ATTEMPT AT ROBBERY

MASKED MEN UNDERTAKE TO LOOT A FARM HOUSE, BUT FAIL.

THE DALLES, July 26.—A bold attempt at robbery was made a few miles southeast of this city last night by two masked men, who almost succeeded in their purpose. About 10:30 p. m. Mrs. Alice Beebe, of Ogden, who was visiting at the home of John Wagonblast, about two miles from this city, was awakened by some noise and found two masked men in her room. She at once screamed for help, as the men grabbed her by the throat, and held their hands over her mouth, and with pistols leveled at her, commanded her to be quiet.

THE COUNCIL INDUSTRIOUS

A Large Amount of Business Transacted Last Night

ALLEYS IN BUSINESS PORTION OF THE CITY TO BE THOROUGHLY CLEANED AND ALL DANGER OF FIRE FROM TRASH IS TO BE MINIMIZED.

The city council held a brief session, on call of the mayor, at the city hall last night, and a large amount of business was disposed of.

The report of the committee on fire and water upon the purchase of 600 feet of new hose for the fire department was adopted and the recorder was instructed to issue a warrant in payment of the purchase.

Chairman Stolz, of the committee on health and police, reported that the cess-pool nuisance existing on the Hager property on the corner of Union and Cottage streets, which was reported some time ago and ordered abated, had not been attended to and asked that the matter be urged by the proper officers. He was informed that Mr. Hager had answered the notice served on him and had signified his intention to remedy the nuisance in the near future.

The report of Street Commissioner J. P. Frizzell for the quarter ending June 30th 1902, was read, adopted and ordered placed on file. The report in substance, follows: Days work with team..... 31 Days work without team..... 138 Cash on hand at close of last quarter.....\$ 77.65 Cash collected during quarter..... 103.72 Total.....\$181.37 Disbursements..... 118.95

Cash on hand July 1st.....\$ 62.33 The Salem Military Band filed a communication with the council to the effect that a series of evening concerts had been planned by that organization in Wilson Avenue band stand to take place during the summer season; that the Salem Light, Power & Traction Company had kindly offered to supply electric lights for the stand providing the city would bear the expense of wiring the stand, and petitioned that the council make order complying with this provision. It was ordered, on motion, that the council comply with the request, and bear the expense of having the stand wired for electric lighting.

Councilman Stolz, of the committee on fire and water, to which committee the inspection of hydrants in the city was referred, reported that a tour of inspection had been made and that the stand-pipe on Marion street was found to be so situated as to not be available during the winter months, when it was submerged with water and mud, and recommended that it be transferred to a convenient corner on a more advantageous spot, and, upon motion, the chief of the fire department was instructed to investigate and adopt the latter plan of procedure.

The committee on streets and public property filed its report upon the matter of constructing a sewer in block No. 18, bounded by Marion, Union, Twelfth and Capital streets, including the plans and specifications for the work and stating in the report that the approximate cost of the work would be \$350. The report was adopted.

The committee on fire and water submitted a resolution for the abolition of all ignitable trash and debris which has been allowed to accumulate in the alleys in the business portion of the city, which was read and adopted as follows: "Resolved—By the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, that the public safety demands the thorough and immediate inspection of the business premises of the city, with a view of minimizing the danger of fire incident to the accumulation of trash and combustible materials in the back yards of the stores and in the alleys, and to the end that such menace shall be removed, it is hereby ordered by the council, that the chief of the city marshal and chief of the fire department of this city, as fire wardens, proceed, without delay to inspect the premises and alleys in the business part of the city and direct the removal of all materials likely to cause, or contribute to, fire, and to report fully, in this relation at the next meeting of this council."

Pursuant to an order of the council at a previous meeting, City Recorder N. J. Judah presented a bill for an ordinance "prescribing the material to be used, and the manner and method of construction to be observed, in the districts in this city, and for the maintenance of uniform curb lines within this city" which ordinance was read twice and referred to the committee on ordinances with instructions to amend so as to include a clause providing for the establishment and maintenance of a uniform grade for the sidewalks. The full text of the ordinance appears in another column of this issue.

The petition of E. P. McCormack for permission to erect a two-story brick building adjoining that of Jos. Meyers & Sons on Court street, was allowed.

Councilman Stolz called the attention of the council to the work recently carried on by the street railway company in repairing the car track on Commercial street and in so doing destroyed a considerable amount of the cement cross-walks, and recommended that the matter be referred to some committee to adjust the matter with the company, as it was understood the company was willing to co-operate and improve the present cross-walks to the extent of laying cement walks between the rails at each crossing. The matter was referred to the committee on streets and public property.

The committee on accounts and current expenses reported favorably upon a number of claims, which were ordered paid, and the council adjourned. The bills follows: E. S. HEATON IS IN JAIL

ALLEGED MURDERER OF BENTON TRACY LANDED BEHIND BARS AT EUGENE BY SHERIFF.

JUNCTION CITY, July 26.—Bert Heaton, alias Bert Ray, against whom an indictment was found by the grand jury charging him with the murder of Benton Tracy, in this city, May 20, was landed in the city jail at Eugene yesterday by Sheriff Withers, who, after a long and tedious hunt, located and arrested Heaton at Wells, Nev., last Friday. His trial will be held at the next term of the district court, November 3d.

TO PROTECT THE TIMBER

Annual Forest Fire Proclamation Has Been Issued

GOV. T. T. GEER IS SENDING OUT THE CUSTOMARY WARNING AND QUOTES THE STATUTE PROVIDING PUNISHMENT FOR VIOLATORS OF THE LAW.

Gov. T. T. Geer was yesterday sending out the annual proclamation for the protection of timber and other property from fire. The great value of Oregon's timber makes greater care imperative, and the Legislature has therefore wisely determined to do all possible to protect the forests. The text of the proclamation is as follows: "Whereas, an act passed by the Legislative Assembly of the state of Oregon, at its seventeenth regular session, entitled 'An Act to Protect Timber and Other Property from Fire,' contains the following:

"Section 1.—If any person shall maliciously, with intent to injure any other person, by himself or any other person, kindle a fire on his own land or the land of any other person, and by means of such fire the buildings, fences, crops or other personal property or wooded timber lands of any other person shall be destroyed or injured, he shall, on conviction, be punished by a fine of not less than twenty dollars nor more than one thousand dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail not less than three months nor more than twelve months, according to the aggravation of the offense.

"Section 2.—If any person shall, without malice, kindle any fire in any field, pasture, enclosure, forest, prairie or timber land not his own, without the consent of the owner, and the same shall spread and do damage to any buildings, fences, crops, cordwood, bark or other personal property not his own, or to any wood or timber land not his own, he shall, on conviction, be punished by a fine not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars and costs, according to the aggravation of the offense, and shall stand committed until the fine and costs are paid.

"Section 3.—Any person who shall enter on the lands of another person for the purpose of hunting and fishing, and shall, without the consent of the owner of said lands, kindle any fire thereon, shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, and if such fire be kindled maliciously, and with the intent to injure any other person, such offender shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty dollars nor more than fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail not less than three months nor more than twelve months.

"Section 4.—Any person or persons who shall willfully set fire to any wooded country or forest belonging to the state or the United States, or to any person or persons, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction before a court of competent jurisdiction, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding one year, or by both such fine and imprisonment, provided, that nothing herein contained shall apply to any person who in good faith sets a back fire to prevent the extension of a fire already burning.

"Section 5.—Upon any prosecution under this act, one-half of the fine imposed shall be paid to the person who first gives information thereof to the district attorney for the district in which the offense is committed, and the other moiety shall be paid to the county treasury for the benefit of the common school fund of the county in which said fine is collected.

"Section 6.—It is hereby made the duty of the Governor of this state to issue a proclamation on the first day of July of each year, calling public attention to the provisions of this act and warning all persons against violating the same. It is also the duty of each circuit judge of this state to read the provisions of this act to each grand jury when charging them, as to their duties.

"Now, Therefore, I, T. T. Geer, Governor of the state of Oregon, do hereby direct the attention of the public to the crimes and misdemeanors declared in this act, with the penalties prescribed, and warn all persons to abstain from violating all or any of its provisions.

"Done at the Capitol, at Salem, Oregon, this first day of July, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and two.
