

KLONDIKE'S GOLDEN STAR

Is Waning Rapidly, According to an Official Report

GOLD OUTPUT DECREASING

This Year's Production Only Half of the Preceding Season

THERE ARE TEN MEN FOR EVERY JOB IN DAWSON CITY, AND BOAT LOADS OF MEN CONSTANTLY ARRIVING—NO NEW GOLD-PRODUCING CREEKS.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—The golden star of the Klondike is on the wane, according to the official report of Geo. Hees, who recently was sent to Dawson by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, to make a thorough examination into the business prospects of the Yukon territory. The State Department today made public a communication from United States Consul Frush, at Niagara Falls, dated August 5th, giving some of the principal features of Hees' report. Hees points to the fact that the total yield of the Klondike last year was \$247,000,000, and with the production of the coming year will not, according to a Government estimate exceeds \$147,000,000, a falling off of nearly one-half. Moreover, no new discoveries have been made for over a year, although since 1897 thousands of prospectors have been exploring every creek and mountain in the country. At Dawson Hees reports there are ten applicants for every job, yet boat load after boat load of men continue to arrive.

Lovell, brought on an appeal from the Circuit Court of the United States for the district of Colorado, held that the Colorado statute of limitation is void, and in violation of the constitution of the United States.

A VICIOUS KANGAROO

A VILLAGE CAPTURED

THE WAR IN HAITI CLAIMS MANY VICTIMS—TOWN DESTROYED BY FIRE. CAPE HAITIEN, Aug. 26.—The village of Limbe, eighty-two miles north of Port au Prince, has been attacked and recaptured by the troops of the provisional government. Limbe was in possession of the Firminite soldiers from the Artibonite district. The fighting was severe and lasted from midnight last night to midday today. Many men on both sides were killed. The town was destroyed by fire.

ROOSEVELT IS IN MAINE

Wonderful Outpouring of People to See Him

HE MADE EIGHT SPEECHES

And Traveled Through Three States During Yesterday

THE POLICE POWERLESS TO KEEP BACK THE CROWDS WHO WERE ANXIOUS TO MEET THE PRESIDENT ON HIS VISIT AMONG THEM.

AUGUSTA, Me., Aug. 26.—President Roosevelt today passed through three states, delivered eight speeches, and received the plaudits of a million people. The greeting which has marked his progress through New England has been flattering in the extreme, and today's experience demonstrated his popularity perhaps more than ever before. Everywhere at the regular stops and the smaller stations along the road the people were strenuous in their efforts to catch a glimpse of him or to hear him speak, and at Haverhill, Mass., this desire assumed such form that the crowds completely overrode the police and surrounded the President's carriage, making it difficult for it to advance.

The day's journey was not without its incidents. As the President was about to board his car at South Lawrence, Mass., after delivering his address, the leader of the band stepped up to him and made himself known to him. His name was Bannan, a former cow-puncher and barber at Madona, N. D.; where the President's ranch is located. The President immediately recognized him, and greeted him as an old friend. The man, evidently desiring the President to know that he had profited by his advice, given some years ago said to him, "You told me to get married and settle down, and I did. I have got six children myself," which afforded the President no little amusement.

Conspicuous among those who boarded the train at Old Orchard to extend a welcome to the President was Congressman Littlefield, of Rockland. His visit was brief and the conversation turned on other subjects than the trusts. Some stops were made which were not on the day's program. At Lisbon, Lisbon Falls, and Brunswick, Me., an immense crowd gathered and the President in response to their clamorous calls was obliged to appear on the rear platform and say a few words.

THE KING OF ITALY

ON HIS WAY TO VISIT THE GERMAN EMPEROR—AN ANARCHIST PLOT.

GESCHENEN, Switzerland, Aug. 26.—The King of Italy and his suite arrived here this evening. The King was welcomed to Switzerland by President Zemp, of that country, and the Federal Councilors. After an exchange of courtesies the King's train proceeded for Berlin.

The Platform Adopted Endorses Pres. Roosevelt

THE FIGHT ON GOVERNOR

Was Not Settled When Adjournment Was Taken

GAGE LED IN THE BALLOTING BUT NO CHOICE WAS MADE—FIVE CANDIDATES IN THE FIELD FOR THE POSITION OF EXECUTIVE.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 26.—The Republican State Convention reassembled this morning, and after the presentation of committee reports adopted a platform. It was quickly noted by the followers of Governor Gage, that the platform failed to endorse the state administration, and a warm debate followed, it being declared that the omission was for the purpose of prejudicing the cause of Governor Gage, who is a candidate for re-nomination. The matter was finally compromised by the adoption of a resolution endorsing all state officials.

ALIEN PASSENGERS

OFFICIALS TRYING TO RELIEVE THEM FROM CUSTOMARY OBNOXIOUS QUESTIONS.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—In order to relieve as much as possible alien passengers on steamships coming from foreign countries from annoyance by obnoxious questions and to declare to the steamship companies his policy in enforcing immigration laws, Commissioner Williams of the Bureau of Immigration, has sent to the offices of the steamship companies a circular regarding the subject, in which he suggests that the I.E.T. does not prescribe the questions which are to be asked the aliens; only that the information required should be given in the manifest.
