Rural Delivery from Salem Postoffice Is a Success

NINE ROUTES RUNNING OUT OF SALEM AND THE ARRANGE-TORY ONE-THE ROUTES AND ery building. THE SEVERAL CARRIERS.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

The Rural Free Delivery service from the Salem postoffice, established on April 8, 1901, has been a success from the start, and is now a paying institution, and one of the most popular branches of the mail service in this section. Eight routes were originally established, and to this, on September ist, this year, was added another, thus making the service from the Salem office the most extensive and extended west of the Rocky Mountains, and probably the equal of that of any city in the United States.

Following are the nine routes running out of Salem, traversed by the carriers daily, together with the name of the carrier on each route, and the distance travelled:

Route No. 1, James A. Remington, carrier-Beginning at the postoffice in Salem; thence west across the river over the Wallace road to Lincoln; thence north to the forks of the road; thence west of south passing the Spring Valley school house to Zena; thence southeast, passing Brush College back to Salem. Total length of route, 24 miles.

Route No. 2, W. H. Squires, carrier-Beginning at the postoffice in Salem; thence across the river through West Salem: thence west up the river, passing Eola to Rickreall; thence north on the Portland and Corvallis road to the intersection of the Oak Grove road; returning to Salem by the Oak Grove road. Total length of route, 23 miles. (Route No. 3, Chas. B. Allen, carrier-Beginning at the postoffice in Salem; thence south on Commercial street, past cemeteries to Liberty, extending southwest to the school house opposite Buena Vista; thence back by way of Hall's Ferry road to Salem. Total

length of route, 23 miles. Route No. 4. Percy Pugh, carrier-Beginning at the postoffice in Salem; thence south on Commercial street; thence over the old stage road to Hatch's corner; thence west to the Buena Vista road; thence south through the Sunnyside country to Hope chapel; thence west to near Virta foad; thence southwest to school house; thence east through Rosedale to Sunnyside school house; thence north to Hatch's corner; thence east to sistant. Pringle school house and back to Salem by way of the Pringle road. Total length of route, 23 miles.

Route No. 5, James S. Albert, carrier Beginning at the postoffice in Salem; thence out on the Turner road to E. C. Cross' slaughter house; thence across the railroad track to the Peebles' neighborhood; east to Mill Creek and Reform School; thence past the Deaf Mute School and Asylum cottages; thence through the Witzel neighborhood; thence north to the Early place west of Macleay; thence west past the Rickey school house southwest to the Estes place; thence to the Turner road and back on the Turner road to Salem. Total length of route, 23 miles.

Route No. 6, Hiram A. Johnson, Jr., carrier-Beginning at the postoffice at Salem; thence east over State street; thence east over the South Howell prairie road to Eoff's corner; thence north to school house; thence west over the Fruitland and Asylum avenue road to Salem. Total length of route,

19 miles. Route No. 7, W. F. Osburn, carrier-Beginning at the postoffice in Salem; thence through Englewood addition over Garden road to Chapman's corner; thence north to the Silverton road; thence east over the Silverton road to three-quarters of a mile west of Howell; thence south one and one-half miles to a point near southeast corner section 11; thence east to the residences of A. I. Ask and C. Graber: thence south past residences Chas. Janey and Chris Anderson; thence west past the residence of K. Jensen: thence south to residence of T. C. James on the Salem and Pratum road; thence west on the Pratum road to the Garden road to Chapman's corner; thence west to the Lee Mission cemetery road; thence west to postoffice. Total length of

route, 23 miles, Route No. 8, F. L. What County Road Master W. J. Culver Has to Say

REGARDING THE ROAD FROM SA-SPRING BY THE COUNTY AND FORMERS LIVING ALONG THAT HIGHWAY.

(From Wednesday's Daily.) An Oregonian correspondent from Salem, in writing to his paper concerning the movement for good roads in Marion county, refers to the crushed rock road leading from the Liberty neighborhood to the southern suburbs of the Capital City, built under the direction of W. J. Culver, county engineer. Mr. Culver says among other things that preparations are now being made to resume the construction of good roads in Marion county the Wm. F. "The outlook for better roads in Marion county is good. The county having been put in good financial condition, the county court has turned its attention to road improvement, and has been doing all in a business-like way in a permanent way the roads of the ed, as it indicated by the liberal manner in which the farmers contribute work and subscribe money to help the improvement in their respective local-

"It has been the policy of the court to do away with as much unnecessary bridging as possible. As such bridges become worn out, they are removed the undersigned citizens of Lincoln and fills made and graveled. Bridges if necessary length are built, and frequently 200 or 300 feet of bridging are replaced with a fill at one place. Althat we be allowed an opportunity to has been replaced in the last, three years.

"The fact that much more heavy hauling is now being done in the winter time is calling attention to the fact that the roads leading into the towns and the market places must have some kind of metal surfacing. Through the prairie sections of Marion county the soil makes a good road for ordinary Informer and Assistant, travel, when the roadbed is properly the people residing in the neighborgraded and drained, but the heavy winter travel, which is constantly increasing on the main roads, ruins the dirt roads, even with the best of care. Of late years this fact has been generally recognized, and in districts where has been used in placing gravel on the roads. The limited amount of this character of work has been confined to the worst localities, and is not general over the county. By following this plan, however, for a number of years the result is seen in many long stretches of well gravelled roads.

After a reference to the work that has just been finished in the Liberty district, south of this city, Mr. Culver continued as follows:

"In other sections of the county the people have taken hold of the subject of good roads in earnest. The Gervais Good Roads Association joined with the county authorities this spring and over \$1000 was spent in that road district alone in grading, draining and gravelling the roads, the greater part of this amount having been donated by the people who were benefited. The people of Mount Angel have also done a large amount of volunteer work. In one place this spring they built over one-half mile of permanent rock road. First large stones were placed down by hand, and then covered with crushed The county was to an expense of only \$90 in doing this work. Many other localities have done good work I have no doubt but what the people will continue to assist the court in this work. Although our road tax is low, there is a noticeable advancement in Marion county."

ARDONED BY THE GOVERNOR

oner Was Released Yesterday

WAS SENT TO THE PENITENTIARY FOR THE MURDER OF HIS WIFE ABOUT SEVEN YEARS AGO-LEFT FOR MINNESOTA LAST EVENING.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

Gov. T. T. Geer yesterday afternoon granted a full pardon to Wm. F. Beckman, a prisoner serving a life sentence for the murder of his wife, in Douglas county in 1895.

Beckman, who was an old man, a veteran of the Civil War, came to Douglas county in the early 90s, and bought property there. A woman who had known him in Minnesota followed him and finally induced him to marry her, after which she and her grown son by a former marriage began to mistreat the old man, would not allow him to sleep in the house and made life a burden to him, even threatening him with most a mile of this class of bridge work death. One day he entered the house and going to a kitchen safe, helped himself to provisions, when the wife and stepson both threatened him with death, and he turned and shot the woman, from the effects of which she died, He was tried, convicted, and sent to the Penitentiary for life.
