

ABANDONING COLLIERIES

Five of Them Flooded and Useless at Shenandoah

A WATCHMAN MURDERED

Was Killed As He Was Going Home During the Night

HE TOLD THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE MINE THAT THREATS HAD BEEN MADE AGAINST HIM—BIG REWARD OFFERED FOR MURDERERS.

SHENANDOAH, Pa., Aug. 6.—William Stern, State Mine Inspector for the Shenandoah region, today announced that five collieries under his jurisdiction, which have an estimated total value of \$1,500,000, have been rendered useless by reason of being flooded, and have been permanently abandoned.

His Skull Crushed.
Wilkesbarre, Pa., Aug. 6.—The body of Daniel Sweeney, a watchman employed by the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Coal Company, at Hanover township, was found early today on a lonesome road in Nanticoke lying in a pool of blood. The skull had been crushed at the base, there were two wounds on the top of the head and the body was bruised in numerous places. A bloody pick handle lay close by. Sweeney quit work at midnight, and was followed by a score of men who threatened him. He took refuge in a saloon, and after he thought the crowd had dispersed, left for home. This was the last seen of him alive.

It is said the coal company will offer a reward of \$1,000 for the arrest and conviction of the murderers. The murdered man had told the superintendent of the mine where he was employed that some of the strikers had warned him that if he did not quit work he would be sorry. Sweeney said he needed employment and his family was in want.

No Disorders.
Shenandoah, Pa., Aug. 6.—The soldiers on duty around camp and the sentries stationed at different parts of the town on provost guard duty reported everything quiet during the night. Some of the guardsmen said they heard several shots during the night, but could not locate them. Two companies of the Eighth Brigade are on guard in the town.

BOUND FOR CRATER LAKE

SMALL PARTY OF MAZAMAS LEFT LAST NIGHT FOR THAT SCENIC WONDER.

The southbound overland train last night was the bearer of a very merry though small party of tourists on a night-seeing expedition to Crater Lake, on the summit of the Cascade Range of mountains in Southern Oregon. The party, upon its arrival in this city, was composed of about ten members, among whom were Congressman Thomas H. Tamm, of Hillsboro, and James Steel, of Portland, and was under the leadership of Mr. Will G. Steel, of Portland, the originator of the scheme of having this great natural wonder set aside as a National Park and the ultimate success of the undertaking after sixteen years of effort.

Mrs. T. T. Geer, the Misses Margaret J. Cooper and Louise M. Church and Mr. and Mrs. N. J. Damon joined the party at this city and the number will be increased to sixteen before arriving at Medford, where the journey to Mt. Mazama and the destination will begin. Governor Geer had arranged to make the trip also, but on account of urgent business connected with his office he was obliged to forego the pleasure.

NEW WHEAT COMES IN

THE FIRST IN THIS SECTION RECEIVED AT BROOKS—YIELD IS EXCELLENT.

The first new wheat of the season was hauled into Brooks yesterday afternoon and stored in the warehouse of Balfour Guthrie & Co. The grain, of which there were 200 bushels, was the product of Homer Goulet, a prosperous young farmer of near Brooks, and Mr. G. G. Graham, local agent of the above named firm who received the wheat. It was of excellent quality and the yield per acre would exceed thirty bushels.

Thrashing is becoming general all over the valley now and the grain is expected to be coming in from all directions and in great quantities by the first of the coming week.

HE SAID TOO MUCH

GENERAL SHARRITS EMBARRASSED THE POWERS BY A SPEECH AT SHANGHAI

SHANGHAI, Aug. 6.—General Sharrits, the special American tariff commissioner in the course of an address at a banquet tendered him, said the Chinese people were bound to the verge of anarchy by the central Government, and that individually and collectively he was opposed to the abolition of the tariff and the substitution of a tariff which he said would prove disastrous

to all nations and especially to the United States.

Speech May Make Trouble.
LONDON, Aug. 6.—In a dispatch from Shanghai, the correspondent of the Times says he considers General Sharrits' attitude on the question of inland waters to be partly due to the declaration made by General Sharrits, the American special tariff commissioner, that the Viceroy was opposed to the abolition of the tariff. The correspondent regrets such utterances saying they tend to upset a treaty which is intended for the benefit of all commercial nations alike. He adds that Liu Kun Yi, in a telegram to Prince Cheng, one of the Chinese tariff commissioners, adduces General Sharrits' statement as an argument agreeing to the inland waters proposal.

THIS YEAR'S STATE FAIR

Outlook for Oregon's Big Exposition Augurs Well

MORE, BIGGER AND BETTER EXHIBITS COMING TO THE FAIR, AND THE PUBLIC FEELING IS FAVORABLE TO THE ENTERPRISE—SPLENDID RACING.

(From Thursday's Daily.)
The State Fair for 1902 promises to be the best exposition of Oregon's productions ever shown in this state, and the interest manifested by the public generally, in every portion of Oregon, is increasing from day to day, making the outlook for the Fair very indeed. In every part of Oregon preparations are under way for the state fair, exhibits will come in in larger numbers and variety than ever before seen here, and the attendance from all the counties and cities will be largely increased. The former ill-feeling against the Fair has entirely disappeared, it is not now looked upon as a Salem or Marion county enterprise, and the people of the state show a friendliness to and interest in the institution that is truly gratifying to its old friends and promoters.

The fair this year is receiving the best of attention at the hands of its officers, President W. H. Wehrung, and Secretary M. D. Wisdom, and these gentlemen, assisted by the others of the board, are arranging for an exposition that will earn for them the reputation of leading fair managers of the coast. Exhibits in all departments promise to be of a greater variety and better quality than ever in the history of the Fair, and the liberal premiums offered by the Board are directly responsible for this increase.

In the live stock department, all the valuable herds of dairy and beef cattle exhibited last year will be here again for the 1902 Fair, and in addition to these there will be several herds imported from abroad or shipped here from the Eastern states since the last Fair, while still other herds will be brought in from the East for exhibition purposes. In all other lines the same condition of affairs prevails, and the outlook is very encouraging.

In county exhibits the Fair will show a larger and better assortment than ever before. Many counties are preparing exhibits and will enter the contest, among them being several from the valley, some from Eastern Oregon, and some from Southern Oregon. One county that has in the past always contested for a prize—Marion county—is not in the list this year, no one having been secured for the purpose of arranging a creditable exhibit. In some of the counties, the people or the county court, considering these exhibits good advertisements for the county, have appropriated funds with which to pay for the expense of arranging an exhibit, but this was not done in Marion county, and the result is that "Old Marion" will not be represented in the pavilion among the county exhibits. All agree, however, that if some one had received the necessary county aid here, he would have been able to get up a collection of the products of Marion county that would have captured the first prize.

The racing this year will be the best ever seen on the Lone Oak track. The big purses offered—some \$2,000 purses on Salem Day for a harness event, and one \$1,000 purse on a running race, with similar big purses on the other days of the week, promise to bring more and better horses here than ever in the past. Race horse owners from all over the West and even some from British Columbia and Canada have already applied for stall-room at the track, and more stalls are being constructed to accommodate all comers. A large field of splendid racers, trotters and pacers is now at the Fair Grounds, and is training for the meet, and it is confidently predicted that among the horses will be found several that will break records on Lone Oak track this year. The date for the Fair is set so early that it is believed good weather will prevail, and if that is the case, the race meet will be the best ever seen here.

The buildings and grounds are in excellent repair, and a force of workmen is now busy engaged in putting things to rights and arranging all buildings for the reception of exhibits, and all work of this character will this year be completed days before the Fair opens.

The Oregon State Grange is considering the matter of erecting a permanent building at the Fair Grounds, where exhibits can be made, annual reunions held, and the members generally will find headquarters. The Grange has established headquarters at the Fair, and it is expected that hereafter the members of the organization will attend in greater force than ever in the past, and help make the Fair the best agricultural exposition in the world.

NINE LIVES SACRIFICED

A Work Train Started Over a Railway Without Orders

AND A WRECK RESULTED

When a Freight Train Was Met—Both Engineers Killed

THE CLOUDBURSTS HAVE DONE GREAT DAMAGE TO RAILROADS IN COLORADO—MANY MILES OF TRACK HAVE BEEN WASHED AWAY ON SEVERAL ROADS.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 6.—At 1:30 o'clock this afternoon a work train and a freight train collided on the Omaha division of the St. Paul, eight miles west of Rhodes, Ia., killing both engineers instantly as well as seven laborers. Twenty others, all laborers, were injured. From information in the General Superintendent's office, it appears that the work train in charge of Conductor Craig started west from Rhodes without orders.

Big Damage Done.
Denver, Aug. 6.—Cloudbursts and heavy rains, in a few hours yesterday, damaged the Rio Grande and Colorado Midland railroads to the extent of \$100,000 and possibly more. Seven bridges are gone on the Rio Grande and many miles of track washed out in different places. On the Colorado Midland, three bridges were destroyed and the track inundated by washed out between Manitou and Cascade. The Rio Grande westbound trains are running to Colorado Springs over the Rio Grande tracks, thence over the Cripple Creek line to Cripple Creek, over the Midland Terminal to Divide, and thence over the Colorado Midland to Leadville. The same route is used returning. The Colorado Midland trains are running by the same route.

FROM EDITOR TO SHERIFF

A MORROW COUNTY MAN ANNOUNCES THE SALE OF HIS NEWSPAPER.

E. M. Schutt, editor of the Heppner Times has been elected sheriff of Morrow county, and since assuming the office has sold his newspaper. In a circular letter to the press of the state, announcing his retiring from the newspaper field, Mr. Schutt promises good treatment to his former co-laborers. He says: "The Heppner Times has been sold to Mr. A. J. Hicks, of Comas, Wash., who will take charge of the business on August 7th. By the action of the voters of Morrow county in electing me sheriff, I am obliged to lay down the pen and take up the sword, for a short time at least. The object of this message is to thank you for your uniform courtesy and fraternal kindness to me during my thirteen years' newspaper experience in Eastern Oregon, and to bid you adieu for the time being. Should it become necessary for me at any future time to hang you or any of your friends, the memory of happy associations in the past will surely prompt me to let you down easy. But while the scaffold has its mission here on earth, it would pain me to see any newspaper man called up higher through such a medium. "May your future efforts be crowned with success and prosperity which your energy and worth truly merit. Until my present work is ended and I again join you in the newspaper world, I bid you a fond farewell."

SUIT FOR ROAD TAX

An action was filed in Justice of the Peace E. D. Horgan's court yesterday by Deputy District Attorney Chas. McNary, upon complaint of S. Stewart, supervisor of road district No. 27, against John D. Osdal, an employee of the Capital Ice works, to collect his road and poll tax for the year 1901, amounting to \$2. The road supervisor and complaining witness, S. Stewart, alleges that he demanded payment of the tax of Van Osdal, on July 2, 1902, but that the latter refused to pay it and continues to refuse.

The defendant, upon receiving the summons, appeared in court yesterday afternoon and signified his intention of making a settlement without going to trial. Mrs. Margaret Beck, proprietress of the Ice Works, and Van Osdal's employer, was garnished for the amount owed. C. L. McNary, deputy district attorney, stated last evening that a number of complaints had been made to him by different road supervisors of quite a number of refusals to pay the road and poll tax and that the law was very clear and strong upon this point, each case would be brought into court in the near future.
