REPORTS ARE EXAGGERATED

Notwithstanding the Startling News Received

MINISTER OF GUATAMALA

States He Has Received Numerous Communications Denying Rumors

SAYS CROPS ARE ONLY DAMAGED AND LOSS OF LIFE SMALL-THE LATEST ARRIVAL SAYS LOSS OF LIFE WILL EXCEED 5,000 AND FINCAS RUINED. 11

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 .- A. Lazo Arriaga, the Minister from Guatemala, has received letters and telegrams stating the reports published in this country, also the loss of life and properiy caused by the eruption of Santa Maria volcano are exaggerated.

Part of the present coffee crop is destroyed, but it is generally expected that most of the plantations will recuperate. The loss of life was very small.

The Latest Report.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 20 .- W. J. Campbell, who arrived today from Guatemala, brings additional details of the damage caused by the recent earthquake. Mr. Campbell said:

"There is no clear idea yet of the loss of life, but from what I could gather before leaving the country, I believe 5,000 natives have been killed, I heard at San Jose that President Cabria was trying to suppress the news, but the evidence of ruin was apparent to everybody.

"Some of the coffee fincas that have been entirely ruined were worth more than \$1,008,000. The plantation of Albert James, which was wiped out of existence, had machinery upon it worth

"Alofo Meyer's finca, worth \$750,000, was entirely ruined. The town of Quezoithango is practically ruined.-

Has a Big Job.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 20 .- One of the big milling companies of Minneapolis has bonded one of its mills to grind nothing but Canadian wheat. According to the terms of the bond, the mill shall have continually within its walls a Government storekeeper, who will see that only Canadian grain is used. The product of the mill will be loaded into bonded cars and taken East for shipment to Liverpool. The grinding of the grain in Minneapolis instead of England will creat a great saving in the expense of transit to Europe,

Big Railway Combine.

New York, Nov. 20.-The Herald will say tomorrow: It is stated in official quarters that the control of the Manhattan Railway Company has passed into the hands of the Inter-Borough Rapid Transit Company, familiarily known as the Subway Company. It is considered the Company will have control of all available franchises not possessed by the Metropolitan Railway Company.

POLITICS IN THE CASE

GOVERNOR-ELECT SPARKS, OF NEVADA, WANTS IDAHO CONVICT PARDONED.

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 20 .- Hon. John of Nevada, is in this city, and rumor states his mission is to secure the par-don of "Diamondfield" Jack Davis from the penitentiary. Mr. Sparks for a number of years was the head of THE VANDERBILT WOMEN ARBITRATION COMMISSION the great cattle firm of Sparks & Herold, operating in Idaho and Nevada, Davis was an employe of the firm of their big ranch in Cassia county, and was convicted of the murder of two sheepherders, who were found in their wagon with bullet holes through their heads. Davis was sentenced to be hanged, but the cattlemen fought his case through the Supreme Court of the United States, and finally two other men, named Bowers and Gray, confessed that the latter had killed the men. Gray was placed on trial and defended by the attorneys who defended Davis, and fo rlack of evidence was acquitted. Davis' sentence of death was commuted to life imprisonment last year, and the case got into politics-the sheepmen denouncing the commutation by the Democratic officials and the cattlemen upholding it. During the recent campaign, Republican speakers charged that Davis would yet be pardoned by Governor Hunt and Secretary of State Bassett, and as these gentlemen were defeated in the recent landslide, it is evident that if they are to pardon the convict they must act speedily.

It is asserted that Governor Sparks and associates have spent fully \$30,000 in the defense of Davis and are now making a last effort to secure his pardon. Davis is a model prisoner, but was given to a blustering, bad-man sert of manner as a cowboy, that aided materially in his conviction. seemed to rejoice in the notoriety he was achieving. He secured the name of "Diamondfield" by an alleged discovery of a diamond mine on Snake riger. Since the phrdon of Paul Corcoran, the Coeur d'Alene dynamiter, Davis has been the leading attraction of the Idaho penitentiary.

None of the policies makes it plain whether the word noon means according to standard or solar time. The records of the fire department show that the flames were discovered about 11:45 o'clock, although the exact moment never has been definitely settled. Solar time is 17 and one-half minutes faster than standard time, and if the fire broke out at 11:45 standard time it was then two and one-half minutes after noon by solar time. Thus the defendant insurance company claims that the "noon" in the policies means solar time, and base their position for refusing to pay them upon the ground that the policies had expired two and one-half minutes when the fire broke out.

STEEL MEN UNEASY

AMERICAN DEMAND HAS HELP-ED THEM, BUT ARE ANXIOUS ABOUT PRODUCT.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20,-General export trade centers of British steel manufacture, like Birmingham and Sheffleld, have been greatly benefitted, says a Tribune dispatch from London, by the steady demand for crude steel ville, Illinois, yesterday, after a battle from the United States. Sheffield manufacturers, while encouraged by this increase of business during the same material will not return to Engism and engines. They assert, however, that their grip upon the home market in cutlery and other minor manufactures of steel cannot be shaken by American competition, ac-

tive as it may be in the future. Good feeling prevails in Midland and Yorkshire towns toward the United States. Manufacturers frankly admit that their plants in the metal industries are not abreast with the times, and assert that England urgently needs the shaking up which it is receiving from German and American competi-
