SALMON OVERDUE

FINE CHINOOKS PUT IN APPEARANCE AT MOUTH OF COLUMBIA.

ASTORIA, Ore., July 8.—The long-expected run of salmon has put in its appearance, and while it is not yet large it gives evidence of continuing. It is really what formerly was known as the June run, but for several years has not commenced until about this time in July. With the river subsiding, all the seines are now in operation, and are beginning to make fair catches. The traps, which were taken out of the water on account of the drift, are being replaced, but the water is not yet in good condition for them to operate.

The regular summer run of steel-heads has commenced, and because of the large number caught the price has dropped to three cents per pound. The number of gill-net licenses issued to date this year by Master Fish Warden Van Dusen amounts to 750, while on the same date last year he had issued but 620.

TEACHERS INSTITUTES

SUPERINTENDENT ACKERMAN FIXES DATES FOR SAME, ALSO FOR EXAMINATIONS.

Superintendent Ackerman, with the co-operation of the county school superintendents, has fixed the dates for the holding of the fall institute in Eastern Oregon, as follows: Union, August 17; Bandon, August 12; St. Helens, August 18; Walla Walla, August 24; Ephraim, September 2; Burns, September 3; Canyon City, September 7, and Vail, September 10.

The State Teachers' Association will be held at Baker City during Thanksgiving week. Superintendent Ackerman has made arrangements to be in attendance at all of these institutes except Bandon and Heppner and he does not, on account of other official business, think he will be able to attend those.

The teachers' examinations will begin throughout the state on August 12. As yet no preparations are being made for them and, so far as is now known, they will be conducted in the same manner as in the past.

MIGHT RESULT DISASTROUSLY

Governor Durbin Would Not Allow Brown Removed

TRIAL WAS POSTPONED

By Judge Rasch Upon Receipt of Wire to That Effect

TENTH DEATH FROM RESULT OF MONDAY NIGHT'S SHOOTING OCCURRED LAST NIGHT—CORONER'S INVESTIGATION BEGAN—SIR THOMAS EXPERIMENTING.

EVANSVILLE, Ind., July 8.—Governor Durbin tonight, upon learning that Judge Rasch had ordered negro Lee Brown brought back here for immediate trial, wired the judge that he would not allow the prisoner to be taken from the state institution at this time. The judge thereupon said the trial would be indefinitely postponed. The tenth death from Monday night's shooting occurred tonight. The coroner's investigation began today.

LABOR SELLING IN KANSAS

FARMERS BADLY IN NEED OF HARVEST HANDS—BIDDING HIGH FOR HELP.

TOPEKA, Kan., July 8.—A dispatch to the State Journal from Russell says: Two negroes were bid off on the auction block for harvest hands Tuesday afternoon. They were John and Harper Porter, and known as good workers. The bidding was spirited, starting with \$2.50 per day, August Reinhardt finally secured them on a bid of \$3.25 per day. Adam Bender was the auctioneer.

At Victoria, Ellis county, another colored man asked for bids for a hand who would pitch to the stack all of the grain one feeder could cut. On this condition the negro brought \$6 per day bid.

Bison, Kan., July 8.—Forty farmers stopped a Missouri Pacific train here last night and went through it, searching for harvest hands. The train does not stop here, and the farmers flagged it by means of a lantern wrapped in a red handkerchief. They offered \$2.50 and \$3 a day and three weeks' work to get off the train.

Topeka, Kan., July 8.—Over 5000 men are yet needed in the Kansas harvest fields to save the great wheat crop.

He Never Retires.

Oyster Bay, July 7.—Senator Hanna will cruise along the North Atlantic coast for several weeks in the yacht Alvin. "Have I retired from business?" said Senator Hanna, repeating an inquiry put to him by the newspaper men, "I should say not. I never retire from anything."

ENTERTAINED BY ROYALTY

Officers of American Squadron attend Grand Ball

IN BUCKINGHAM PALACE

Twenty-Two Hundred Guests Present Including King and Queen

PRESIDENT LOUBET, OF FRANCE, AND SUITE ALSO IN ATTENDANCE—KING EDWARD INQUIRED AFTER COMFORT OF AMERICAN OFFICERS—A BRILLIANT AFFAIR

LONDON, July 8.—King Edward honored the officers of the American squadron tonight at a state ball given at Buckingham Palace, the climax of the visit of President Loubet. His Majesty formally received Admiral Cotton, the captain of the American ships, and twenty-five of the junior American officers, and Queen Alexandra later gave them the same distinction.

The ball, the first since the accession of King Edward, was a brilliant function, 2200 guests being present, including President Loubet and his suite; practically all the Ambassadors and Ministers in London, members of the Royal family and officers of the American and French squadrons now in British waters. To Rear Admiral Cotton, the King expressed his gratification at the visit of the squadron and inquired if all arrangements had been made for the comfort of the American officers and sailors. Admiral Cotton replied that he had fallen among friends. His Majesty had a pleasant word to say to each of the officers present.

The scene was one of splendor and the display of jewels wonderful. The King and Queen led the Royal quadrille, which opened the ball, in which President Loubet participated.

THE YEARLY MEETING

THE FRIENDS ASSEMBLE IN ANNUAL CONVENTION AT NEWBERG, OREGON.

NEWBERG, Ore., July 7.—This morning at 10 o'clock the Oregon yearly meeting of the Friends church convened in its eleventh annual session.

The number at the opening session was not as large as some years, but they are still coming, and the prospect is encouraging for a good meeting. In the morning, after a good devotional service, the epistles from Iowa and California yearly meetings were read.

In the afternoon the meeting met in business session. The devotional exercises were conducted by Amos Kenworthy. Rev. Kenworthy is from San Jose, Cal. His former home was Indiana, and he is sometimes called the "Hoosier Prophet." He is the only minister in attendance from a distance.

There are members here, however, from Indiana, Western Kansas and California yearly meetings.

The appointing of committees and the subject of discipline claimed the most of the time of this session.

The epistle of New England was also read. The evening session was in charge of Amos Kenworthy. The main points brought out were: Faith comes to the sinner by hearing. The Christian's duty is to tell it to others. Grace comes to the sinner as a gift from God. Grace of Christians is kept by obedience. The faith of the Christian is the faith of Jesus Christ.

DROWNED IN WINE TANK

TWO MEN DIE IN PLAIN VIEW OF THEIR FELLOW WORKMEN—OVERCOME BY GAS.

FRESNO, Cal., July 8.—Jacob Walker, aged 30, and Alfred Richardson, aged 24, single men and residents of San Francisco, employed by the Italian-Swiss colony as coopers in the construction of a new winery at Kingsburg, Fresno county, were this morning overcome by gas and fell into two and a half feet of water in a tank and were drowned.

Walker and Richardson were working with a gang of six men taking out the head of an old tank of 30,000 gallons' capacity. The fumes overpowered them, and they fell in plain view of their companions. Another man, who tried to reach them by descending by means of a rope, was also overpowered. A fourth man essayed the rescue on a ladder, but it was with difficulty

MUST MOVE PIGPENS.

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 9.—Dr. E. Du Gas, health officer of Douglas county, has commenced a general crusade against disease germs in this city and vicinity. "It is my intention," said Dr. Du Gas, "that the filth and disease-breeding holes in the alleys and streets of this city, as well as the filth in some of the back yards, must be disposed of. Roseburg is full of typhoid and scarlet fever, and the dirt is the cause. I intend to extend my efforts into the country as well, and all swinepens and feeding places must be kept a sufficient distance from the county highway to make that highway or county road a pleasure to the traveling public."

BUILDING OF PORTAGE ROAD

Board of Commissioners Receiving Inquiries From Many Sources

YESTERDAY ANSWERED QUESTIONS ASKED BY PORTLAND CHAMBER OF COMMERCE—ENGINEER HAMMOND WILL MAKE DETAILED REPORT OF WORK.

(From Thursday's Daily).

The Portland Chamber of Commerce and several other municipal organizations in the state are exhibiting much concern as to the status of The Dalles-Cello Portage Railway and communications of all descriptions have been pouring in upon the Board of Portage Railway Commissioners during the past few weeks asking for information and offering divers suggestions. The board has also received many petitions of late asking that the Portage Railway construction be let by contract, and Governor Chamberlain, in speaking of the matter yesterday, laughingly remarked: "I wonder if they all think the board is going to build the road without any assistance," and concluded by stating all building for the state would be done by contract and all contracts would be let to the lowest responsible bidder.

On Tuesday the board of commissioners received a communication from the Portland Chamber of Commerce, propounding several queries concerning the status of the proceedings and, yesterday the Governor, on behalf of the board answered the letter. The questions asked by the Chamber of Commerce incorporated in the answer of the board of commissioners follows:

"I am directed by the Board of Portage Railway Commissioners to acknowledge the receipt of your favor of the 6th inst.

"You say that the Chamber of Commerce is receiving numerous inquiries relative to the status of the proposed portage road around the rapids at Cello, and you desire to have the following questions answered:

"First: Has actual survey begun?
"Second: What steps, if any, have been taken to secure the right of way across the Government location of the proposed and recently abandoned ship railway?

"Third: Has the Board considered the advisability of building a road by contract. If not, how will the work be done?

"Fourth: What is the earliest date, in the Board's opinion, that actual construction will be possible?

"I am directed to answer the question in the order in which they are stated. "First: The act making the appropriation for the construction of the portage road took effect May 21st, and immediately thereafter the Board met and organized. The Board at once made efforts to secure the services of a competent engineer, and before the 8th day of June secured Mr. A. E. Hammond. Mr. Hammond proceeded to organize his survey crew and commenced the actual work of survey June 15th, and expects to have his work completed and to make a report as to location some time next week.

"Second: No steps have been taken to secure a right of way across the land of the United States of individuals for the reason that, until the engineer locates the line of the road, it would be impossible for the Board to know through whose lands the road will run and its exact location on such lands.

"Third: The Board has considered the advisability of building the road by contract. In fact, it never considered any other method of construction. The engineer in making his survey, locating the line and preparing his plans and specifications is instructed to report upon the assumption that the building of the road will be done by contract.

"Fourth: It is impossible to express an opinion as to the earliest date of completion of the road before the survey and report of the engineer is in and the rights of way secured.

"The Board has acted as expeditiously as possible in the matter of the construction of the road in question and you can rest assured that its policy will be to complete it at the earliest possible moment.

"You say that your committee will be pleased to discuss some of the more important side issues depending upon early construction. The Board will be pleased to hear from you or from any committee upon this subject. The engineer, as heretofore stated, will make a report next week, and we will be pleased to have your committee present at that time or at any other time you may designate."

MORE GOODS FOUND

DEVELOPMENTS SHOW THAT FISHER WAS DOING A WHOLESALE BUSINESS.

(From Thursday's Daily.)

From the information given out by Harry Fisher, the self-confessed young criminal, it was ascertained that some of the goods stolen by him from the store of Jos. Meyers & Sons were located in several different homes in this city. With this information at hand, several members and employees of the firm, accompanied by Chief of Police Gibson, went out on a searching expedition yesterday, with the result that much of the stolen property was found at places indicated by young Fisher.

Lace curtains, which had been stolen from the firm, were found in one house, the members of the family claiming that they bought the curtains from Fisher's mother, now Mrs. Thorpe. It was also learned that another family had purchased over \$52 worth of the stolen property, including furnishing goods and several articles of jewelry.

The searching party also called at a house where it was known Mrs. Thorpe had stored some of her baggage, which upon being examined, was found to contain four rings, a wrapper and a pillow, all of which had been stolen by Fisher. In a box among the baggage was also found the cutting off the bottom of the rain coat, which was included in the list of articles stolen.

The husband of Mrs. Thorpe came up from Portland on Tuesday evening, intending to return to that city yesterday with the baggage and belongings of his wife, which had been stored here, however, the members of the firm of Jos. Meyers & Sons made it a point to locate the baggage and examine the same before his departure, with the above result.

It has also been ascertained that a number of articles stolen were given away by Fisher, as presents to his young lady friends, but the names of these, as well as of the families who purchased some of the stolen goods, are withheld from publication, as they were entirely innocent of the fact that a crime had been committed.

ACCIDENTS AT SHERWOOD.

SHERWOOD, Ore., July 8.—A cluster of minor accidents have occurred here recently. John Huffman loaded and handed to his small boy a toy pistol, and hardly had the boy received it when it was discharged, the contents taking effect in Mr. Huffman's right hand. While the cartridge was a blank one, the powder burn was serious and a painful wound resulted.

William Shultz, an old soldier, residing above Middleton on returning home from this place Friday night, missed his footing while walking along the railroad track, fell and struck his nose and face against a tie, producing painful abrasions.

Wilma, the twin daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gardner, received a severe scalp wound Monday. A stick of wood used temporarily to hold up a window sash, in the second story, gave way and in falling came in contact with the child's head.
