

SERBIAN PEOPLE WANT REPUBLIC

Intelligent Classes Favor Abolishment of Monarchy

MAJORITY OF MINISTERS

Declare Themselves in Favor of the New King and Are Afraid Russia and Austria Would Not Sanction Change—The People Are Satisfied

BELGRADE, Serbia, June 12.—The assassination of King Alexander and Queen Draga, the proclamation by the army of Prince Karageorgovitch, as the King of Serbia, has apparently been accepted by the capital and the Serbian people without a murmur. A meeting of the Skupstchina on Monday is expected to confirm the proclamation.

The only new element in the situation is a feeling among the intelligent classes in favor of the abolition of the monarchy and the creation of a republic and the sentiment is shared by at least one member of the provisional government. Differences of opinion on this point developed today at a meeting of the cabinet, when the new foreign minister, L. Jubinor Kalievics, expressed himself for the establishment of a republican form of government. The majority of the ministers, however, declared themselves in favor of a new King in Prince Peter Karageorgovitch. They strengthened the declaration by the strong feeling that Russia and Austria would not countenance the establishment of a republic.

Dispute Over the Estate.

Belgrade, June 12.—The remains of the ill-fated King and Queen were buried almost stealthily last night in the chapel of the Obrenovitch family. The government has laid claim to the possession of the monarch. It is not known whether he left a fortune, but it is supposed he had considerable savings, having lived economically during the last decade. It is reported that the greater part of his money was deposited in England, but it is questionable whether the capital would be delivered to the Serbian government. The opinion here is that it all belongs to the state, even including the King's foreign investments. It is possible that ex-Queen Natalie may also appear as an heir. Queen Draga was in receipt of 30,000 gulden monthly and also had great savings which will go to her three sisters.

Details of the Revolt.

Belgrade, June 12.—The following is a narrative of the revolution by men who took an active part in it; army officers to the number of ninety, having formed the project of revolt, on Wednesday evening, at 11 o'clock, met

in Kalligaden garden and there the details of the deed were planned. At 1:40 a. m. the officers in eight groups, went to the Konak Royal Palace. At the Konak palace the revolutionaries had two important partisans in the King's bodyguard. These appeared at the appointed hour, 2 a. m., with keys to the garden gate, which is always kept locked.

Stepping before the guard at the gate they called, "Throw down your arms." A fight ensued, with shots from both sides, in which several were wounded. The revolutionaries then entered the garden and passed to the court yard of old Konak, where Lieutenant Noyevics, the King's personal attendant, was awaiting them. He opened the lock of the iron door leading to the front room on the first floor. Hurrying up the stairs to the first floor, the officers encountered Lieutenant Lator Petrivitch, who, alarmed by the hubbub, hurried forward with drawn revolver in one hand and in the other his sword.

"What do you want?" he cried. "Show us where the King and Queen are," came the reply. "Back!" cried Petrivitch, and at the same moment a ball stretched him on the ground. The revolutionaries pressed forward when suddenly the electric light gave out. All stood in darkness. Feeling their way, the revolutionaries climbed the stairs and got into the ante-room to the King's apartment. Here they found candles and lit them. Upon these lights depended the whole outcome. Without a light they never could have found the victims, who might have escaped. Part of the officers, with burning candles, and the others with pistols, commenced to search for the royal couple.

In breathless haste the conspirators ran through rooms, opened wardrobes and looked behind curtains in vain. After a long search a small door leading into the alcove was discovered, but it was locked. It was broken with an axe and the royal couple was found in undress and here shot to death.

The report that the bodies were thrown out of the window into the garden is untrue. Colonel Macin made a speech saying: "We have now destroyed the dynasty of the Obrenovitchs and have got rid of the dishonorable woman who was the King's evil spirit. Long live Serbia."

STRIKE IS SETTLED

MEXICANS AND ITALIANS AT MORENCI, ARIZONA, AWED BY MILITIA.

MORENCI, Ariz., June 12.—The strike is settled. The men, except the Italians, accepted the company's offer. The territorial guard leaves tomorrow.

Awed By Troops.

Morenci, Ariz., June 12.—The backbone of the strike is broken. The leaders have been arrested and are held charged with inciting riot. They will probably be taken at once to Solomonsville for trial by Rangers. The situation was brought about by the arrival of the militia, they having a wonderful and immediate effect upon the strikers, who in speeches had previously defied the company officials and laughed at their coming relief. Upon the arrival of the troops they realized that business was meant, and their meetings drew only one-tenth of the men that had attended previously. There was no arbitration. The strikers will probably accept the company's offer of nine hours' pay for eight hours' work and go to work tomorrow. Settlement here means the same result in adjoining camps which have been idle for two days past. The trouble at Clifton is over.

All Quiet at Morenci.

Washington, June 12.—The War Department has received a dispatch announcing the arrival of troops at Morenci, Ariz., and stating that all is quiet there.

READY FOR STAMPEDE

BIG PLACER FIND AT ATTERSON, B. C., CAUSES SOME EXCITEMENT.

VANCOUVER, June 12.—A special to the Province from White Horse today says: An earthquake shook the Northern country yesterday. Its center was Shikway where it lasted several seconds. A stampede has commenced as the result of a big placer find in Atterson, crowds are here ready to leave the moment the river clears of ice.

BRITT WAS NOT FAIR

BUTTE, Mont., June 13.—Jack O'Keefe, of Chicago, and Jimmy Britt, of San Francisco fought twenty rounds to a draw here this afternoon. The fight was fast and furious. Britt had a shade the best of it, but O'Keefe was the favorite with the crowd, as the Frisco boy had been accused of fouling repeatedly. The sheriff jumped into the ring in one round and warned Britt that if he did not fight fair the battle could not go on.

HE CANNOT ESCAPE

HARRIMAN ISSUES AN ORDER TO BRING DEFAULTER VICE TO JUSTICE.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—The Harriman syndicate is hot on the trail of William R. Vice, the defaulting traveling passenger agent of the Union Pacific Railroad. Through Erastus Young, general auditor of the syndicate lines, President Harriman has sent word to this city that Vice must be apprehended and punished. It was this message received here several days ago that suddenly aroused the general officials of the company to action and resulted in warrant sworn to by A. R. Guyett, secretary of the general agent, being issued for the arrest of the missing man.

Reports from Mexico, brought here during the past week, are to the effect that Vice has been in the City of Mexico for a number of days and has made no particular attempt to conceal his identity. Two railroad officials, who arrived here three days ago, and the publisher of an American paper in the City of Mexico, have stated that they saw Vice there and that they are positive that he saw them, but was careful to avoid them.

One of the defaulters' relatives has resided in Mexico for many years. He is a man of influence and affluence and it is now believed that Vice, hoping that this man would aid him in his troubles and would perhaps stand between him and any attempt to have him extradited by the officials of this state, hurried down into the southern republic as fast as a train could carry him, after his criminal operations here had been discovered.

For some weeks it has been the general impression in this city that the efforts to capture Vice had been abandoned, but the unexpected message sent out here by General Auditor Young plainly suggests that it is the purpose of the Harriman syndicate to make an example of its peccating agent, and that every possible means will be resorted to to apprehend him if he remains in Mexico.

Will Not Interfere.

Vienna, June 12.—In a conference today the Russian Ambassador and the Austrian Foreign Minister agreed that neither Russian or Austria will interfere in Serbia.

GENERAL ALEXANDER M'COOK IS DEAD—THE END COMES SUDDENLY.

DATTON, O., June 12.—General Alexander McDowell McCook, U. S. A., retired, suffered a third stroke of paralysis at 5 o'clock this morning and died a half hour later at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Charles Craighead. General McCook came from Washington a few weeks ago and shortly afterwards suffered a mild stroke of paralysis. This was followed a few days later with a second stroke, more serious than the first, but despite this fact

it was believed that he would recover. He appeared to be steadily improving until this morning, when the end came suddenly.

Mrs. McCook, the widow; Mrs. Chauncey Baker, of Washington, a daughter, and Mrs. Craighead, were at the bedside. The funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

NEW SANTE FE AUDITOR

TOPEKA, Kans., June 12.—J. W. White is to be the new auditor of disbursements on the Santa Fe in place of L. S. Lauck, deceased. Mr. White will come here from Los Angeles, where he has his headquarters as auditor of the coast lines. He was formerly chief clerk to Mr. Lauck in this city.

RIGHT WILL BE CONTESTED

Legitimized Son of King Milan Claims Throne

PARENTAGE IS ADMITTED

Mother Was Former Architect to the Sultan of Turkey

PRINCE KARAGEORGOVITCH, THE NEWLY PROCLAIMED SERBIAN KING, DISCLAIMS COMPLICITY IN ASSASSINATION AND DE-TESTS THE CRIME.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 12.—The late King Milan's son, by Madame Crisics, whom he legitimized, and who it is reported, will dispute Prince Karageorgovitch's right to the Serbian throne, lives at Constantinople with his widowed mother. Mrs. Crisics was formerly architect to the Sultan, a post now held by her brother. King Milan acknowledged the parentage of the boy, who is now 15 years of age.

THE CZAR'S AMBASSADOR

Took Formal Leave of President and Will Depart for a Vacation

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Count Casini, the Russian Ambassador, had almost an hour's talk with President Roosevelt this afternoon. Ostensibly the purpose of the Ambassador's call was to take formal farewell of the President, as he is leaving for Russia to spend his vacation. It is known his entire time was consumed in a review of the situation in Russia growing out of the Jewish atrocities at Kischineff.

A Hot Competition.

San Francisco, Cal., June 12.—The Pacific Mail Steamship Company, in addition to putting the Siberia and Corea on the Asiatic run, will purchase two more boats of about the same size. Toyo Kisen Kaisha has ordered three steamers, each with a gross displacement of 15,000 tons, and it is reported that the Occidental and Oriental Company propose to replace the Gaelic with the Germanic. The new boats expect to compete with the new Great Northern Railway line of new and large steamers between the Puget Sound and the Orient.

The Gangway Collapsed.

St. Petersburg, June 12.—The Novce Vremya reports that two hundred lives were lost at Azoff, June 9, as the result of a collapse of a gangway there while a pleasure party were landing from the steamer Makva.

pressed detestation of the crime in un-restrained terms.

"I was first informed of the royal tragedy enacted at Belgrade," said the Prince, "by a telegram from a cousin of mine in Vienna the following morning."

"I calmly await the trend of events. So long as no formal proposals reach me, I have no reason to leave Geneva and I will remain here. No one has yet asked me to return to Serbia. No one has as yet offered me the crown."

"You ask me what will be my attitude when I am in possession of the crown. If I am called to the throne I shall not fail to take inspiration from the admirable institutions of Switzerland, which I have learned to appreciate highly. I favor absolutely liberty of the press. I hope to see Serbia prosper under the constitution of 1889, which is very liberal."

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Commission into W. R. Hearst's complaint that the six railroads operating into the anthracite region have combined to violate the interstate commerce law was continued today. W. R. Marshall, a local coal dealer, submitted a table showing the refund made to his firm by the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company when the price of coal at tidewater was too low to let the dealers make a profit and pay full rates. No refunds, he said, have been made since March, 1900.

BLAST TOO HEAVY

SHOCK CAUSES A BARBER TO SLASH HIS CUSTOMER'S CHEEK.

NEW YORK, June 12.—Many persons have been slightly injured by the discharge of a heavy blast in the subway at Broadway and Forty-third street. Windows were broken on both sides of the street, heavy rocks were thrown to the roofs of near-by buildings and a shower of splinters and stones hurt many persons, but none seriously. The shock so startled a barber in a shop near by that he drew his razor's edge across the customer's cheek and laid it open for three inches. No explanation for the heavy charge of dynamite has been obtained.

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DYNAMITING THE DELHARRE.

ASTORIA, Or., June 12.—The Fishermen's Union is having the wreck of the British bark Delharre, near Republic spit, blown out with dynamite, as it seriously interferes with the work of the gillnetters in that portion of the river. The diver who is doing the work says the ribs of the vessel protrude from the sand bottom and these have wound around them, in great balls, thousands of fathoms of gill nets,

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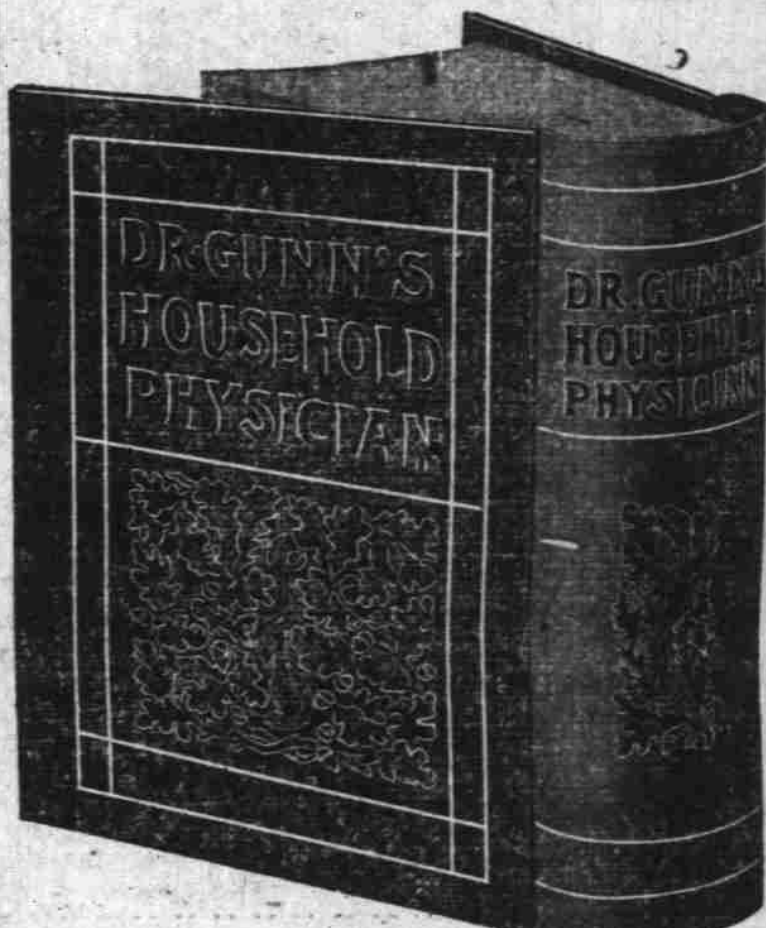
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
