M., dean of the college of history and economics of the Willamette University, is in receipt of an invitation to attend a dinner given by the Massachusetts Single Tax League, which will be given at Boston, on Monday evening, December 8th. Upon this occasion the guests are to be treated to a discussion of the topic: "Ground Rent: What Is Its Nature, Operation and Office? What Causes It? What Maintains It? How Much is There Of It?" by professors of political economy.

The introductory paper will be read by Prof. Charles J. Bullock, of Williams College, to be followed by commentaries by F. S. Baldwin, Boston University; W. M. Burke, Albion College; G. S. 

HYGIENIC MILK SUPPLY

EXPOSITION TO BE HELD AT HAMBURG IN SRPING OF 1903.

(From Thursday's Dally.) The United States Department

Agriculture has received through the Department of State notice that a general exposition of hygienic milk supply will be held at Hamburg from May 2 to May 10, 1903. The exposition will

embrace eight sections, as follows. Section A .- For milk production: (1) Exhibit of limited number of milch cows of known race; (2) stable fittings and implements; (3) regimen and hygienic food; (4) technics of milk, tests and execution of; (5) management of milk in stable and pastures; (6) personnel of milking and stable (clothing health, and supervision of the same). Section B .- Veterinary control of the condition of milch cows and of milk: (1) Legislation: (2) management of contagious outbreaks (with demonstration); (3) diseases of milch cows; (4)

special diseases: (5) unwholesome food plants and drinking water: (6) secretion through the milk of medicinal stuffs; (7) sanitary management; (8) disinfection of stalls (means and apparatus). Section C .-- Conveyance of milk, land, and waterways, railways; conveyance izing, and concentrating (condensing)

pouring, and sealing, Section D .- Exhibit of management trade), with complete furnishings. Section E .- Milk legislation and administration: (1) Laws, ordinances, decrees, and judgments; (2) police supervision of milk traffic (removal, previous examination, preserving, conveyance); (2) chemical and bacteriolog-

working: (b) instruments and tools for laboratory. Section F .- Scientific: (1) Means o instruction with scientific demonstra-

tion; (2) scientific instruments and tools for milk laboratories; (2) literature, statistic, and graphic exhibitions. Section G .- Milk preparations: (1) Condensed and prepared for long keeping for use in the army and mavy; (2) milk for infants; (3) for therapeutic

purposes: (4) other foods and preparations produced from milk. Section H .- Machinery and apparatus for the treatment of milk in the house-




