"I have revoked warrant of arrest for C. L. Fay, signed by me in obedience togyour requisition papers. Unimpeachable evidence convinces me Fay is not a fugitive from justice from your state or any other. He has been, a resident of Oregon and not in Wisconsin for over six years. The dignity of the States of Oregon and Wisconsin have been imposed upon by false affidavits. If consistent with your ideas of executive power, please request Fred Hess; sheriff of Waupaca county, of your state, to release Fay. 

"The lives and property of the citizens of the state are placed in jeppardy when an outlaw is at large and those who seek to capture or apprehend and restrain him, often do so at the risk of life or limb. The offering of a reward is for the purpose of inducing persons to take those risks which are greatly. increased when the outlaw is known to be a desperate man and well armed, and the amount of the reward is governed largely by the character of the prisoner and the manner in which his escape has been effected; hence, in ascertaining whether a claimant has carned the reward it must be shown, conclusively that the claimant apprehended the prisoner in accordance with the provisions of law and offer of reward.

"The object for the reward for the 'capture and return, dead or alive, of Tracy and Merrill' was to secure their capture and return; or any one of them, to the Oregon State Penitentiary, and if, in securing their return, it became necessary to take life, the persons assuming the risk and responsibility of capture should not be deprived of their reward, so the offer specified the amount should be paid for the capture and return, 'dead or alive.'

"The 'capture' and 'return,' or appreshension and return are both conditions for forty years.
