

HIS CONDITION IS UNCHANGED

Venerable Pontiff Underwent Another Operation

SERUM WAS ANALYZED

Operation Reduced His temperature to Normal state, Considering Age, and Relieved Him of Pain--Was Restless and Uneasy Latter Part of the Night

ROME, July 11.—(4:50 a. m.)—Another operation performed yesterday has brought further relief to Pope Leo and by it the possibility of his life being prolonged, was increased, but it can hardly be said that the operation improved his chances of recovery. News just received from the Vatican says the Pope is now lying in a restless condition, after having had a good sleep during the early hours of this morning.

As an immediate result of yesterday's operation the Pope spent a quiet and almost painless day, with, for his age, normal temperature, which only more strikingly exhibited his strength of constitution and intellect. At an examination last evening the doctors could not perceive any re-gathering of serum in the pleural cavity, but it was feared the presence of serum would be detected today, thus rendering necessary, perhaps, another operation in a few days.

Patient Was Uneasy.
Shortly before midnight the condition of the Pontiff was reported to have undergone no change, and it was added that he just dropped peacefully into a sleep. At that hour all within the palace was quiet, the Pontiff's apartment alone showing signs of life. The Pope slept until nearly 2 o'clock this morning when he awoke, seemingly more refreshed and asked for food. His pulse was taken and was found to vary from 87 to 93. His temperature was 96 degrees and his breathing irregular.

The latter part of the night was not so good, owing to the restlessness and uneasiness of the patient. Dr. Lapponi has been going almost every fifteen minutes to look at the Pontiff, who did not notice the presence of the doctor, being in a drowsy state. Dr. Lapponi administered a dose of chloral and gave the patient at the same time an injection of camphor caffeine.

The Serum Analyzed
Rome, July 10.—Professor Rossoni, assisted by the other doctors in, analyzed the serum extracted this morning. The doctors explained the purpose of the analysis was to determine whether the case originated from tuberculosis or tumor in the throat. The analysis showed the disease was merely due to simple pleurisy.

Cardinal Rampolla Despondent.
Paris, July 10.—According to a dispatch to the Journal the Ambassador on Friday found Cardinal Rampolla wrapped in a wool shawl, bent and complaining of being sick. The Cardinal declared he would retire from active life at the Vatican and would not attend conclave. He said to the Spanish Ambassador: "I want to go into the Monastery and withdraw from the world. My human life will end with that of Pope Leo." Cardinal Rampolla wept bitterly, but at noon had an interview with Cardinal Gotti, who succeeded in consoling him.

A FAVORABLE PROSPECT

CROPS IN ALL PARTS OF UNITED STATES ARE DOING WELL

WASHINGTON, July 10.—The Weather Bureau's weekly crop bulletin is as follows:

The week ending July 6 was the most favorable of the season, giving ample and much needed heat in all districts east of the Rocky Mountains. Drouth in the northern portion of the spring wheat region has been relieved, but need of rain is beginning to be felt in the Ohio Valley, portions of the Central Gulf states and in Western Texas. In the Central and Northern Rocky Mountain districts and on the North Pacific Coast it is still cool, frosts more or less damaging occurring from the 2d to the 4th in Idaho, Wyoming and Utah.

Under the very favorable temperature conditions, corn has rapidly advanced in the central valleys, and is now greatly improved and generally well cultivated. In the northern portion of the Middle Atlantic states, in the Upper Ohio valley, lake region and the Dakotas, the crop continues backward, but is improving, though needing cultivation in many parts of these districts. In the Southern States corn is largely laid by, an unusually fine crop being assured in the West Gulf districts.

Harvesting of winter wheat has progressed under favorable conditions and is nearing completion in portions of the central districts.

Harvesting of winter wheat has progressed, with yields lighter than anticipated, in nearly all districts. Winter wheat is now ripening on the North Pacific Coast, the crop being practically safe in Washington. High winds and excessive heat have caused injury to California in some sections, but excellent yields are reported from the southern part of the state.

Early spring wheat has sustained permanent injury in portions of North Dakota and Northern Minnesota from drouth, which has been broken by abundance of rains that were of great benefit to the late crops. In Southern Minnesota and parts of South Dakota, lodging and rust are reported. In Wisconsin, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas and on the North Pacific Coast, the crop is progressing satisfactorily. Spring wheat is now heading in the Dakotas.

The outlook for oats is improved. Cotton has made rapid growth throughout the cotton belt, an improvement being shown in all districts, the reports from the Carolinas and Georgia indicating the most decided advancement. Wet weather has, however, been unfavorable in portions of Louisiana and Texas.

The outlook for apples appears to be somewhat more promising in the Ohio valley and portions of the Middle Atlantic states, and fair to good crops are indicated in Michigan, Tennessee and Iowa. Poor prospects are reported from Arkansas, Missouri, Illinois and West Virginia, and in New York the outlook is less favorable.

HE MUST BE DEAD

THE BELONGINGS OF MISSING "RUSSIAN CHARLIE" FOUND IN JOSEPHINE.

GRANT'S PASS, Ore., July 10.—In September, 1901, the Telegram contained an account of the disappearance of a Josephine county miner known here as "Russian Charlie." A few days ago a bag of clothes, pipe, revolver and other effects were found in a remote region of the Galice Creek country that is supposed to be the property of "Russian Charlie." The miner owned and worked a placer claim on Whiskey Creek and did his trading at Leland. He came into Leland one day, got his usual supplies and departed, presumably for his cabin, but he never reached it.

From the manner in which the articles lay when found it is thought that "Russian Charlie" had been drinking, as an empty whiskey bottle lay near by. He probably sat down to smoke and while doing so took out his revolver to examine it. The weapon was discharged, accidentally or otherwise, and the wounded man staggered off, half drunken, as he undoubtedly was, and fell over one of the precipitous cliffs of the region. The officers here have made diligent search of the neighborhood in the vicinity of the spot where the sack of clothes and articles were found, but can find nothing. The tragedy occurred so long ago that the body might have been carried off and devoured by wild beasts ere this time.

The sack found contained a suit of underclothing, an overshirt, a piece of sole leather, three pairs of socks, a pair of gloves, two cans of sardines and an unopened bottle of whisky.

DEATH ON GALLOWES

WM. RHEA PAYS PENALTY FOR MURDER—PRESSURE WAS IN VAIN.

LINCOLN, Neb., July 10.—The hanging of William Rhea, which was to have taken place at 12:30 o'clock today was postponed nearly an hour pending a decision of the court on an application for an injunction, but expressed a willingness to go into consultation regarding the granting of a reprieve by the Governor until a further hearing of the application could be made. Governor Mickey refused to grant a further reprieve and ordered the sheriff to proceed with the execution.

Rhea's attorneys then went before District Judge Holmes for an injunction stopping the execution, but before the injunction proceedings could be prepared Governor Mickey's order was carried out and Rhea was hanged at 1:21.

The crime of William Rhea was the killing of William Zahn, a saloonkeeper in the village of Snyder, January 4, 1901. Unusual pressure had been brought to bear on Governor Mickey for a reprieve or commutation, but without success. The name of Rhea was assumed. His parents live in Indiana, and his father sent lawyers from that state to argue with the Governor. Petitions for clemency were also circulated in Lincoln and over the state, and were numerously signed. Rhea was but 18 years of age when the crime was committed.

IT MAY BE MURDER

RACE TRACK GAMBLER SHOT DOWN TWO MERCHANTS—OFFICERS SAVED HIM.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., July 10.—The most sensational crime in the history of Mason City, a city of 5000 people located thirty miles southwest of Bloomington, was committed at 9 o'clock this

morning by a Springfield man named Barton, who fatally shot Julius Frank and Irving Rosenfield, leading merchants.

Barton formerly resided in Mason City and was a race track follower. He came to Mason City last night and this morning entered the clothing store to make some purchases. Rosenfield waited upon him, but no words passed between them. Suddenly Barton left him and walked to the rear of the store, where Frank was occupied, and without warning drew a revolver and shot him through the lungs, inflicting a wound which will be fatal. Rosenfield ran back to the assistance of his partner, and Barton then shot him, once in the side and once through the arm.

Barton was taken in charge by the police and removed to the county seat at Havana just in time to escape a mob that was being organized.

Rosenfield came to Mason City five years ago and was a single man aged 42. Frank had lived in Mason City for twenty-five years and was about the same age as Rosenfield. He was also single. Both men are Hebrews.

At noon Frank and Rosenfield, the victims of the Mason City shooting, were still alive, but Frank's condition was very critical.

ARE LOOKING FOR CULPRITS

Three Mysterious Wrecks on North Shore Road

UNSUCCESSFUL ATTEMPTS

Made to De-Rail Trains in the Same Place of the Others

A RAIL LASHED ACROSS TRACK, BROUGHT TRAIN TO STANDSTILL, BUT NO DAMAGE DONE—DRAWBAR CONCEALED ON THE INSIDE OF THE TRACK.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 10.—Three recent mysterious wrecks on the North Shore Railroad, with a record of death and suffering, are now believed to have been the work of a cold-blooded train wrecker whose motives are unknown. Within the past two days two unsuccessful attempts have been made to derail trains near where the previous disasters occurred.

Some days ago a freight train was brought to a sudden stop on a curve south of Camp Pistolet. The jar was a heavy one and nearly lifted the engine from the rails. The train was proceeding at the time at about one-fourth its usual speed, thus averting a serious wreck. It was found that a heavy piece of rail had been securely lashed across the rails with a stout wire. This attempt was followed by another yesterday morning, when a handcar, passing over the track ahead of a passenger train, was thrown from the track and one of the section hands was severely injured.

On investigation an old drawbar, used for coupling, was found securely tied inside in such a position as almost to pass unnoticed.

General Manager Bank said today: "We are making every effort to find the guilty parties and I regret exceedingly the matter has been made public before any arrests have been made."

Afoul of a Cow.

Seattle, Wash., July 10.—A serious wreck, though devoid of fatalities, occurred on the Great Northern line near Everett tonight, caused by colliding with a cow which insisted on approaching the train instead of going the other way. The entire train with the exception of the rear car, was thrown from the track and turned over. The engine was smashed to fragments. Save minor cuts and bruises no injuries were sustained.

BIG PIER IS BURNING

ANOTHER DISASTROUS CONFLAGRATION ON THE HOBOKEN WATER FRONT.

NEW YORK, July 10.—The Thingalla Line Pier, at Hoboken, is on fire. There were no steamers at the dock when the fire started. There were three explosions, and the whole front of the pier, on which a large quantity of merchandise was stored, collapsed and fell into the river. The loss is estimated at \$500,000.

There were 150 men on the pier when the fire broke out, and many of them had to jump into the river, their escape landward having been cut off. All were rescued. Several firemen were overcome fighting the fire.

A stampede occurred in a bathhouse adjoining the dock, and two children were injured.

TWO GIRLS DROWNED

CAUGHT BY UNDERTOW WHILE IN BATHING AT WADING RIVER, R. I.

NEW YORK, July 10.—Josie Merry, a young girl, and Miss Ashton, a professional nurse, have been drowned at Wading River, R. I., while bathing. Miss Ashton and another nurse went to Wading to visit a family by whom they had been employed. After dinner they went for a plunge in the surf. The Merry children begged to be taken along. While Miss Ashton and Josie were splashing about near shore they were caught by the undertow and dragged to their death. Miss Barker saved Josie's sister at the imminent risk of her own life.

RECORD WAS NOT BROKEN

Although it Was the Hottest July 10th in History

THIRTY - EIGHT DEATHS

And Eighty-Three Prostrations Occurred in Brooklyn and New York

MERCURY STOOD AT NINETY-FOUR DEGREES, AT 1:20 O'CLOCK, BUT DROPPED TO SEVENTY-NINE DEGREES BETWEEN 5 AND 7 O'CLOCK.

NEW YORK, July 10.—Thirty-eight deaths and eighty-three prostrations occurred in and around New York and Brooklyn today, the hottest July 10 in the history of the local Weather Bureau. The early threat of a temperature that would break all records, however, was not fulfilled.

At 1:20 the mercury stood at 94 degrees, but by 2 o'clock the temperature had fallen two degrees. At 8 o'clock tonight the temperature had fallen to 86 degrees, six degrees lower than at the same hour Thursday. Between 5 and 7 o'clock the temperature fell seven degrees, following a thunder storm southeast of the city.

The city had been sweltering so long in a hot wave, however, that it was hours before the offices and tenements began to feel the effect of cool weather. In the streets the cooling process was difficult, men, women and children crowding the walks to recover from the heat of the day. Many slept on the park benches and, when the police would permit it, in the grass.

Daniel Lewis, a heat-crazed negro, attacked with a club two girls who were carrying a large piece of ice. A mob quickly gathered and shouted, "Lynch him." Lewis was rescued by detectives and sent to the hospital. There was an intense heat throughout the state today. At Albany and Middletown there were many prostrations.

In Other Cities.

Philadelphia, Pa., July 10.—The hot weather of the past week continues. The maximum temperature today was 94 degrees. Several deaths and a large number of prostrations were reported.

St. Joseph, Mo., July 10.—The temperature was 100 degrees today. There were several prostrations.

St. Louis, Mo., July 10.—The hot weather was somewhat tempered today by a short but heavy shower about noon. The temperature was 96. Four prostrations were reported.

Indianapolis, Ind., July 10.—The mercury marked 94 degrees, the hottest of the year.

Louisville, Ky., July 10.—This was the hottest of the season, the thermometer registering 97 degrees. There were several prostrations.

GROG SHOPS OPEN AGAIN

THE BREMERTON SALOONS ARE PERMITTED BY THE COURT TO RUN.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 10.—The saloons in Bremerton, the little town near the Puget Sound Navy Yard, which were closed by the council a few weeks ago because the Navy Department objected to them, have all reopened despite the protest of the council. The keepers have sued in court to determine the right of the council to revoke their licenses and the courts have allowed the saloons to open until the case can be heard. More trouble is now expected from the Navy Yard, and it would not be surprising if an order issued directing all vessels to leave there that are now in dock for repairs.

A SAD HOME-COMING

WOMAN ABSENT TWENTY-ONE YEARS FINDS THINGS ARE CHANGED AT HOME.

ROCKFORD, Ill., July 10.—Mrs. Louise Olson was injured twenty-one years ago in a railway accident and supposed to be dead and buried. She, however, recovered but with her mind deranged. After years of wanderings she has returned home to find her husband married again and her two babes grown up.

MAY END STRIKE.

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 10.—With sockeye salmon running in the Fraser the strike of the fishermen has reached an acute stage. The Japanese Benevolent Society is standing by the whites in refusing the terms of the canners. There is every probability, however, if the fish keep on coming that the strike will come to a very sudden termination this week. The salmon season lasts for so brief a space that neither canners nor men can afford to keep trouble agog. The opinion prevails that the offer of 15 cents a fish for the two months will be accepted by the fishermen. The canners say the condition of the London market precludes them going even half a cent better.

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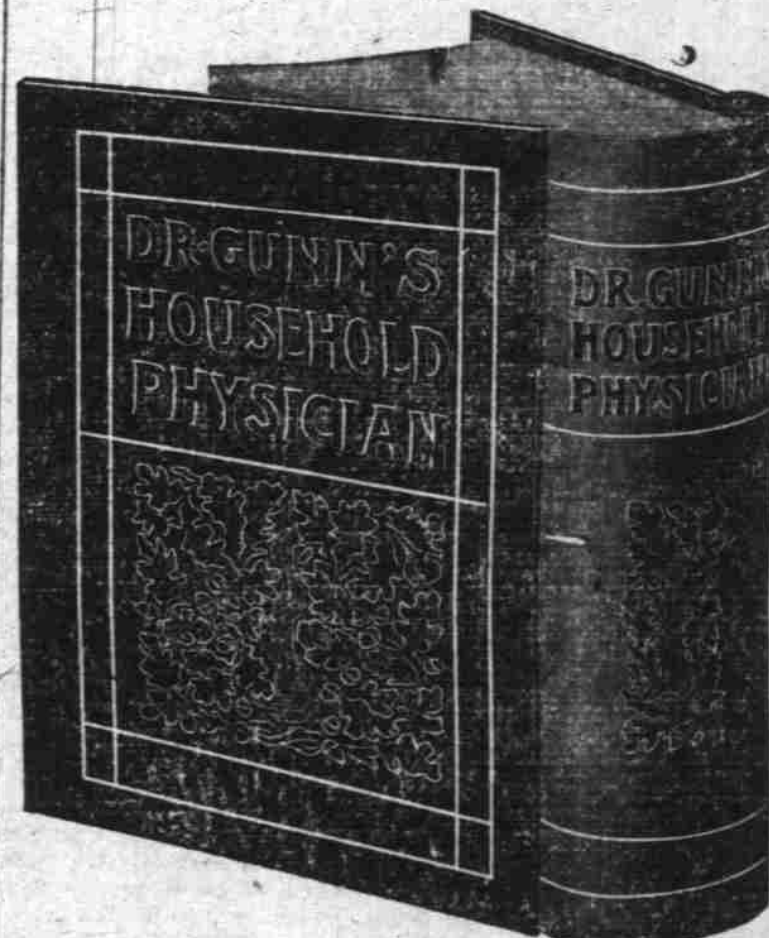
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
