Paris Excited Over the Death
of Mr. and Mrs. Fair

IMPRUDENCE THE CAUSE

Speed Madness of Charles
Fair Resulted in the
Fatality

A FIGHT OVER THE MILLIONS
LEFT BY THE DECEASED COUPLE
WILL BEGIN AT ONCE—
WHICH OF THE TWO DIED
FIRST?

PARIS, Aug. 15.—The fatal accident to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Fair is the sensation of the city, and the leading topic of conversation among the American residents and in automobile circles.

The manager of the firm which sold Mr. Fair the automobile in which he met his death declared today, that he warned Mr. Fair that he was too imprudent. He said Mr. Fair had speed madness, and had met with an accident last June when he collided with another automobile in Paris, but luckily no one was killed.

The Fair Fortune.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15.—The terrible and sudden death of Charles Fair and his wife by the collapse of their automobile, near Devereaux, yesterday means a great loss to San Francisco.

Just before his departure for Europe in May last, Charles Fair had practically completed plans for \$5,000,000 worth of improvements to the Fair property in this city, and it was his intention on his return from his sojourn in Europe to sign contracts for the work in contemplation.

The matter of the disposition of the estates of the dead millionaire and his wife has given rise to some little speculation as to what will become of Charles Fair's portion of his dead father's immense holdings. It is a known fact that a very short time ago both Mr. and Mrs. Fair made wills disposing of their separate holdings and the community property, but just what the documents provide for Messrs. Knight and Heggerty, the attorneys for the Charles Fair estates, do not feel at liberty to make public at this time. Mrs. Fair was possessed of property to the value of \$350,000, and it is understood that her will bequeaths her holding to relatives in New Jersey, but in event of evidence being adduced that Charles Fair succumbed to his injuries first, Mrs. Fair's interest in the community property will naturally revert to her heirs, and it is this point on which the disposition of the millionaire's estate largely hangs.

It has become known that at a late hour last night the public administrator applied for letters of administration in the estate of Charles Fair and his wife. Judge Carroll Cook has not as yet granted the application of the public administrator, preferring to delay matters until proof of death has been received in this city. This delay will give the Fair attorneys an opportunity to prepare papers countering the plea of the public administrator. The matter will come up for hearing in Judge Cook's court tomorrow.

Mrs. Fair's Will.

San Francisco, Aug. 15.—Attorney Chas. J. Heggerty tonight announced that he had found the last will of Mrs. Charles L. Fair in a safe deposit vault. He refused to make known the contents of the document. "This is the will by which it is presumed she left legacies to her mother, brothers, and sisters, aggregating \$250,000 to \$400,000. In Knight & Heggerty's custody, there is the will of Charles L. Fair. If the public administrator does not interfere, the wills will not be filed until after the funeral."

THE OREGON EDITORS

MEET BY THE SEASIDE IN ANNUAL CONVENTION—INTERESTING ADDRESSES.

NEWPORT, Aug. 15.—The Sixteenth Annual Session of the Oregon Editorial Association was called to order here this morning by President F. S. Harding. Some thirty editors were present from various sections of the state. The order of business at today's session consisted of the address of the president, report of the secretary, an able paper by George H. Himes, giving the history of the first newspapers of the state, and an address by Mrs. Edith Wethered.

The president and secretary each endorsed the matter of urging along the Lewis and Clark Centennial, and all present pledged their support toward the coming great fair. There will also be a business meeting tomorrow morning, followed by an address by Judge M. L. Pipes.

MEXICAN TOWN IS IMMERSSED

A Tidal Wave Washes Away
the City of Atlatla

ON THE PACIFIC COAST

Fifty Lives are Lost and Much
Property Destroyed

OTHER TOWNS WERE ENTIRELY
SWEEP AWAY AND THE LOSS OF
LIFE IS VERY HEAVY—THE WAR
IN CENTRAL AMERICA—REBELS
CAPTURE A GUNBOAT.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 15.—A special to the Globe Democrat, from Austin, Tex., says a dispatch from Culiacan, Mexico, reports that the lower portion of the city of Atlatla, on the Pacific coast, just west of Culiacan, has been completely destroyed by a tidal wave, and not less than fifty are known to have been drowned. The property loss is heavy. It is reported that several smaller coast towns, situated above Atlatla were completely washed away by the same tidal wave, and that the loss of life in the smaller places is very heavy. Relief for the sufferers will be sent from Culiacan.

Rebels Capture Gunboat.

San Jose, Costa Rica, Aug. 15.—The news has reached here from the camp of the Colombian revolutionists in Aguadulce district, that after a naval engagement the Colombian Government gunboat Boyaca was captured by the revolutionists. Three hundred Government soldiers and Generals Ortiz and Henao were captured with the Boyaca.

The Marietta Reports.

Washington, Aug. 15.—The only information from Venezuela, received by the authorities today, was that contained in a cablegram from Commander Rodgers, of the Marietta, announcing his arrival at La Guyana.

OFFICERS ARE CHARGED

WITH SHANGHAING MEN AND
BOYS FROM NEW YORK—
BIG STORY SWORN TO.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Thirty-two men and boys have made affidavit that they were taken from this city a week ago by a detective for one of the railroad lines and in a locked car were sent to Pittston, Pa., where they were compelled to work in the coal mines. Two of the men, who swear they were shanghaied, made their escape and are back in this city. They are David Altman and Frank Pelt, butchers. They tell in affidavits furnished to the World how they were lured to Pittston, how their car was attacked by strikers, how they were fired upon and how they finally were rescued by an armed band and brought to a shed near the coal mine.

None of them was told, according to the affidavit, that he was wanted to take the place of a striking miner. When the men asked if there was not a strike on where they were going to, they were told by the detective whom they knew as the "agent," that there was no strike, but that they were wanted to build a new railway.

IT IS TOO DISASTROUS

TEAMSTERS AND THEIR EMPLOYERS
IN CHICAGO WANT NO
MORE STRIKES.

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—Teamsters and their employers, in separate meetings last night, decided to abolish the sympathetic strike from the teaming industry. The employers, at a downtown hotel, combined to fight the sympathetic strike, and the teamsters, at headquarters, agreed that in the future such action could not be taken unless sanctioned by a two-thirds vote of the joint executive committee of all the locals.

The disastrous results of the recent strike by the freight handlers and packing-house teamsters brought both parties to a realization of the evils of a sympathetic strike.

RACE ENTRIES CLOSE.

EVERETT, Wash., Aug. 15.—The Snohomish County Agricultural Association is closing its entries for the races September 9th, 10th and 11th. The entries include many Oregon, California, Idaho and Colorado horses.

OUTBREAK AT SHENANDOAH

Troops Called Out in the Coal
Strike Regions.

TO SUPPRESS RIOTING MOB

An Alleged Unfair Workman
Pursued by the
Strikers

IT IS ANNOUNCED THAT OPERATIONS IN THE ANTHRACITE REGIONS WILL BE RESUMED BY SEPTEMBER 1ST— CONCESSIONS WILL BE MADE.

SHENANDOAH, Pa., Aug. 15.—There was an outbreak tonight right under the nose of the troops, and for a time it looked as if serious trouble would occur. The disorder was the result of a mob chasing an alleged unfair workman. The night watchman of a washery, named Flynn, tried to rescue the man. The watchman was thrown into the creek. In nine minutes the troops were on the scene. The participants in the assault on the watchman were arrested. All is now quiet.

Mitchell Goes West.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Aug. 15.—All was quiet at the Warnock washery today. President Mitchell will leave tomorrow for the West. He will go to Atlantic City and from there to Illinois.

A committee from the Public Alliance will go to Atlantic City Monday, to request Senator Quay to use his influence with the operators, to bring about arbitration.

Will Compromise.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 15.—Major John Biddle, Engineer Commissioner of the District of Columbia, tonight said the agent of the anthracite operators in Washington quietly told dealers there to prepare for shipments of anthracite coal after September 1st, adding that the mines will be in operation. The understanding is that the operators will make concessions, and the miners also will make sacrifice.

A Race War.

Houston, Tex., Aug. 15.—Eleven white men are in jail here, as the result of a battle between the whites and negroes at the Southern Creosote Works. The casualties are: Nelson Randall, colored, killed; Bill Anderson, colored, dangerously wounded; William Hamilton, white, perhaps fatally wounded; unknown negro, shot in the leg.

TO BECOME AMERICANS

RELIGIOUS ORDERS EXPELLED
FROM FRANCE PLEAD TO BE
SENT HERE.

ROME, Aug. 15.—Members of religious orders expelled from France, especially sisters are applying to the Vatican authorities for permission to settle in the United States. Several of them have come to Rome personally for the purpose of urging their requests. A reply has been sent to them pointing out that there are no vacancies in the United States, and besides, calling attention to the difficulty arising from the fact that the expelled sisters do not speak the English language. Canada has been suggested as a better field, as sisters are comparatively scarce there, and because French is spoken in a large part of the Dominion. The applicants, however, did not take kindly to the suggestion and persist in their requests to go to the United States.

KILLED HER HUSBAND

AND THE MAN FOR WHOM SHE
DID IT TELLS OF THE
CONSPIRACY.

DES MOINES, Ia., Aug. 15.—A special from Iowa City states that Charles Holaday has made a confession in which he states that James Gaullagher was murdered by Mrs. Gaullagher, with his complicity, and that the crime was committed because he and Mrs. Gaullagher were in love. Gaullagher was a wealthy stockman. Four months ago he was murdered at midnight while sleeping by the side of his wife and child. The assassin sending a bullet from a target rifle through Gaullagher's head.

Holaday declares they planned to poison Gaullagher and that while he was present at the house the night of the murder he left hours before and had no hand in the shooting.

A SURVEYING PARTY

WILL GO TO ALASKA AND INVESTIGATE WRANGLER NARROWS—DREDGING NEEDED.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 15.—Major Mills will send a surveying party to Alaska to report on the work needed on Wrangler Narrows. The Narrows is twenty-one miles long. The surveying party will make soundings for the entire distance, and bore the bottom to see the nature of the dredging machinery necessary.

INCREASE IN INSANITY

EPIDEMIC OF MENTAL DERANGEMENTS NOT UNDERSTOOD BY PHYSICIANS.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—In the last three days 32 persons suffering from mental derangement were admitted to the Bellevue Hospital insane pavilion. The usual daily average is less than three. The physicians are unable to account for the increase. They say that so far this summer there has been

no weather hot enough to send the average above the normal point. They also are puzzled by the fact that 21 of the 32 patients are women, and the further fact that few of these admitted are alcoholic patients.

On Tuesday the first signs of the increase were manifest. Some of the persons received were taken from the police courts. A few were admitted of their own volition, and others were admitted on permits issued by the superintendent of the outdoor poor. It is a remarkable fact that the majority of the patients are unusually violent, and the attendants have had practically no rest for three nights.

PREFERRED WHIPPING

TWIN SONS OF PROMINENT WISCONSIN PEOPLE RECEIVED TWENTY-ONE LASHES.

WEST SUPERIOR, Wis., Aug. 15.—"Twenty-one lashes across the back," is the sentence that has been imposed by Judge Bailey in the municipal court upon twin boys 13 years of age, who were before him on a charge of burglary. The boys were Robert and John Scott, sons of prominent people of this city, and it is alleged that they have committed a large number of burglaries during the past summer. Judge Bailey gave them the option of a reform school sentence or a whipping, and they chose the latter. The sentence of the court was carried out, a janitor wielding the rawhide.

PETER POWER'S SUIT

THE HEARING BEFORE THE SPECIAL EXAMINER CONTINUED—OTHER ACTIONS.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—The hearing before Special Examiner Mabe in the suit of Peter Power against the Northern Pacific Railway directors to prevent them from turning over the stock of the company to the Northern Securities Company, was continued today. Little attention was paid to the Power suit, however, most of the day being devoted to an inquiry into the means whereby the plaintiffs were provided in similar actions against the Northern Pacific Railway, one of constituent companies in the Northern Securities Company, which actions were based on the holdings of Mrs. Elsworth Ives Chapman and Wilton F. Boudoin.

REPUBLICANS IN TACOMA

MEET AND INDORSE ROOSEVELT'S ADMINISTRATION—A TICKET NOMINATED.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 15.—The Pierce County Convention, Republican, met today. They commend Roosevelt's administration, and endorse Senator Foster and Representatives Cushman and Jones. The convention declared in favor of an elective Railroad Commission. The following legislative ticket was nominated: Senators—E. S. Hamilton and Dr. L. M. LeClerc. Representatives—J. H. Corliss, Dr. Roberts, N. B. McNichol, S. A. Crandall, W. H. Fletcher, J. B. Linger, E. R. York and Mark White.

PRINTERS NOT SOCIALISTS

TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION VOTES DOWN POLITICAL IDEALISM AT CONVENTION.

CINCINNATI, O., Aug. 15.—The International Typographical Union in session here, has disposed of over 300 propositions for changes in its laws. Among the resolutions defeated were those relating to political idealism. The spirit of the convention was most emphatically shown in the adoption of the resolution against socialism. The organization of the International Ladies' Auxiliary was endorsed.

A PRETTY SWIFT STREAM

MEASUREMENTS OF THE FLOW OF WATER IN THE ARKANSAS RIVER MADE.

ARKANSAS CITY, Kans., Aug. 15.—Professor Carpenter and two assistants from the Agricultural College of Colorado are making measurements of the Arkansas river, to be used in compiling a report for the use of the Colorado authorities in the trial of the suit, brought against the state by the Attorney General of Kansas to prevent Colorado irrigationists from using water in the Arkansas river. The measurements taken here show the flow of about 30,000 cubic feet per second.

IS NOT A CANDIDATE

FORAKER WILL NOT RUN FOR VICE PRESIDENT—NOTHING IN THE RUMOR.

TOLEDO, O., Aug. 15.—A representative of the Associated Press asked Senator Foraker tonight, regarding the story recently sent out from Washington that he was to be the Republican candidate for the Vice Presidency with President Roosevelt, in 1944. The Senator replied that there was nothing in the rumor so far as he was concerned.

He does a cash business. He neither buys on time nor sells on time. Ledger, journals, day-books, bookkeepers, bill collectors, and all the modern paraphernalia of credit drug stores, are unknown in his business, hence a full stock and correct prices.
