## VOUED THEY BREAK JAIL?

The Ramsbys, on Being Released on Bail, Tell the Story

OF A PLAN AMONG SHERIFF COL-EATH'S PRISONERS FOR A WHOLESALE JAIL DELIVERY -AN INVESTIGATION MADE LAST

(From Saturday's Dally.)

Roy and Clyde Ramsby, the two Silverton boys, who are held over to the State Circuit Court to answer to the charge of the larceny of the \$2800 bur-ied treasure, belonging to Mrs. E. D. Ewing, of Hubbard, each furnished bonds in the sum of \$1000 yesterday and they were released from jail.

After leaving the jall and the city and while on their way to their homes at Silverton the two young men informed Jennings Smith, one of their bendsmen; that the prisoners in the county jail had planned to break out; hat several bars on cell doors had been partially sawed through, and these would be broken off and used in the work of digging through the brick wall of the Jail. So earnest were the young men in their statements, that Mr. Smith decided to inform the officers of the condition of affairs, and Mr. Smith's daughters coming to the city. he sent word by them to Sheriff B. B. Colbath, of the report received by him.

The Misses Smith, on reaching Salem at 8 o'clock last night, at once went to the sheriff's office, where they informed Deputy Sheriff John O. Estes, and that officer and Nightwatch Louis Felsom at once went into the jail and made an investigation. The cell doors were thoroughly examined, as were the window gratings and all iron work in the whole jail, but no sawed bars were found. A critical examination of the pall disclosed nothing suspicious. and the only result of the investigation was the growling of the three prisoners in their slumbers.

At the conclusion of the investigation ilance, and a close watch was last night of next week. kept on the three prisoners, and this condition will continue.

### A THREE-RAIL TRACK

STATE STREET TROLLEY LINES TO RUN OVER THE SAME

had a crew of men at work during th east week laying the connecting track between the broad guage and the narnow guage line on State street, at the intersection of State and Winter streets pursuant to the plan to lay a double track down the center of State street, as announced in the Statesman about two weeks ago. This connecting piece of track was the most difficult portion Suits Commenced Against F. of the track, having to cut a new road way through the hard and well grav-elled street, but as that part is finished. Mr. Brown regards the major portion of the work done. The putting in of the frogs in crossing the narrow guage line will be tedious work, and will probably consume the greater part of today.

The plan to lay a three-rail track, as was previously stated, has been abanfoned on account of the large cars requiring heavy rails, and if two heavy rails and one small one were laid the small cars would have to run upon one high rall and one low one, so Manager Brown has decided to lay the heavy rails outside of the narrow track, and make a double track of it.

The work of laying the track down State street will begin on Monday morning, when the old broad gange track will be torn up along the curb of \$171.47, with interest at 6 per cent line and laid in the middle of the street, from April 1, 1898, and for \$30 attorand during this operation, two sets of cars will be run upon the State street line. Mr. Brown thinks that the track will be completed to Commercial street next week.

A switch will be put in at about the same place as the old one, on the broad guage line to provide for the the passing of cars at that point, while a short spur will be constructed on the narrow guage line for the accommodation of the small cars,

Manager Brown says that his appro priation for track building will be about exhausted when this improvement is completed and Mr. Brown will, for the present, have to turn his attention to other improvements of the company's property which are quite as necessary but less expensive.
