ARE FLOCKING INTO VALLEY

Immigrants Are Arriving on Every Train and All Buy Homes

REAL ESTATE DEALERS HELD AN IMPORTANT MEETING YESTERDAY—HARRIMAN IMMIGRATION DEPARTMENT IS DOING A VAST AMOUNT OF ADVERTISING.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

Yesterday afternoon Salem was visited by Geo. M. McKinney, of Chicago, General Immigration Agent of the Harriman System of Railroads, and W. E. Coman, general freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon.

At Mr. Coman's request Mr. McKinney came to the coast and is traveling through the valley investigating the natural conditions that exist, and the inducements offered to immigrants to settle here. He is endeavoring to find out how the immigrants are received, and what efforts are put forth to induce these people to settle and remain here after they once arrive in the valley, and he took occasion to tell his ideas of the methods to be followed.

John P. Jones, traveling freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific Company, was with the gentlemen and is conducting them through the valley. Monday they held enthusiastic meetings in Albany and Corvallis; yesterday they drove from Corvallis to Independence and addressed a large meeting of the business men of that city in the forenoon. In the afternoon they drove to Salem, arriving here at about 2:30 o'clock and called a meeting of the real estate dealers of the city, who gathered in H. B. Thielens's office. The meeting was necessarily short, as the party desired to take the afternoon train for Portland, but considerable good was done, and a great deal of information imparted by each side.

Mr. McKinney asked for a report of the facts regarding the immigrants who are daily arriving here, and P. N. Derby responded. He told of the method followed in interesting the new arrivals, speaking of the bureau of information, represented by Judge L. D. Henry, who met all trains, showed the strangers over the city, and surrounding country, pointed out good hotels, and turned them over to real estate dealers who would show them the kind of property they desired to buy. But he emphasized the fact that no selfishness was shown by the real estate men, and that if one dealer failed to make a sale, others were given a chance. Mr. Derby's report was very satisfactory, and showed that very few people had arrived in Salem and failed to make purchases. Mr. McKinney and Mr. Coman both made short addresses showing what the immigration department was doing in the way of advertising Oregon.

The Immigration Department.

During the past six months Mr. McKinney has probably done more for Oregon in the way of permanent benefit than any other living man. He is doing this not for personal reasons, but as the representative of the immigration department of the great Harriman lines, comprising the Southern Pacific Company, Union Pacific Railroad, Oregon Short Line, Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company, Houston & Texas Central, Texas & New Orleans and the Houston E. & W. Texas lines. They have done a vast amount of work for other states, causing a continual flow of immigrants to those states and now they have taken up the advertisement of the state of Oregon, which is so rich in natural resources.

This immigration bureau is the most perfect organization for carrying on its line of work in the world today, and now they are devoting their efforts toward populating our state.

How They Are Doing It.

Mr. McKinney was seen by a Statesman reporter, and told some very interesting details of the work being done by his department. He said:

"We are distributing vast quantities of literature descriptive of Oregon and the Willamette valley. We take pleasure in distributing the literature being sent us by Salem and other towns throughout the valley, but really this is a very small portion of the literature we distribute. We print vast quantities of pamphlets at our own expense, and they also contain well written descriptions of the resources of the state.

"Besides this important factor for advertising, we have also been constantly in the field, who travel over the Eastern states, giving lectures and illustrating them by choice reproduction views. These lecturers are talented men and draw large crowds, who listen, sometimes, for hours, to the vivid descriptions of Oregon and, after the lecture, will crowd around the speaker, asking questions, and seeking further information. This shows that they are becoming deeply interested. These men also go among the people and follow up their advantage with personal work.

"It need hardly be said that these efforts are bearing fruit. Over 4500 immigrants have already arrived in the Willamette valley, and the reports show that nearly all of them buy prop-

erty here and settle down. But the best results have not yet been realized. Great streams of people will be pouring into Oregon next fall, and it only rests with the local cities to treat them right, for they are coming here with the honest intention of investing.

"One year ago Oregon was hardly known in the East, but now it is a household word over the entire Middle Western states. We intend to follow up this advantage with continued advertising, and another year will see more people coming to Oregon, by far, than are doing so at present.

"Another important factor in bringing people to Oregon, are the large number of colonizing agents at work in Eastern and Middle Western states. We are in on way interested in these people, who make their commissions, by selling property, but we help them all we can. There has been a misunderstanding on this point. We enter into a contract with them, and for every five immigrants who buy tickets through their efforts, we furnish them free, a ticket to Oregon and return. This enables them to come here with their customers, and are in this way enabled to make sales.

"I think you have a beautiful country here, and a great future is before Salem."

"Yes," said J. P. Jones, who was standing near, "and I only wish we could have driven you over the surrounding country. I would like to have shown you my model dairy farm eight miles southeast of here, that you could see what we can do in Oregon.

"Do you see that white capped mountain? That is Mt. Jefferson, and it is in my back yard."

Oregon Is Helping.

W. E. Coman, of Portland, also spoke of what is being done for advertising the resources of the state. He said:

"Of course we leave the local cities to advertise their advantages, but we are working to advertise the state. I am especially interested in the Willamette valley. Our company has already sent out 50,000 folders with well written descriptive matter concerning the Willamette valley, on one side, and a good detail map on the other. We are now planning to print 50,000 more, in fact, I gave the copy into the printer's hands last Monday, and they will be going forward in a short time.

"We have also made an agreement with the O. R. & N. Co. and will get out 50,000 joint pamphlets, descriptive of both the valley and that of both the valley and that portion of Eastern Oregon through which the O. R. & N. Co.'s lines pass.

"We employ expert writers to write these articles, and send them out over the state accompanied by photographers to take pictures for illustrations. These men also contribute to our Sunset Magazine, and to other Eastern magazines.

SALEM-MEHAMA ELECTRIC LINE

All Water Power Rights on the Santiam Bought Up by Corporations!

NEGOTIATIONS ARE UNDER WAY

For the Purchase of J. H. Albert's Rights Which Is the Key to the Situation—The Columbia Northern Said to Be the Parties Interested in Deal—The City and Suburban Railway Company Also Represented

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

For several months past negotiations have been pending for the purchase of certain valuable water power rights upon the Santiam river, the only available water power within a radius of thirty miles of this city, and the way the matter now stands all of the rights on that river, which are of any value whatever for development, save one, have been bought up by representatives of two or three large corporations, and as soon as this one remaining right is secured, the key to all of the others, the work of developing these great powers will be begun, and it remains to be seen whether they will be utilized for the benefit of Salem industries or not.

Several months ago the city council took up the matter of investigating the feasibility of owning and operating the city's own public utilities, such as a water works plant, an electric light and power plant, etc., and with that end in view a committee was appointed, and a fund was set aside for its disposal, for the purpose of viewing these same water power sites which were offered to the city at that time at a wonderfully low figure, and to report upon the advisability of purchasing such as would meet with the city's needs according to the plans outlined at that time. This committee, accompanied by competent surveyors, visited the sites as instructed and returned a favorable report upon the matter, it is understood, without recommendation. Since that time the matter has died out entirely, so far as the city is concerned.

In the meantime, however, while the city officials were doing a whole lot of talking and very little acting, some large corporations became interested in the matter, sent out their representatives and now, when the situation is sized up, it is found that every riparian right, between Niagara and Mehama, embracing every valuable power site on the Santiam river, has been bought up, save that owned by Mr. John H. Albert, of this city, which is the most valuable right of all, and so located that the value of all the rest is materially enhanced by the ownership of it. Negotiations are now pending, between Mr. Albert and the representatives of the corporations, for the purchase of this right, which will give the owners full and complete control over all of the available water power contiguous to Salem. This great power is to be developed in the near future and, it is said, to the great benefit of Salem and the country surrounding her. What great benefits the development of this

water power will bring to Salem remains to be seen and, if the reports which are in circulation can be depended upon, the time is not in the very distant future.

It is not known exactly what particular company is behind the transactions, but it is known that the parties who are buying up the rights are all interested in the Columbia Northern Company, which operates a line of railroad on the north side of the Columbia river and has aspirations of entering into the interior of Oregon, also in the Crown Paper Company, of Oregon City, which is desirous of securing the timber in the Santiam country, and the City & Suburban Railway Company, which operates an electric line between Portland and Oregon City, and has been trying for years to extend its lines to Salem and other points in the valley.

The property which Mr. Albert holds is situated right in the fork of the river where the two north forks of the Santiam meet, and if in such a position that he controls the most valuable site for the development of the power. So far the corporations have bought everything along the main north fork and can utilize the power they already own by building a flume from a point about one-half mile above the fork to a point about equidistant below, thus gaining about a thirty-foot fall and capable of developing at least 2500 horse power. Nature has so provided on Mr. Albert's property, however, that he will only have to construct a flume for a short distance and obtain a fall of about fifteen feet and a 1500 horse power. Of course the corporations can go ahead and develop their power without that of Mr. Albert, and if a deal is not closed between them in a few days Mr. Albert intends to grant them one-half of the portion of the stream which he controls and then turn his attention to the development of his own power.

It is not definitely known what these corporations intend doing with this power, as their representatives are very conservative and "close-mouthed," but from what could be learned, it is a pretty sure thing that an electric generating plant will be installed and a motor line built from Mehama to Salem which will eventually be extended to connect with the City & Suburban line at Oregon City.

This is considered to be the first step toward the building of electric lines all through the valley, and many years will not have elapsed until all of the towns around the country will be connected directly with Salem by motor lines and indirectly with Portland, which is the prime object of the promoters.

SUICIDE THE VERDICT

NO EVIDENCE TO SHOW THAT DR. JORDAN SHOT MAY T. DEBOE AT SEATTLE.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 6.—The coroner's jury decided that May T. Deboe came to her death by her own hand. That will end the investigation that promised to criminally connect Dr. Jordan with the crime. The evidence showed plainly that Jordan was on intimate terms with the girl and had promised to marry her. Detectives swore also that Jordan made threats to kill the girl to get rid of her, but there was no evidence to show that any one but the girl herself had fired the fatal shot. At the last moment Mrs. Mygatt, who prior to the inquest told many conflicting stories, came to the inquest and swore that she saw Miss Deboe put the revolver to her breast, and then heard the report of the gun. The body of the dead girl was shipped to her relatives in Washington City.

AN ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING

SEVERAL PROMINENT SPEAKERS ADDRESSED WORKINGMEN'S REPUBLICAN CLUB.

The Workingmen's Republican Club held an enthusiastic meeting in the council chamber of the city hall last night. The meeting was largely attended, and many ladies were in the audience. This might be called the opening gun of the campaign, and more enthusiasm was shown than was even expected.

Hon. Frank Davey presided as chairman of the meeting, and introduced the different speakers. Timon Ford, E. H. Flagg, E. Hofer, Frank Davey and J. D. Lee all made short but eloquent and logical speeches in defense of the honored principles of the Republican party, and of its honored nominee for Congress, Hon. Binger Hermann.

Hon. F. T. Wrightman and Captain S. B. Ormsby were also slated to speak, but were unavoidably detained, so Hon. J. D. Lee was called upon for an extempore speech. He responded with an eloquent appeal to the voters of the city to stand by their true and tried principles in the coming election.

Hon. Frank Davey called attention to the letter which had been sent out by young Reames, the Democratic nominee for Congress, to the Native Sons of Oregon, appealing to them to support him as a native son. Mr. Davey

considered this a gross insult to the young Republicans of Oregon, and that the day had gone by when any lodge, church or other organization could enter as a controlling factor in politics. Further, he said Hermann deserved great honor, as he was not a native son, and yet had brought forth brilliant native sons.

The speakers brought out in a forceful manner the issues at stake, and the reasons why Binger Hermann should and will be elected.

It was announced that the people of Salem would soon be able to listen to an address from Hon. Binger Hermann.
