

PROSPECTIVE CHANGE WAS A DISAPPOINTMENT

**Representative Hume, Who Cast His First Ballot
Yesterday, Creates a Surprise by Casting
His Boquet Otherwise Than Expected**

**Expressed Displeasure at Being Represented as a Supporter of Sen-
ator Fulton--The Fulton Forces Appear to Be On Verge of
Disorganization and That a Dissolution is Likely to Occur
Without Warning--Decidedly Uncertain**

The ballot on United States Senator yesterday absolutely failed in every respect to produce the long-looked-for and much desired result and, from the present outlook, it is impossible to state with any degree of certainty, whether the fight will be a prolonged one and carried out up to the last hour, as was the case at the last session, or will be ended within the week. Hon. R. D. Hume, of Coos and Curry, arrived yesterday morning, and for the first time since the Legislature convened, took an active part in legislative matters, but when the ballot for Senator came off and everybody seemed eager to hear whom he would vote for, for it was an open secret that the Fulton contingent had been claiming him from the outset, and there was no little surprise clearly expressed on all countenances when Mr. Hume clearly and distinctly cast his vote for Hon. L. T. Harris, Speaker of the House.

"Ah, well," the knowing ones would say, "it is virtually the same thing, for is not Harris a full-fledged Fulton man and Fulton is merely holding him off to figure in his final coup."

However that may be, Mr. Hume was seen after the joint session and he expressed some signs of humor when he remarked that it was a mystery to him how his "name had ever become linked with that company," and stated that the Fulton men had circulated the report to further the designs of their leader. When asked if he was a Fulton supporter he would neither affirm nor deny it but simply looked innocently askance and remarked, "wait and see," in a manner which would indicate that he would vote for anyone else.

The impression is becoming quite general and is gaining strength that Fulton is slowly but surely losing control of his organization and that there are several among his followers who feel that they have fulfilled their obligations to him and are on the verge of toppling over at any time and without notice, so the situation is certainly very strenuous.

The Geer followers are strong, and evidently sincere in their declarations that his chances were never better for success than they are right now and they express the hope of winning out ultimately. The Multnomah delegation is still holding "pat" without the slightest sign of wavering and the "solid six" of Marion county held a meeting last evening and it is understood, will maintain their present attitude to the end, so it seems that something is just about to be doing.

SENATE

Morning Session.

Called to order at 10 a. m., and prayer was offered by Rev. Wyrans. A communication from the Portland Chamber of Commerce was read asking that Congress be memorialized to construct a portage road around Celilo, above The Dalles; referred to committee on Railroads.

S. B. 123, Sweek, relating to Sunday closing; passed.

S. B. 132, Croisan, providing for disposing of funds in hand of administrator; indefinitely postponed.

S. B. 135, Mulkey, relating to challenge for bias; re-referred to Judiciary.

S. B. 138, Croisan, by request, relating to proof of wills; indefinitely postponed.

S. B. 139, Marsters, to provide medical treatment of minors; laid on the table.

HOUSE.
(Afternoon Session.)

Under first and second reading of Senate bills, the clerk's desk was cleared.

Judiciary committee reported substitute for H. B. 153 by Davey, repealing an act providing for criminal prosecutions by prosecuting attorneys and also H. B. 153, by Davey, relating to bills of exceptions.

Railroads and Transportation Committee reported favorably on Hansbrough's fellow-servant bill, also favorably with amendments on Reed's bill prohibiting stealing of rides on all trains.

Burglar's bill for establishing a bureau of information was reported by the committee on labor and industries, with recommendation that it be made special order at 10 a. m. Thursday; defeated.

H. B. 172, Phelps, relating to the use of water from streams and providing for appointment of state engineer, was favorably reported.

La Follet's bill, No. 216, repealing the scalp bounty act, was favorably reported this morning.

House adopted H. J. R. 3, by Webster, transferring \$1,246.08 from the Salmon Industry Fund to the credit of the Hatchery Fund.

H. J. R. 5, Nottingham, authorizing Secretary Dunbar to order an oil painting of Governor Chamberlain to be placed in the Legislative halls, cost not to exceed \$500. Referred to Resolutions committee.

Consideration of a motion, offered by Wheelton, providing for a clerk for the minority party in House, was indefinitely postponed upon suggestion of Eddy.

Third Reading House Bills.
H. B. 132, Murphy, providing for the relocation of county seat of Union county; passed.

H. B. 135, Nottingham, protecting birds, their nests and eggs; passed.

HOUSE.
(Afternoon Session.)

H. B. 150, Orton, to provide for the better protection of life and property, by providing for licensing of engineers, etc.; indefinitely postponed.

S. J. R. 5, Changing time of holding general election to first Tuesday following first Monday in November; failed of adoption.

S. J. R. 9, providing that state educational and other institutions for care of sick or defective persons may be located at other places than the place of government; indefinitely postponed. Reconsidered and lost, 24 votes in favor.

S. J. R. 3, forbidding creation of corporations by special law; adopted.

THE WEATHER REPORT

**JANUARY WAS WARMER BUT
MORE RAIN FELL THAN LAST
YEAR.**

M. P. Baldwin, of the local weather bureau, has made his report for the month of January, which on comparison with the report for January, 1901, shows some interesting features. A year ago considerable snow fell during the month, whereas last month none is recorded. The total precipitation for January, 1902, was 1.38 inches, and last month 4.56 inches of water fell, two inches of it falling on January 24. The greatest amount of precipitation for any day during January, 1902, was .23 inches. The river was also 17 feet higher last month than a year ago.

THE SALEM CHARTER

GOVERNOR CHAMBERLAIN HEARING REMONSTRANCES AND CONSIDERING THE MEASURE.

Governor Chamberlain has had the Salem Charter Bill under consideration for several days past, but has not yet signed it. A great deal of influence is being brought to bear to induce the Governor to veto the measure, by those who are financially interested in its provisions and it is not known what will be the outcome. The Governor prefers to investigate into the matter before taking any action and will give everyone who desires, an opportunity to be heard. Quite a number have already appeared before the Governor but the Governor is non-committal one way or the other, and nothing can be learned until he takes official action.

Yesterday Governor Chamberlain signed S. B. No. 84, incorporating Milwaukie, and H. B. No. 169, amending the charter of Coquille, and the day before he affixed his signature to a number of bills, as follows: S. B. 85, to incorporate Cornelius; H. B. 93, to incorporate Ashland; H. B. 135, to amend the charter of Elgin; H. B. 151, to amend charter of Enterprise; H. B. 155, to incorporate Lexington, and H. B. 173, to incorporate Sublimity.

**W. H. S. Advances Idea for
Method of Selecting Elec-
tion Candidates**

**COMMITTEE TO SELECT TWO
CANDIDATES FOR EACH OFFICE
WHO HAVE ANNOUNCED THEM-
SELVES BY PUBLICATION, AND
PLACE THEM ON THE BALLOT.**

Editor Statesman:

I think there is a misconception of what constitutes a party. In the first place, they adopt a name which no other party has any right to use, and formulate a platform of principles that the party will adhere to if successful. Then they send a call for delegates by a national committee for a national convention, to put up candidates for President and Vice President. Then the states through the state committee send a call to the counties to send delegates to a state convention to nominate candidates for offices for the state. Then the county committee to town or precinct, to hold the primaries and choose delegates to the county conventions to nominate candidates for county offices, and so on up to state and national offices, and each voter has the privilege of voting a secret ballot.

Generally a double set of delegates are put on a ballot, with the privilege of marking one-half. Now how does the direct primary come in?

I propose that the county committee select two candidates that have been proposed by caucus or publication, for each office, and have tickets printed with privilege of marking one. So on through all the offices. Each central committee for state and nation to put up two names for each office to be voted for that party. To be certified by the chairman of each committee to be put on the official ballot, and no other parties to be put on the official ballot except they have complied with the law.

The idea of a person declaring the party he affiliated with at the previous biennial election would conflict with the independence of the voter to change his views. If the present parties have separate primaries on the same day, each would know who were of their party, especially where there had been a thorough canvass made.

SHAM AND PRETENSE

**ANTI-TRUST PROSECUTIONS BILL
DECLARED VERY FEEBLE
BY CLAYTON.**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—The Anti-Trust Bill debate, which opened in the House today, did not develop much animation. The rule under which the House was to operate, however, precipitated a lively discussion. The Democrats protested vigorously against the rule for the consideration of the bill because it did not permit them to secure a record vote on the substitute, but the Republicans replied that they were willing to accept the responsibility. The bill to expedite the anti-trust prosecutions occupied no debate. It passed the House without a word of debate. Clayton insisted that the bill was all sham and pretense and that the bill, feeble as it was never was intended to go on the statute books. The Postoffice appropriation bill was passed. The anti-trust debate will be resumed tomorrow.

They Debated Polygamy.

Washington, Feb. 5.—The discussion of the Statehood bill in the Senate today turned to the question of polygamy. Gallinger, replying to some statements made by McComas, said that he was in favor of an amendment to the Statehood Bill covering the question of polygamy as strongly and firmly as possible. The influence of the Mormon church over politics occupied a large and sharp debate.

AN EXCITING ACCIDENT

**JOHN M. RODGERS BARELY ES-
CAPES INJURY FROM BALKY
HORSE.**

An exciting incident, which came near resulting seriously, occurred Monday afternoon about 2 o'clock in front of Geo. F. Rodgers' book bindery.

John M. Rodgers, of Portland, Government Gauger, and a brother of Geo. F. Rodgers, is in the city and yesterday afternoon, desiring to take a business trip into the country, ordered a delivery rig brought around to the book bindery, where he stepped into the buggy, took the reins, and commanded the horses to start. One of the horses balked, and Mr. Rodgers touched it with a whip, whereupon it commenced to kick, and for a few minutes made things lively, breaking the whiffletree, and kicking out several spokes from the wheel.

Not being able to subdue the fractious steed, Mr. Rodgers jumped from the rig and endeavored to hold him. He was in some way drawn under the horses' feet, the animal stepping upon him and otherwise made his presence known. Some bystanders interfered and managed to extract the unfortunate driver and return the unmanageable horse to its proper place. After the excitement passed off Mr. Rodgers found he was not seriously injured, having escaped with a few unpleasant bruises and a loss of considerable cuticle from his nose and other parts of his body.

Mr. Rodgers was not to be conquered, so ordered another team and took the intended ride as if nothing had happened.

DEPARTED TO OTHER WORLD

**Finley Perrine the Pioneer
Balliff of Supreme Court
Is No More**

**PASSED AWAY PEACEFULLY AND
PAINLESSLY AT HIS HOME THIS
MORNING AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS
OF PARALYSIS OF BRAIN—UNI-
VERSAL FAVORITE.**

Finley C. Perrine died at his home, at No. 412 Winter street this morning at 2 o'clock, of paralysis of the brain. Probably no citizen of Salem was better known or more universally loved than was Finley C. Perrine. His humorous disposition and unlimited good nature made friends of all with whom he came in contact, and many a heart will beat in sadness at the news of his sudden death, for until yesterday only a few persons outside of his own family knew he was ill. His last and fatal illness lasted from 10 o'clock Tuesday night.

At that hour he retired, but did not awaken the following morning and has been lying unconscious ever since. Medical aid was summoned and all that human skill and ingenuity could do was done to bring him out of the comatose state, but all efforts were fruitless and he passed away peacefully this morning as stated above.

Mr. Perrine had a severe illness about a year and a half ago, and though he has always since been able to attend to his duties, he has not been the light-hearted, jolly person that he was before the attack, and it has been known for some time that his health was failing, but none dreamed the end would come so soon.

Mr. Perrine was born in Indiana thirty-seven years ago and came to Oregon in 1876. He acted for two years as nightwatchman at the State House and for the past nineteen years has been balliff of the Supreme Court of Oregon.

He was an honored member of the B. A. R. and also stood high in Masonic circles. He joined Pacific Lodge No. 50 in this city in 1890 and became a member of Multnomah Royal Arch Chapter No. 1 in 1891, and the same year the Commandery degree in Albany Temple Commandery No. 3; he was a member of the Thirty-third Degree Oregon Consistory No. 13, and a member of Al Kater Temple, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine.

Besides the heartbroken wife he leaves two daughters, Katie, aged 17 years, and Minnie, aged 15, and a sister, Miss Alice Perrine, all residing in this city. Funeral announcement will be made later.

TO PENSI ON EX-SLAVES

**SENATOR HANNA INTRODUCES A
BILL FOR BOUNTY AND
A PENSION.**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Senator Hanna today introduced a bill granting pensions and bounties to all ex-slaves who were freed by the proclamation of President Lincoln during the War of the Rebellion. It provides that all persons over 50 years of age, and less than 60, male or female, shall receive a cash bounty of \$100 and a monthly pension of \$5 per month; all persons between 60 and 70 years of age a bounty of \$200 and a pension of \$12 per month, and all persons over 70 years of age a bounty of \$500 and a pension of \$15 per month.
