

# THE WEATHER AND CROPS

## Last Weekly Bulletin for the Season Has Been Issued

THE CONDITIONS THROUGHOUT THE STATE ARE REPORTED VERY SATISFACTORILY—PRUNE DRYING IN ACTIVE PROGRESS WITH VALUABLE YIELDS

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

The last weekly crop and weather bulletin for the season has been issued by the Oregon section of the Weather Bureau, at Portland. These bulletins are issued weekly by the Department of Agriculture during the spring and summer, for the benefit of the farmers, until such time when the staple crops of the season are safe or harvested, when the issuance of the bulletin ceases. The last one issued, for the week ending Monday evening last, is to hand, and its general summary shows very satisfactory conditions throughout the major portion of the state. The general summary of conditions, as shown by the bulletin, is as follows:

The past week was cool with several good rains in the Western section of the state. In the Eastern section the rainfall was light and badly distributed. Frosts occurred on several mornings, but they did no injury of consequence.

The grain crop is being rapidly hauled to the warehouses and it is now practically all threshed. Hop picking is finished and the crop, although lighter than expected earlier in the season, is a good one, and of excellent quality. Prune drying is in active progress, with valuable yields, which are generally reported as light.

The rains have started a new growth of grass and fall pasture is rapidly improving. Range stock, as a rule, are not in as good condition as usual at this season of the year. Potato digging has begun and the tubers, while not large and generally of good quality; the yield will be below the average. Late potatoes have been greatly benefited by the recent rains. Corn and apples are the principal crops yet to be harvested.

Corn was injured by the frosts of last week, but this week the weather was more favorable and it is probable very nearly an average crop will be secured. More rain is needed for fall plowing and for fall seeding on summer-fallowed land.

### Coast District.

Trask, Tillamook County, F. J. Gohar—Recent rains have greatly helped pasture. No frost. Late vegetables growing nicely. Evergreen blackberries are ripening and will be a large yield. Late plums and prunes ripening.

Johnson, Lincoln County, G. S. Parmelee—The rain last Thursday night started the grass and helped pastures. Beckley, Curry County, Jos. Haines—Rain Friday cleared away the smoke and put a check to the forest fires; rain came too late to benefit late potatoes very much.

Goble, Columbia County, Frank Welzer—Week showery and windy; rain benefited range and potatoes and softened the ground for plowing; apples ripening; good quality, no worms.

### Willamette Valley.

Aurora, Marion County, C. D. F. Wilson—Crops are all under cover, except potatoes and fruit; prune drying is in progress; Italian prunes are good in this vicinity; hop baling is well along, the crop is weighing light for the box measure. Plowing for fall crops begun. Winter apples not picked yet.

Crawfordsville, Linn County, C. H. Anderson—Frequent showers during the week; prune drying in full progress; late cabbage looks well; potatoes below average; pastures beginning to start; some fall seeding has been done.

Sherwood, Washington County, J. M. Crawford—We had two fine showers this week; more needed to revive the pastures; a good crop of hops of excellent quality has been gathered; prune drying is in active progress. The rain came too late to benefit late potatoes; crop will be below average. No fall seeding yet.

### Southern Oregon.

Kerby, Josephine County, A. Morrison—Grain all threshed; corn ripening; potatoes ready for harvesting; range dry; stock not in as fine order as two months ago.

Glendale, Douglas County, Mrs. Fannie Miller—Threshing over and farm work about completed for this season; wheat and other grains being shipped to Portland; frost at night; foggy mornings; heavy showers all day the 24th; smoke cleared and atmosphere cool and pleasant; prune picking in progress, quality good.

Buncom, Jackson County, J. Parks—Corn generally all housed, with the exception of beans; potatoes are good but crop is not large; stock looks well; range very dry.

### Columbia River Valley.

Froewater, Umatilla County, Fred Freudling—Fore part of week warm, but nights cool; harvest and haying completed; fruit is all harvested, with the exception of winter apples, which will soon begin to be picked. Some rain fell Sunday.

Enderbury, Wasco County, G. W. Fligg—The past week has been favorable for all work; threshing is practically finished, and a large portion of the grain is in the warehouses. Fall sowing is nearly finished, and the grain is coming up well; the ground is in fine condition, owing to two good rains during the last two weeks; potato digging is all under way and the yield is good; apples only half a crop.

### LOST THEIR LIVES.

ASTORIA, Sept. 30.—While trying to desert from the British ship Austrasia last night, two members of her crew lost their lives by drowning. The men were named Ferguson and Hudson respectively, and were shipped in Portland. Neither of the bodies has been recovered. The Austrasia is lying in the stream, and about 10 o'clock last night the men were seen to jump overboard. It was their intention to leave the vessel and swim ashore. A

boat was ordered lowered at once to pick up the men, and when it was being placed in the water one of them was seen swimming. By the time the boat was got under way, however, both men had disappeared from sight, and all efforts to get them were futile. A strong ebb tide was running at the time, and the water was bitterly cold.

## TO INCREASE EFFICIENCY

### Col. George O. Yorran of the Fourth Regiment National Guard

#### PROPOSES A CONTEST FOR A TROPHY BY THE MARKSMAN OF THE SEVERAL COMPANIES—RIFLE RANGES TO BE PUT TO ACTIVE USE.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

Col. George O. Yorran, of Eugene, in command of the Fourth Regiment, Oregon National Guard, who inspected Company F, of this city, on Monday evening, left yesterday afternoon for Woodburn, where he inspected the local company last night. Colonel Yorran is anxious for his regiment to excel in marksmanship, and while he is not desirous to make particularly fine "show" soldiers, he is anxious to place the entire organization in condition to be effective, if called into the field for active duty, and his experience in the Philippines has taught him that the most important thing in this regard is good marksmanship. For this reason he is arranging to have rifle practice in every company in the regiment and in order to create interest and secure participation on the part of the enlisted men of the several companies, he proposes to offer a trophy, to be contested for by teams from each company in the regiment.

Colonel Yorran's plan is a particularly good one, and one that will doubtless appeal to every member of the regiment. He proposes to charge an entrance fee for the contest, every company paying the fee for the organization. This money is then to be expended in securing the trophy to be shot for. Each company will put forward a rifle team to shoot for the trophy on behalf of the company, the shooting to be on the individual company's own rifle range, and competent and impartial judges will be provided at a time appointed by the company for the shoot, to keep the score of the contest. This will admit of each company in the regiment putting forth its best efforts, and participating in the contest for the trophy at a minimum cost, as there will be no expense for traveling to the scene of the contest, for, as stated above, each company will do its work on the home rifle range. The plan is meeting with the enthusiastic support and approval of the members of the regiment wherever it has been announced, and Colonel Yorran is pleased with the outlook, and satisfied that it will result in bringing the efficiency of the entire organization to the highest standard possible. More officers like Colonel Yorran, who take an interest in the militia and put forth their best endeavors to increase the efficiency of the troops, would be of vast benefit to the military forces of the state, and would make the militia of Oregon the best in the country.

## CAMPAIGN OF THE GOVERNOR

### For the United States Senatorship Has Been Opened

#### IN A LETTER TO MEMBERS OF THE OREGON LEGISLATURE MR. GEER EXPLAINS HIS CANDIDACY AND MAKES A "BIG HIT."

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

Gov. T. T. Geer has issued a circular letter to members of the Legislative Assembly, calling attention to his candidacy for the United States Senatorship, and giving in detail the steps that were taken to the present time to make him the candidate. He shows that the Mays law for voting for candidates for the United States Senatorship, was complied with in every respect, and that the vote, taken under that act, resulted in his overwhelming nomination by the people, as against the only opponent appearing on the ticket—the Democratic candidate. He shows plainly that his course was in due compliance with law, that he was endorsed by the people, and discusses at length the flings of his opponents, which have been directed toward him.

A portion of the letter issued by the Governor was published in the Oregonian of yesterday, preceded by nearly two columns of a pretended analysis and fault-finding. But the last end of the letter is not there. In it the Governor sums up conditions as they are, as follows:

"Every question involved in the primary contest in the spring, in the State Convention later, and in the campaign following, including my relation to it what I did or did not do, was passed upon by the individual voters of the state on election day and certainly should be binding on each of their representatives. With due respect, allow me to suggest that perhaps in no state in the Union for a hundred years can another instance be found where any man has assumed the right to 'interpret' or 'construe' what the people meant when they expressed themselves at the ballot box. What individual has the right to sit in judgment on the deliberate expression of 45,000 of his fellow men and to say that they intended this or that, as his own interests or prearranged plans may direct? And if he has such right, where did he get it?"

"There is scarcely a Republican county in the state that did not this year elect one or more Democrats to important positions. If there should be any man who thinks so disrespectfully of the people as to assume that they voted for me when they did not want to endorse me, simply because my name 'was on the ticket' that is to say, 'mechanically' it is quite pertinent to inquire why the same listlessness or incompetency did not lead them to elect every man on the Republican ticket all the way down? Or, were they asleep when they voted a part of the state and county tickets and very much awake when they voted other parts, and in their confusion let Democratic sheriffs and clerks, in without knowing what they were doing?"

## WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY

### Receives the Loyal Support of the Methodist Conference

#### PRESIDING ELDER D. A. WATTERS AND REV. DR. JOHN PARSONS RETURNED TO THEIR SALEM CHARGES—SENATOR BOOTH'S GIFT TO "OLD WILLAMETTE."

The Oregon Conference of the Methodist church at Grants Pass has adjourned, and the Salem members of that church, who attended the sessions, came back delighted with their experience and the results attained. In the first place, Rev. D. A. Watters was re-appointed Presiding Elder for the Salem District, and Rev. Dr. John Parsons was re-appointed pastor of the First M. E. church. What delighted the Salem people more than anything else, however, was the spirit of loyalty shown by the Conference to the Willamette University. By unanimous vote the members of the Conference pledged their support to this pioneer educational institution, and tendered their assistance in raising the funds necessary to pay off the debt. President John H. Coleman was given a cordial welcome to the Conference, and Sunday evening he delivered a powerful address before the members of the Conference.

The ministers agreed to invite President Coleman to each of their pulpits during the year, and to permit collections to be taken for the University. With this assistance President Coleman is satisfied the debt will be paid by January 1st.

Subscriptions were not asked for at the Conference, but they were received there, as in the case of State Senator R. A. Booth, of Eugene, who contributed \$10,000 of the Willamette University endowment fund, and \$1000 toward paying off the debt of the institution. This sum was gratefully received, and the management of the University is highly pleased with the result of the Conference.
