent than the estimates that had been made. He thought that the reason for this was that as the drop did not occur at the usual time the growers thought it would not come.

"The opinion of the growers seems to be that the quality of the fruit will be improved by the drop as the smaller quantity of fruit to the tree will tend to a better development of that which remains. The opinion was expressed by some growers that owing to the lateness of the apricot crop the prunes would be ripe before the apricot crop could be disposed of. No particular harm is anticipated from this condition excepting the labor problem and the prevailing opinion now is that there will be more men in search of employment than can secure it.

"The canneries are securing a good part of the apricot crop, especially of the larger sizes. The smaller sizes are being canned. Some of the growers object to the discrimination made by the canners and have determined to dry their entire crop."

FROM OREGON EXCHANGES.

Astorian.—The greatest number of cases of salmon ever packed in a Columbia river cannery in a single day was put up yesterday at Elmore's cannery. The day's pack was in excess of 2,000 cases. When an Astorian reporter visited the packing house almost 1900 cases had been packed and operations had not then ceased. The receipts of fish at the cannery were very heavy and there was a scramble by the employers for help. Every available Chinaman in town was engaged, even to porters and janitors, and a scene of activity was presented at the cannery that is seldom equaled. It is extremely gratifying to note the large number of white boys and girls employed at the packing houses. They receive very good wages and during the vacation season earn enough to pay for their education. It was learned late last evening that the exact number of cases packed at the Elmore cannery yesterday was 2,020.

Roseburg Review.—Thos. Arnold, the 17-year-old accomplice of Harry Granel, who is now serving time in the Oregon penitentiary for attempting to wreck an S. P. train at Rice Hill about ten weeks ago, completed his sentence of two months in the Douglas county jail Tuesday. No sooner did he step forth into the outer air before he was taken in charge by an official of the Oregon State Reform School and conveyed on the first train to Turner, where he will be obliged to suffer for a while longer the restraint of his liberty, although he will be allowed to enjoy the customary limited measure of freedom attached to residence of that institution. It transpires that Master Arnold was paroled from the reform school prior to his escape at Rice Hill. Good behavior, however, did not prove characteristic of his actions in the meantime, so he must once more suffer the penalty for his refractoriness.

WILL CHANGE HIS QUARTERS

State Supt. J. H. Ackerman Will Remove His Office

TO THE GROUND FLOOR OF THE CAPITOL—HAS CHOSEN THE SOUTHWEST ROOM WHICH WILL BE NEATLY ARRANGED FOR HIM.

State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman has long felt himself crowded in his office on the main floor of the Capitol, and has at last decided to move to another floor, and thus secure better quarters. He has arranged to have room No. 2, on the ground floor, fitted up for his department, and expects to move in the course of about a month. Room No. 2 is in the south end of the Capitol, on the east side of the main hall. It is a large apartment, and by erecting a partition will make two very nice and convenient office rooms, one for the stenographer and the other for a private office. The room will be arranged and tastefully furnished during August, and by September 1st, Mr. Ackerman expects to occupy it.

State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman, yesterday received the annual report of the schools in Baker county, from County Superintendent John A. Payton. The statistics in the report show the following:

No. of persons between 4 and 20 years of age in the county, 5,371; No. in schools, 3,778; No. of pupils under 6 years, 42; No. of teachers, 145; No. taking educational journal, 95; No. attending institutes, 49; No. persons attending no school, 1,593; No. attending schools outside of the county, 33; whole No. days attendance, 378,759; average daily attendance, 2,446; No. districts in county, 58; No. legal voters, 1,729; books in library, 1,895; No. purchased during the year, 1,405. Amount of money available for school purposes, \$110,986.06; disbursements, \$100,082.56; balance, \$10,903.50. Value of school house property, \$120,775; value of furniture, \$9,822; insurance, \$51,000. Average salary for male teachers, \$64.64; female, \$43.21.

PARENTS RESPONSIBLE

WHERE CHILDREN DIE FOR THE WANT OF SUITABLE MEDICAL ATTENDANCE.

SPOKANE, July 23.—By the verdict of the coroner's jury, Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Graham, of this city, caused the death of their three children by criminal negligence. The inquest resulted in a verdict "that death was caused by diphtheria, and that the parents, E. G. Graham and his wife, Rose Graham, are guilty of criminal negligence for failing to employ or accept skilled medical assistance."

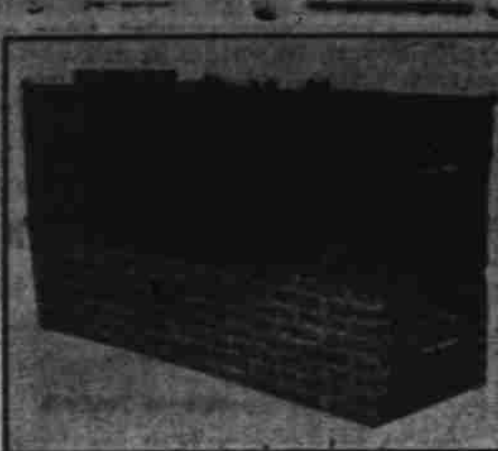
The jury also recommended that a state law be passed covering such offenses and fixing a penalty. Mr. and Mrs. Graham are members of the society known as the "Church of God," and do not believe in medicine, though surgery is permitted. When the children became sick they were anointed by an elder of the church. Later a doctor was called and was allowed to lance the children's throats, but not to give them anti-toxine. Three died, one recovered.

Whether the parents will be prosecuted has not been determined.

The grip received was so hard that several of the small bones were broken and afterward caused a cancerous growth. Amputation became necessary, and the operation has been performed.
