

# RUSSIANS ARE MOVING OUT

## Six Months Treaty Period in China Ends

### GOVERNMENT TRANSFER

#### To the Chinese Begun and Troops Have About All Evacuated

REPORTED THAT AMERICAN FISCAL AGENT SUBSTITUTED SILVER BONDS FOR GOLD IN DEMANDING INDEMNITY, BUT REPORT WAS UNTRUE.

PEKIN, April 8.—Today was the date of the expiration of the treaty period of six months, fixed for the evacuation of the second province of Manchuria. During the past fortnight the Russians have been removing their troops from the interior of the province. The local governments are being transferred to the Chinese.

Acting Without Authority. Pekin, April 8.—It appears that the American fiscal agent acted without instructions in presenting the indemnity bond providing for the payment in silver taels. Under the instructions from his Government, he is substituting a bond providing for the payment in gold dollars.

The Report Denied. Washington, April 8.—Evidently the misunderstanding continues regarding the bonds which China is to execute to the United States in payment of indemnity for the Boxer outrages provided in the protocol. The statement from Pekin tonight that the American

### Norwegian Steamer David Has Exciting Experience

### OFF COAST OF HONDURAS

#### Overhauled by Fatumble and Boarded by Half Dozen Hondurans

MATTER REPORTED TO CAPTAIN COGHLAN, WHO IS SEARCHING FOR GUNBOAT WITH NO SUCCESS — ADMIRAL MELVILLE HAS SURPRISE IN STORE.

NEW ORLEANS, La., April 8.—Captain Warnecke, of the Norwegian steamer David, which has arrived here from Cuba, Spanish Honduras, reports an exciting experience with the Honduran gunboat Fatumble. The David was off the north coast of Honduras when the Fatumble, hove in sight and commanded the merchantman to put into Utila. Half a dozen Honduran soldiers were put on board the David, which proceeded to Puerto Cortez harbor and informed Admiral Coghlan of what had happened.

Two United States war vessels went at once in search of the Fatumble, but from last accounts they have not located her.

### Will Surprise Sailors.

Washington, April 8.—Admiral Melville, engineer-in-chief of the navy, has a surprise in store for the sailors which perhaps will be as revolutionary in its effect in navy construction as was his famous triple screw. For more than a year he has been preparing plans for a turbine propelled warship and it is expected they will be made public soon.

## PRESIDENT IS IN SECLUSION

### Arrived at Yellowstone Park and Disappeared

### PENETRATED ITS DEPTHS

#### And Will Not Reappear for Sixteen Days at Least

WILL ENJOY REST AND CESSATION FROM PUBLIC DUTIES AND WILL STUDY THE NATURE OF THE VARIOUS ANIMALS — THE WEATHER IS FINE.

CINNABAR, Mont., April 8.—President Roosevelt is in the Yellowstone Park, and for the next sixteen days he expects to enjoy complete rest and cessation from public duties. He will be in almost constant communication with Secretary Lobb at Cinnabar, but nothing, except of the utmost importance, will be referred to him.

In company with John Burroughs, a naturalist, who accompanied him from Washington, he will closely study the nature of the various animals that inhabit the park.

Every trail leading into the preserve is closely guarded, and no one will be allowed to disturb the President's solitude. His headquarters will be at the home of Major Pitcher, superintendent of the park. A number of camps have been established in different localities and these will be occupied by the President from time to time.

The special train bearing the President and his party arrived at the Gardner entrance to the park at 12:30 this afternoon and was met by a detachment of the Third Cavalry and a number of cowboys. The President, dressed in riding breeches and coat, with a light-colored slouch hat on his head, mounted his horse and made a brief address to the people congregated near his train.

### RELATION ESTABLISHED

#### OCCUPATION OF PREMISES AFTER TERM EXPIRES IS AN IMPLIED CONTRACT.

A decision was rendered yesterday afternoon by Justice of the Peace E. D. Horgan in the case which was tried on Tuesday afternoon, in which E. M. Croisan brought suit against W. L. Jermain to recover possession of his farm which Jermain was occupying as tenant.

The justice took the case under advisement until yesterday afternoon and handed down a written opinion. The court held that "the relation of landlord and tenant may arise by implication from the circumstances of the case and the relative positions of the parties to each other, for the law will imply its existence wherever there is an ownership of land on one hand and an occupation of it by permission on the other."

"The intention to create these relations is presumed where a tenant continues to hold over after his term expires."

Several houses were blown down there and one man seriously injured. The tornado came from the west and had spent its force by the time it had reached Bradford. It is feared the little town of Hiram, with a population of 150, has been wiped off the map. It was in the storm's track. Nothing has been thus far heard from it.

### Swept By Cyclone.

Birmingham, Ala., April 8.—The little hamlet of Hopewell, forty miles north of this city and one mile from Hancewell, was swept away early this morning by a cyclone which cut a path of desolation a mile wide and two miles long, across the prosperous farming section of Blount county. Twelve persons were instantly killed, three or four fatally injured, and a score seriously injured. The dead:
