TULLI MURRI MURDEHED HIS BROTHER-IN-LAW, COUNT BON MARTINI.

ROME, Sept. 13 .- A tremendous sensation has been caused in Italy by the latest developments to the murder of Count Bon Martini, who some days ago was found assassinated in his house at Bologna. A large sum of money had been stolen from the house, and robery was thought to have been the motive for the crime. Professor Murri, one of the best known physicians in Italy, was Count Martini's father-in-law. Professor Murri has denounced his own son, Tulli, as the murderer of

the Count. Tulli Murri is a well known Socialist and lawyer of Bologna. He admits having murdered his brother-in-law and says the crime was committed after a brawl provoked by a family quarrel. Other reports say that a love affair is at the bottom of the mystery. Count Martini lived apart from Tulfi Murri has written his father from Servia, saying he committed the murder to avenge the ill-usage of his sister. The police are unable to touch the murderer, as he cannot be extradited from Servia.
