GOOD ROADS CONVENTION

County Judge John H. Scott Named on Committee

TO ARRANGE FOR THE MEETING AT PORTLAND WITH THE OFFICIALS FROM THE AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT DURING THIS MONTH.

(From Thursday's Daily.)
County Judge John H. Scott is in receipt of a letter from Chairman S. M. Mears, of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, notifying the Marion county judge of his appointment on the committee to arrange for the Good Roads Convention to be held in Portland this month. The committee will meet soon and complete arrangements, and ascertain whether or not the Good Roads train can be secured for the Portland meeting. The letter from Chairman Mears to Judge Scott, showing the personnel of the entire committee, is as follows:

Captain William Miley, of Aurora, the second commissioner, was absent, due to sickness. The court should have convened on Wednesday morning, but owing to the sickness of Captain Miley, and the enforced absence of Mr. Needham, a quorum was not in attendance, hence no session of the court.
