being normal yesterday. Upon the best information obtainable from dealers it is learned that the trade is not very active. Probabiny the bulk of the crop is now stored, and shipbing is under way. The Willamette Valley Packing Association yesterday sent out three carloads, destined to foreign markets. This Association, according to its report, has all the orders in that it can possibly fill for the next month. The price for Italians still runs at about 2 1-4c, while Petites range at a quarter less. Other dealers were consulted, but no material difference in quotations could be discovered.

Apples.

The apple market is duller than for several years. This is probably owing to the heavy crop in the apple growing districts of the Northwest. There is really no demand for apples, and the few buyers seem indifferent. It is rather early yet to gain absolutely reliable figures, as picking has only just commenced. There have been no sales or shipments worthy of mention, and local dealers are handling only a few of the choicest varieties. To sum up the whole situation, one can safely say there is very little demand and the market as a whole is exceedingly dull. Prime have fallen to 61/2c, holders not asking over that figure toward the close, and choice to fancy range from 7@8c, latter figure rather exceptional, though extra fancy would command more. For future de livery 6%c is about as low as makers will consider for this month's delivery and 61/2c for November delivery. Makers report much difficulty in getting coal and feel confident as regards the future market. Few sun-dried apples available; Southern sun-dried sliced are quoted nominally 465c, possibly 51/2c for fancy; buyers are offering 54 @54 for fancy sun-dried Western quarters in either barrels or bags, 4%44%cfor choice and 464%c for prime. No new chops available; futures worth \$2.20@2.25, with some asking more. Waste firm at \$1.60, some sales slightly higher, for spot or this month's delivery and \$1.50 for; November delivery; Western bags quoted 31.371/2@1.50 for prompt shipment. Raspberries weak, but all small fruits scarce and firm. California apricots' and peaches moving well and prunes firm at 71/2c for old 40s and 61/2 for 50s, with stock pretty well cleaned up; first new prunes are due and prices will probably rule easier.

DELIVERS THE ANNUAL OPENING ADDRESS AT THE UNI-VERSITY CHAPEL.

Bishop Earl Cranston, resident Bishop of the M. E. Church, in the Northwest, delivered the annual opening adtress of the Willamette University in the University Chapel yesterday afternoon before all of the students and faculties of the various colleges, the trustees and a number of visitors. Bishop Cranston spoke on the subject of "The Necessity For Christian Schools" and his address was most interesting and instructive throughout and held the undivided attention of his auditors, who were very generous in their dem-

onstrations of appreciation. The Bishop, in the beginning, gave an interesting comparison of a man to a machine which, to do useful work. must have a guiding power, and stated that "an unprincipled man with education is like an engine with a crazy engineer."
