GEORGE HAMIL TAKEN IN TOW

DALLAS NEWS.

DALLAS, Or., July 6.—(Special).—A. S. Morrison, of Enid, Garfield county, Oklahoma, arrived in Dallas yesterday. Mr. Morrison is deputy sheriff of Garfield county and comes to Dallas with extradition papers from Governor Chamberlain for the return of George Hamilton to Oklahoma for trial on the charge of horse stealing. Hamilton was arrested ten days ago by Sheriff Ford at the instance of his bondsmen. He came to Dallas from Oklahoma four months ago. The return trip will commence today.

Dallas, July 5.—(Special).—C. L. Hubbard, an experienced oak stove contractor of Dallas, has purchased and will put in operation a stove machine in the oak timber west of town. The machine will arrive and be placed in position within a few days.

LOCAL HOP MARKET

IS CONTROLLED BY KNOCKERS,
AND LOWER THAN CONDI-
TIONS WARRANT.

The local hop market is very weak at present, with the usual result that those dealers who have made it their business for the past year to continually hammer the market for lower prices now have the situation in their own hands and are correspondingly exultant. Louis Lemery, of Woodburn, sold his crop of 64 bales to T. A. Liversley & Co. The price was 15 1/2 cents or 17 cents, but could not be confirmed. Other sales have been made at between 12 cents and 15 cents per pound, and a fair quotation of Salem's local market today is 15 cents. This great slump in prices is altogether in local circles, even the Portland market having failed to drop in sympathy. As before stated, the London price is advancing sharply, and in New York prices hold their own, the market remaining firm. This shows that local influences are responsible for the dull market here, but prices are now so low as to effectually block any at-

NO CHANGES IN THE CREED

Rabbis Declare in Favor of
Historical Sabbath

TO EXERT EVERY EFFORT

To Improve Its Observation as
Fundamental Institution
of Judaism

THANK PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT
FOR ACTION TAKEN ON JEWISH
PETITION TO CZAR OF RUSSIA—
SALERIAN NUNS OF DOMBOCO
ARE TURNED DOWN.

DETROIT, Mich., July 2.—"This conference declares itself in favor of maintaining the historical Sabbath as the fundamental institution of Judaism, and of exerting every effort to improve its observance and instruct the executive committees to appoint a special committee to study the methods of carrying this into effect."

The central conference of the American Rabbis placed itself on record on the Sabbath question today, after an eight hour session by the adoption of the above amendment to the report of the Sabbath School commission on the question.

Thankful to Roosevelt.

DETROIT, Mich., July 2.—The conference of American Rabbis today ordered a telegram sent to President Roosevelt congratulating him on his decision to forward the resolutions of the Society of B'Nai B'rith to the czar and thanking him for it.

Hissed and Cheered.

Paris, July 2.—The Senate held a night session to discuss the application for authorization made by the Order of the Salerian nuns of Dombosco. Premier Combes strongly opposed the application on the ground that the order did not benefit the orphans as much as it did the interests of the nuns. The Premier's speech aroused many angry protests from his opponents, but he left the tribune amid cheering by his supporters.

For a Good Reason.

Rome, July 2.—The news that the czar will not return this year the visit of the King of Italy is attributed to the attitude of Italian Socialists, who, in the Chamber and Press, and at public meetings have openly declared they would seize the opportunity to protest against the Kischineff massacre.

MOSQUITO VS. MUSIC

THE BOSTON BOARD OF HEALTH
PLANS DELIGHTFUL DEATH
FOR THE INSECTS.

BOSTON, July 3.—The Brookline Board of Health which is systematically exterminating mosquitoes by means of kerosene oil is now about to take up a suggestion calling attention to a new process of lessening the evil by means of musical sounds. The discoverer of the new process says:

"It has been found that practical application has been effected by raising to a great number of vibrations per second the particular note to which the mosquito is most sensitively attuned. This intensified note, produced by sudden electrical impulse upon a musical instrument causes every mosquito near to plunge headlong into the instrument and die."

ENCAMPMENT IN SEPTEMBER

Militia of Oregon, Washington
and Idaho, and the
Regulars

WILL BE HELD AT AMERICAN
LAKE, NEAR TACOMA, LATTER
PART OF MONTH—GEN. FUNSTON
AWAITING INSTRUCTIONS FROM
DEPARTMENT OF WAR.

The State Military Board held the regular quarterly business meeting in Adjutant General C. U. Gantenbein's office yesterday afternoon at which Colonel Jackson, Surgeon General A. B. Gillis, Colonel S. C. Spencer and Adjutant General C. U. Gantenbein were present.

The greater part of the meeting was taken up in the transaction of regular routine business, such as auditing of bills, etc., but the most important matters to come up for discussion were the matter of the reorganization of the militia and the annual encampment. No definite conclusion was arrived at in the case of the former except that, after talking it over from every standpoint of vantage, it was decided to announce the result some time during the latter part of this week in the form of general orders, which would be issued to the state and National Guard officials.

In the matter of the encampment, which was discussed at length, it was decided that no definite action could be taken until definite information is received from General Funston, the Commander of the Department of Columbia, who telegraphed the War Department, about two weeks ago, requesting authority to mobilize the troops of the Department of Columbia, and the National Guard of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and, as yet, no reply has been received.

The encampment, if held, will be at American Lake, ten miles from Tacoma, September 15 to 20, inclusive, and as soon as General Funston is advised of the intention of the War Department immediate notice will be given to the members of the National Guard, as it is thought important that they be officially notified in as soon a time as possible in order that those who have business connections may have plenty of time to make arrangements to go.

In fixing the dates for the encampment the Adjutant General of the three states were asked to express a preference for the date. Adjutant General Gantenbein recommended the second and the third week of August as the most convenient time for the encampment for this state and was opposed to September as being too late in the season. The Adjutants General of Washington and Idaho however, preferred the latter part of September, and, as they were in the majority, carried their point.

WAS ADJUDGED INSANE

PRISONER CONFINED IN MARION
COUNTY JAIL SENT TO
ASYLUM.

Charles Green, who has been confined in the Marion county jail awaiting the action of the circuit court on a charge of burglary, committed at Woodburn a short time ago, was yesterday adjudged insane by an order of the Marion county court and committed to the Asylum. He was examined by Dr. F. E. Smith, and the order of the court was based upon his affidavit.

Greene broke into a confectionery store at Woodburn one night about four weeks ago, and was busily engaged satisfying the inner man when an officer entered and placed him under arrest. He was given a hearing in the justice court at Woodburn and bound over to the circuit court, but soon after his confinement in the county jail his strange actions aroused the suspicions of the officers, who watched him closely and finally became convinced that the man was mentally deranged. His examination followed, with the above result.

Green is but 19 years of age, and nothing could be learned of his past life, or where he hailed from. The cause of his insanity is unknown. He imagines at times that he is a wild beast, and his mind is perfectly blank as to what constitutes right or wrong. He was transferred to the Asylum yesterday afternoon by Sheriff B. B. Colbath.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

Montreal, Que., July 3.—H. T. Duffy, treasurer of the province of Quebec, died today of apoplexy.

Port Colborne, July 3.—The Canadian Government steamer Petra today seized the tug Kitty D., of Buffalo, for illegal fishing off Port Maitland.

Vancouver, B. C., July 3.—The lumber mills announced today that they would not sell lumber to local contractors until further notice. The action is in retaliation for the strike declared against the owners of the saw mills.

Havana, July 3.—The United States Naval Station Theaty and the Isle of Pines Treaty were today read in the Senate and referred to the committee on foreign relations without comment.

Vancouver, B. C., July 3.—A special from Nanaimo, says: For the first time since April 11, the work train pulled out of Ladysmith for the Dunsmuir mines. The strike was declared off last night by an almost unanimous vote.
