

REPUBLICANS MAKE MATERIAL GAINS

Odell's Election Conceded by a Plurality of Over Twelve Thousand—New York Legislature Will Be Controlled by Republicans.

New York Returns Indefinite as to Other Offices—Democrats Are Dissatisfied and Threaten to Contest Election—Lane, of California, Also Charges Fraud and Does Baby Act—Republicans Control National House by Eighty-Five.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—The official figures on the vote for Governor vary but little from the official reports, according to the returns made to the executive at Albany by the several county clerks. The plurality for Odell, Republican, is 12,847. The returns of the vote for other state officers are so meagre that it is impossible to say if the Democrats have been more successful as regards minor offices than in the case of Governor. It is asserted that the Democratic nominee for Attorney General, Judge Gray, Democrat, Judge of the Court of Appeals, has defeated his Republican opponent. The State Legislature is controlled by the Republicans, insuring the return of Platt to the United States Senate.

Colonel Dunn's View.
New York, Nov. 5.—Colonel Dunn, Chairman of the Republican State Committee, when informed today of the report that the Democrats threatened to contest the election, said: "If they start anything of that kind, we will give them all the contest they want right here in New York county, and they will wish they had never heard of a contest."

Strike No Influence.
New York, Nov. 5.—Senator Thomas C. Platt was asked today for a statement on the state election. He said: "We will have to be satisfied, though Odell's plurality is not near as large as I had expected."
Senator Platt said that in his opinion the trust question and the coal strike had nothing to do with the result of the vote. "The Democrats got together," he said, "and held together, and a few Republicans slipped over to them."

Washington, D. C.
Washington, Nov. 5.—The latest reports received up to 9:30 tonight, show that the Republicans (including three fusionists) elected from the Pittsburgh-Allegheny districts in Pennsylvania, will control the next House by a vote of 204 Republicans, to 123 Democrats, with one district, the Eighth Tennessee, and two California districts remaining so much in doubt that official returns will be needed to decide the result. The totals given are believed to be correct, although there are a few districts, such as two in Colorado and one in Minnesota, where the Republican and Democratic party managers, respectively, do not concede defeat, but the general result could not be affected even should the Democrats' claim prove well founded.

Spooner Will Return.
Washington, Nov. 5.—Postmaster General Payne today wired from Wisconsin, to H. C. Taylor, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, that the return of John C. Spooner to the United States Senate was a certainty.

Hanna Won't Talk.
Cleveland, O., Nov. 5.—Senator Hanna, Chairman of the Republican National Committee, when asked for a statement today on the election results, said: "The returns are thus far gratifying, but I do not care to discuss the general result until further and more definite information in some states is available."

Reno, Nev., the Winner.
RENO, Nevada, Nov. 5.—The entire Fusion state ticket has been elected with the exception of Bray, Superintendent of Schools, who was defeated by King, Sparks' majority for Governor will be fully 1,700.

From Montana.
Helena, Mont., Nov. 5.—The returns today indicate that Holloway, Republican, for Supreme Judge, will have 10,000 plurality, and Dixon Republican, for Congress, about 5,000. The Republicans will have a safe working majority in the House, but on joint ballot the Labor people will hold the balance of power. Of the new State Senators elected who will serve for four years and vote on the election of United States Senator in two years, the Republicans elect nine and the Democrats seven.

California.
San Francisco, Nov. 5.—Complete returns from San Francisco, and partial returns from all over the state, indicate that Geo. C. Pardee, Republican, for Governor, is elected by a majority of 2,000 to 3,000.

Lane Is Sore.
San Francisco, Nov. 5.—"There is no doubt that the majority of the people of California have cast their votes for Lane for Governor," said Franklin K. Lane to the Associated Press tonight. "Then what do you think of the situation at this hour (7:30 o'clock)?" he was asked.
"The result is undecided. There have been several suspicious facts in connection with the count, which lead me to believe that frauds have been committed. I have information that 1,200 votes cast for me were thrown out in Alameda county; 30 per cent of the Democratic vote in San Bernardino was threatened likewise, and that the totals in Humboldt and Los Angeles counties were withheld in order to ascertain what number of ballots in the count would be necessary to overcome the majority that San Francisco gave the head of the Democratic ticket."
"Then it is to be inferred, Mr. Lane,

that there will be a contest in the event that the returns show the election of Dr. Pardee?"
"Most assuredly there will be a contest," said Lane.

Rah for Nebraska.
Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 5.—Up to 5 o'clock tonight complete returns from more than half the counties show that Mickey's, Republican, plurality for Governor will not be less than 5,000. The Republican membership in the Legislature is the greatest for years. The combined vote of the Fusionists in the House and Senate will not exceed twenty-nine in a total membership of 123.

In Rhode Island.
Providence, R. I., Nov. 5.—Substantial gains for the Democrats are shown by complete returns for the state ticket. They elected their candidates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor and their Congressional candidate in the First district. The Republicans have a majority on joint allot in the Legislature.

To Defeat Teller.
Denver, Col., Nov. 5.—The Rocky Mountain News, United States Senator Patterson's morning paper, will tomorrow concede the election of Peabody, Republican, for Governor, and H. M. Hogg, Republican, for Congress. Peabody's majority over Stimson, Democrat, will amount to from 2,000 to 4,000, while that of Hogg will probably be greater. The entire Democratic state ticket is defeated with the possible exception of Mrs. Greenfell, for Superintendent of Public Institutions.
Both sides are claiming the election of Congressman in the First District, Adams, Democrat, for Congressman-at-Large, is thought to lead the state ticket, and may be elected, but the chances seem to favor the election of Brooks, Republican. On the face of the returns the Democrats will have a majority in the Legislature, but there are charges of fraud in this (Arapahoe) and other counties, and counts will be filed which, if successful, may defeat the re-election of Senator Henry M. Teller.

A Big Landslide.
Boise, Ida., Nov. 5.—The election yesterday proves to have been much more of a Republican landslide than the reports last night indicated. The Republican state ticket has carried the state by a majority close to 6,000. Burton L. French, for Congress, has a little larger majority. The Republicans have eighteen of the twenty-one members of the Senate, and thirty-five of the forty-six members of the House. This gives them a total of fifty-three on joint ballot, to fourteen for the Democrats. Republican aspirants for United States Senator are: W. E. Borah, of Boise; Judge D. W. Standrod, of Pocatello; W. B. Heyburn, of Wallace, and ex-Senator George L. Shoup.

Not Settled Yet.
Guthrie, O. T., Nov. 5.—Both the Republicans and Democrats are claiming the election of the Delegate to Congress from Oklahoma.

And Washington, Too.
Seattle, Nov. 5.—The state of Washington has gone Republican, so far as the returns now in show, by at least 12,000 majority for Supreme Court Justice and Congressmen. King county alone contributes between 4,000 and 5,000 to these majorities. The Legislature on joint ballot will stand at least 110 Republicans to an opposition of 25. The Republican majority is more likely to be increased than lowered by the full returns. The Senate will be constituted as follows: Republicans, 22; Democrats, 9; one district still in doubt. House, Republicans, 78; Democrats, 9; seven districts still uncounted.

Utah Goes Republican.
Salt Lake City, Nov. 5.—Powell, Republican, for Congress, and McCarty, Republican, for Supreme Justice, are elected by majorities of at least 4,000. The Republicans will have a majority on joint ballot in the Legislature of at least 25.

HORSES DIE SUDDENLY
STATE VETERINARY M'LEAN LOOKING INTO DEATH OF ONTARIO STEEDS.
ONTARIO, Nov. 5.—State Veterinary Surgeon William McLean, of Portland, was called here today to investigate the cause of death of several of the town work horses. He found several dead and others dying at the Madden barns. No other animals in the vicinity were sick. After post-mortem examination he was unable to decide cause of death. He expressed parts to Corvallis for analysis and will give a report in a day or two. He is under the opinion that the feed or water is the cause of the trouble, but was unable from superficial examination to determine definitely.
Outsiders have rumored that some poisoning had been done with malicious intent, but at the stable this was not thought to be true, as no cause for such work could be surmised. The disease first causes the horses to fall as if shot dead. He lies still a few minutes, and then breathes as if in deep sleep. The stable gets its hay from farmers near Ontario and its oats from Idaho farmers. It is supposed that certain combinations work together in this mixture.

IRRIGATION CONGRESS

MAYOR BISHOP APPOINTS DELEGATION TO ATTEND CONVENTION IN PORTLAND.

Mayor C. P. Bishop, in response to the request sent out by Portland authorities recently, has appointed a delegation to attend the Oregon Irrigation Association convention, which will be held in Portland between November 17th and 23d, inclusive, as follows:

The question of irrigation, while it is not applicable to this section of Oregon, is a very important one and one in which all public-spirited people are interested, as it is of vital importance to some sections of the state, and the object of the convention is to draw out a general discussion in the hope of being able to arrive at some solution of the problem.

So far, Governor Geer has received no request to appoint a similar delegation, but will do so upon the arrival of such.

CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER

Coroner Holds John Craig in Bail of \$18,000

HAD CHARGE EXPLOSIVES

When Accident Occurred in Madison Square Tuesday Night

THROUGH WHICH TWELVE PEOPLE WERE KILLED AND EIGHTY INJURED—TWO BOYS HELD AS WITNESSES—PRESIDENT IS THE GUEST OF MASONS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—The coroner held John Craig in \$18,000 bail on the charge of manslaughter in the first degree. Craig, it is alleged, was in charge of the explosives at the time of the accident last night, when twelve people were killed and eighty injured. Two boys, who were carrying boxes of explosives, were sent to the House of Detention by the coroner as witnesses. All the rest of the ten persons were discharged.

The Guest of Masons.
Philadelphia, Nov. 5.—President Roosevelt was the principal guest today, at the Sesquiennial anniversary celebrated by the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Pennsylvania and of George Washington's apprenticeship into the Masonic fraternity. The President was also the orator of the occasion.

MASON HELD TO ANSWER.
CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 5.—Allan G. Mason, who was arrested yesterday on suspicion of having committed an assault upon Miss Clara A. Morton, in Waverly, last Saturday night, causing Miss Morton's death, today was held for further hearing on the charge. Mason was remanded without bail.

GIRLS JOIN IN STRIKE.
NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Many girls have joined the striking silversmiths in Manhattan and Brooklyn, and a general strike of 3,000 silversmiths is threatened throughout Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island, if a nine-hour work day is not granted. Seven firms in this city are reported to have granted the smiths' demands.

STAGE TOOK TUMBLE

ROLLED DOWN HILL WITH FOURTEEN PASSENGERS—THE HORSES KILLED.

OURAY, Col., Nov. 5.—The stagecoach which runs between this place and Red Mountain, met with an accident near here on one of the steepest grades of the road and together with the fourteen passengers rolled down the mountain side for a distance of 300 feet. One of the horses was killed and the coach rolled over several times in its descent. All the passengers were injured more or less, the most severely hurt being:

Superintendent Mattes, of the Swamp Angel mine, Red Mountain; left leg broken in two places below knee; right leg broken above knee.

Allen McFarland, mining man, Red Mountain, badly hurt in back and hips.

D. L. Hancock, Milwaukee; shoulder and hips injured.

Tim Manion; legs broken and back hurt; head cut.

John Skell, badly bruised.

Rodney Bason, face and head lacerated; badly hurt.

Walter Foley, back injured; hand crushed and face cut.

George Rosa, wife and son; seriously lacerated and bruised.

The driver attributes the accident to slipping of the brakes and an unruly horse.

CASE OF CUBAN CHILDREN.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Senator Quesada, the Cuban Minister, has received information regarding the Cuban children who recently arrived at New York destined for a school at Point Loma, Cal., and who were detained by the immigration officials. This was to the effect that the departure of the children was properly authorized by their parents and tutors. The Minister has also received cablegrams from the civil Governor, the Senator and newspapers of Santiago Province, protesting against interference with the children proceeding to their destination.
