HOP MARKET IS BOUYANT

Many Hops Remain in Hands
of the Local Deal-
ers

ONE LOT SOLD YESTERDAY AT
18 1/2 CENTS PER POUND—AN
OFFER OF 19 CENTS WAS RE-
FUSED—DEALERS ANXIOUS TO
BUY.

Hop growers are feeling much en-
couraged over the turn the market is
taking, and express great confidence in
the future, and they certainly have not
arrived at this conclusion without reason.
Almost all of the growers now
having hops in their possession have
finally determined, so they say, to hold
their crops for three or four months
longer, or until they can get the price
they think they should have for the
article. The bear dealers who were, a
few days ago, endeavoring to induce
farmers to sell at 17 cents and even
less, are now freely offering 18 cents
and 18 1/2 cents per pound; in fact, one
of these very dealers yesterday pur-
chased a lot at 18 1/2 cents, although
they assured the reporter that 17 1/2
cents was the top market price. Every
dealer in the city has orders at 18
cents or better, and one farmer who
yesterday sold at 18 cents per pound,
is now lamenting the fact that he sold,
as two dealers the same day offered
18 1/2 cents, and he now thinks he might
have gotten 1 cent per pound.

A prominent dealer yesterday au-
thorized the statement that an offer of
19 cents had been refused yesterday,
and that there was more than one or-
der in the hands of local dealers at
19 cents at the present time.

The fact that so many orders are in
the hands of dealers, shows that brew-
ers want hops, and must have them.
It is true that they don't want many,
but this is in accord with the hand-to-
mouth policy of buying today only
what hops they need for tomorrow's
brew. Dealers assert that, notwith-
standing the numerous orders in the
market, if 500 or 1000 bales were sold
to the brewers, the present demand
would be satisfied, and all orders would
be withdrawn. Certainly they would,
and this is the very reason why grow-
ers should see that 500 bales, or any
other amount, should not be thrown on
the market at this time. The reason
for the present low price is that brew-
ers have been able to buy a few hops
along, enough to satisfy immediate de-
mands, at their own price.

California growers have stopped sell-
ing altogether, and the Oregon growers
have the situation almost in their own
hands, and it is up to them to dictate
prices.

Growers are expressing great satis-
faction over the manner in which the
true condition of the hop market and
the bear manipulation has been re-
peatedly stated in these columns, dur-
ing the time in which it appeared that
the bears were in supreme control of
the situation.

T. A. Livesley & Co. have purchased
the James Finney lot of 110 bales of
hops, from near Brooks, at 18 cents
per pound, and Chas. Livesley, an in-
dependent dealer, returned from Ger-
vais last night, and reported having
purchased one or more lots near that
place, but the name of the grower or

WORK HAS COMMENCED

W. J. CULVER SURVEYED THE
GROUND YESTERDAY—STU-
DENTS BURN BRUSH.

Yesterday morning work commenced
on the new athletic field for William-
ette University. Deputy County Sur-
veyor W. J. Culver surveyed the field,
assisted by Prof. Loran A. Kerr, chair-
man of the committee on construction.
They established the level, and found
that at the lowest point of the field
was about two feet higher than the
mill race, so that good drainage is as-
sured. On the evening before, the Uni-
versity students turned out and cele-
brated the beginning of work on the
new field by making a bonfire and
burning the brush from the field. This
will hurry the work forward consid-
erably.

Prof. Kerr is very much interested
in the work, and is determined to see
Williamette in possession of a first
class athletic field, such as is unex-
celled by that of any other college in
Oregon. He is working very hard, al-
most night and day, to get the work
under way, and with such an energetic
spirit at the helm, the efforts being put
forth are sure to be crowned with suc-
cess. The Professor has made some
improvements in the original plans and
intends to have a larger field than was
at first projected.

MUST NOT DISCRIMINATE

DECISION OF BOARD OF ARBITRA-
TION BETWEEN RAILWAY
COMPANY AND MEN.

CHICAGO, April 29.—The Chicago
City Railway Company and its em-
ployees are bound to a peace compact
by a board of arbitration that has been
considering a complaint on the part of
the men that General Manager Robert
McCulloch has been discriminating
against the members of the union.
While the body does not find the com-
plaint justified in the decision handed
down last night, it does find that there
has been a friction on the system that
has been detrimental to good service.
The fifth of the decision is as follows:
"That in the matter of union and
non-union men the board decides that
to maintain harmony between the em-
ployer and employee the company shall
not discriminate against members of
the union and employees that are not
members, either in the matter of ap-
pointments or in the matter of trans-
fer or promotion and shall lay no ob-
stacle in the way of peaceable and
lawful endeavor to strengthen the uni-
on or to enlarge its membership."
"The board decides that the union
shall not discriminate between its own
members and their fellow employees
who are not members of the union by
boycott or otherwise and shall pursue
only peaceable and lawful methods to
extend its influence and increase its
membership."

SHE MUST STAND TRIAL

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 29.—
Deputy Sheriff Williams, of Seattle,
will leave today for the North with
Mrs. Adelaide Lloyd Smith, who is
wanted by the Seattle police for swim-
ding. Since her arrest here Mrs.
Smith has made a remarkable fight in
the courts against being taken back for
trial. Having failed in the state courts
she asked United States Judge Deha-
ven to declare the Governor's extradi-
tion warrant invalid. Judge Dehaven
decided against her and she appealed.
The court allowed the appeal, but de-
clined to permit it to act as a stay of
execution.

The Gray Gander oil operator will
therefore have to go to trial.

WILL FILL VACANCIES

At the May term of the Marion coun-
ty commissioners' court, which con-
venes on Wednesday of next week, ap-
pointments will be made to fill the va-
cancies existing in the different boards
of election judges throughout the coun-

cancies exist should notify the court,
as this will be the last session before
the special election which will be held
on June 1st.

A BIG EXPOSITION—

President W. H. Wehrung and Sec-
retary M. D. Wisdom, of the State Fair
Board, visited the State Fair grounds
yesterday and looked over the condi-
tion generally with a view of laying
out certain improvements in contem-
plation and absolutely necessary. Al-
though the special appropriation bill,
which was vetoed by Governor Cham-
berlain, embraced the special appropria-
tion for this work, the Board will go
ahead with the improvements just the
same in the hope, or rather the assur-
ance that the next Legislature will
make good the expense. Besides the
laying of a new water system, bids for
which work bids will be advertised for
at once, so that the work can be got-

ten under way at the earliest date, the
Board has ordered that all the old coops
in the poultry pavilion, numbering
about 250 in all, be replaced by new
ones, and will make other numerous
and necessary repairs about the build-
ings and grounds, including the build-
ing of more stalls for the stock and
enlargement and repairing of the pre-
sent exhibition buildings and the grand
stand. The Board looks forward to the
largest and best exhibition the state
has ever held, and will make extensive
preparations for it. The premium list
has been revised and completed and
was yesterday placed in the hands of
the State Printer.

DIED.

DANIEL.—At the family home, near
Milwaukee, Oregon, Sunday, April 26,
1903, Charles C. Daniel, aged 66 years,
of heart trouble.

Deceased was born in New York in
1837. On July 15, 1862, he enlisted in
Company D, Ninety-first Illinois Infan-
try, and served through the Civil War,
having been mustered out on July 24,
1865. He was an honored member of
Sedgwick Post, which he joined on May
12, 1890. He was married in Burling-
ton, Iowa, in 1862, and became the father
of five children, three of whom sur-
vive him. He afterward moved to Kan-
sas, and in 1888 came to Oregon and
has resided here ever since. The fun-
eral took place at Oak Grove Ceme-
tery, near Oregon City, on Monday,
April 27th, under the auspices of the
G. A. R. Rev. F. M. George, of this
city, officiating. T. M. Kirby, a mem-
ber of Sedgwick Post, represented the
Post at the funeral.
