PLANNED TO BREAK JAIL

A PLOT OF A MEMBER OF THE NOLAN GANG IS UNCOVERED.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15.—A daring plot to break jail on the part of Bernard Whitehead, one of the Nolan gang, awaiting trial on the charge of attacking and robbing aged Mrs. T. V. Matthews last March, was frustrated yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Samuel Bendit. Alarmed by persistent rumors that serious trouble was brewing, Bendit changed the prisoners' cells in the county jail. Then he searched the one recently occupied, and to his surprise found there, hidden in every conceivable place, almost all the tools and weapons needed by a desperate man to make his way to freedom.

From a mattress was taken a revolver fully loaded and with an extra supply of cartridges. Cleverly concealed in other parts of the room were a half dozen files for cutting through the steel cell door; chisel, a hammer, and a bottle filled with red pepper and morphine. The cunning of Whitehead in getting all the articles into his cell and then concealing them in such numbers is considered very little short of wonderful. For several days he has been very sulky, and his strange actions, considered in connection with the fact that he was desperate and would stop at no crime, led the jail authorities to make the investigation that led to the discovery of the plot.

KILLED GIRL THEN HIMSELF

A Double Tragedy Occurred in Baker County

TO ESCAPE THE OFFICERS

Who Were Close Upon Their Trail to Effect Their Arrest

A. A. EARL, MAN OF FAMILY, ELOPED WITH SIXTEEN-YEAR-OLD GIRL—FIERCE FIGHTING BETWEEN POLICE AND STRIKERS OF CHICAGO.

BAKER CITY, Ore., July 15.—A double tragedy occurred three miles east of Durkee, this county, this afternoon. A. A. Earl, of Caldwell, Idaho, killed a young girl known as Blossom then committed suicide to avoid arrest by pursuing officers.

Earl, who was a married man about 35 years old, with a wife and two children, eloped with a girl, who was between 15 and 16 years of age, Tuesday. They came to Huntington on the train this morning, then walked west on the O. R. & N. track.

Sheriff Watkins, of Canyon county, Idaho, and Deputy Sheriff Hanna, of this county, followed the couple. The officers struck the trail and overtook them on the railroad track three miles east of Durkee.

When the eloping couple discovered the officers were following them, they left the railroad and hid in the brush. The officers were searching for them when they heard two shots in quick succession about 100 yards away. They ran to the place and found the man had shot the girl, and then put a bullet through his own head. The girl lived about fifteen minutes. Earl lived three and a half hours. Neither one was conscious when the officers reached them. The girl lived with Mrs. Small on a ranch three miles from Caldwell. Earl was working at the ranch.

Many Heads Broken.

Chicago, July 15.—A desperate fight between the police and the strikers of the Kellogg Switchboard Company took place this afternoon and evening. In one instance the police opened fire with their revolvers, but nobody was injured.

The first fight occurred when a truck loaded with freight and escorted by police was passing the corner of Harrison and Peoria streets. A howling mob of a thousand men and boys was pelting the police with stones. The police endeavored to clear the street, when the workmen on a building showered them with bricks. One officer fired at the workmen and drove them from the place.

The climax came at Congress street and Ogden avenue, when a private watchman fired at the mob. The shot inflamed the mob and, with shouts and yells, they surged on the police. The officers fought with fists and clubs and put them to flight. A dozen men with broken heads were left lying in the street.

TO DIVE EIGHTY FEET

ALBANY HAS A YOUNG IMITATOR OF GREAT STEVE BRODIE.

ALBANY, Ore., July 15.—Albany is to be treated to a sensational performance next Sunday afternoon, when Herbert Sappington, a boy of this city, will dive from the Albany Steel Bridge into the Willamette River. Sappington will dive eighty feet from a place on the bridge near the Albany end into six feet of water, near where the Calapoia River flows into the Willamette. Ever since the recent carnival several Albany boys have been imitating the feats performed there. They have stretched a wire from a point on the bridge slanting to the ground several yards below, and have made arrangements in order to make a flying slide. Several of the boys have successfully performed this feat so that it has become tame, and they now intend to attempt something more difficult. The high dive was the most sensational and attractive feature of the recent carnival, and Sappington has volunteered to try that feat. The dive is scheduled to come off at 2 o'clock next Sunday afternoon.

Sappington is a young man who recently came to this city and is now making Albany his home. He is said to have had some experience as a diver, and his companions have confidence in his ability to make the eighty-foot dive next Sunday successfully. The proposed dive is attracting great attention among the boys of this city.

MAKES CONFESSION.

PENDLETON, Or., July 15.—Felix A. Doherty, a painter, was arrested here today on description sent from Franklin, Pa., from Sheriff Fred T. McCullin, of that county, offering a reward of \$50 for arrest and detention of Felix Doherty for the crime of embezzlement.

The man at first denied the charge, but after going to jail said he was the man wanted and that he was the treasurer of a local union in Franklin and absconded with the funds. He is willing to go back and have the matter settled. He has a wife and seven children in the East.

CHINESE MURDERED

THE SUPPOSED HEPPNER VICTIM WAS KILLED FOR HIS MONEY.

HEPPNER, Ore., July 15.—The Heppner Relief Committee received a telegram this morning that the dead body of a Chinese had been found late yesterday evening at the mouth of Willow Creek, near Heppner Junction,

and requested the committee to bury the body, supposing it to be that of a victim of the flood. It was ascertained that all Chinese have been accounted for. It now appears that the Chinese is a shepherd who has been herding the past year for Haner Bros., Long Creek. He came to Heppner last Friday, cashed a check for \$490 at the First National Bank and was later seen in company with Heppner Chinese. Saturday morning the herder and Heppner Chinese left ostensibly for Portland, the latter returning on the evening train. Later he left town and his present whereabouts are unknown. The evidence is strong that the herder was murdered by the Heppner Chinese for his money. The sheriff is endeavoring to unravel the mystery. As yet there is no clue to where the murderer is.

CONFUSION IN WALL STREET

A Break in Stocks Creates a Wild Panic

SHORTS SOON RECOVERED

By Reason of Bargain Hunters Covering Shorts and Investments

ISSUE OF SHORT TIME NOTES BY UNION PACIFIC, AND SMALLER LOANS BY OTHER COMPANIES, FOLLOWED BY BURLINGTON BORROWING \$5,000,000, CAUSES IT.

NEW YORK, July 15.—The demoralization in the stock market today made it one of the most disastrous days since the memorable panic, May 2, 1901. The new low records for the year were made in trading on a heavy volume of business. Some declines in the high grade investment stocks for the day ran all the way from four to seven points.

In the early dealings there was a rush to sell. Prices dropped sharply, and in some cases precipitately, a break of over fifty points being reported in St. Louis and San Francisco, and Chicago and Eastern Illinois certificates.

The decline was especially noteworthy, however, in such stocks as the St. Paul, New York Central, Union Pacific, Canadian Pacific, Missouri Pacific, United States Steel and General Electric. In the last half hour the covering of shorts and investments by the bargain hunters were responsible for partial recoveries.

Traders were naturally disposed to view the selling of high grade investment issues with considerable uneasiness on the theory that it represented forced selling by important interests who were compelled to part with their securities to raise funds to protect the speculative accounts elsewhere in the market.

Admittedly unfavorable impression was created by the announcement of the issue of short time notes by the Union Pacific to the amount of \$10,000,000, also smaller loans by several other railroad companies. Following the borrowing of \$5,000,000 by the Burlington, the action of the Union Pacific and other roads in going into the market for money, affords grounds for uneasiness in special articles, particularly as the companies are forced to pay stiff rates for their accommodation.

HE HANGED HIMSELF

ANDREW OLSEN, A SWEDEVILLE FARMER, COMMITS SUICIDE AT HIS HOME.

FOREST GROVE, July 15.—Coroner C. L. Large was summoned to Swedeville, near Beaverton, last night, to investigate the death of Andrew Olsen, who was found in a cabin on the C. L. Jacobson farm, hanging from the wall with a small rope around his neck, with his face within three inches of his bed. He had carefully planned the deed and had been dead about eighteen hours when found. Dr. W. P. Via stated to the jury that death was due to strangulation, and the verdict of the jury was that deceased came to his death while under a temporary aberration of mind, with suicidal intent. Deceased was born in Christiansburg, Norway and was 80 years of age. He came to Beaverton about seventeen years ago and had been in the employ of C. L. Jacobson since that time. He will be buried at Cedar Mills today.

HAS NO HOPE FOR POPE LEO

Dr. Mazzoni Says His Life Cannot Be Saved

IS BEYOND MEDICAL AID

And His Existence Can Only Be Prolonged by Science

WERE HE A YOUNGER MAN HE COULD RECOVER, BUT IN HIS EXTREME OLD AGE THERE IS NO FOUNDATION UPON WHICH TO BUILD.

LONDON, July 16.—A bulletin from Rome, timed 6:50 a. m., says the Pope passed a very restless night and his condition this morning is considerably worse.

ROME, July 16.—Dr. Mazzoni, in reply to the question: "Can the Pope recover?" gave the Associated Press the following signed statement:

"At the present moment the disease of His Holiness has lost its character of absolute gravity which it had at its acute period. It might be considered to have entered a period of possible solution. This might occur in a man of strong fiber and young, but it is impossible to entertain such a hope in the case of a man in his 94th year. With him physical energy, absolutely indispensable for recovery, is lacking."

Pope Leo's organism is perfect, and as such maintains itself after ninety-three years of uninterrupted work, but his motor force is no longer sufficient for the complex functions essential to life. In other words, the ninety-three years of Pope Leo bring him into that category of extraordinary longevity when life is destined to flicker out independent of the action of any pathological complications.

"The only service that science and affection can render is that of struggling to have a precious existence preserved as long as possible."

A Small Fortune.

Rome, July 15.—The total number of dispatches inquiring about the Pope's health which were received at the Vatican today reached 26,000, including some lengthy cables. The total cost of the telegrams is estimated at \$26,000. A large force is required to answer the messages.

COURT WAS IN DOUBT

JOSEPH RUSSELL TRIED ON THE CHARGE OF LARCENY OF CATTLE.

Joseph Russell was yesterday given a preliminary trial in the justice court of Silverton district. Russell was charged with the larceny of some cattle, of which his wife, from whom he has been separated for several years, claimed to be the owner, and which were by her sold to her father, D. A. Van Gorder during Mr. Russell's absence to Alaska. Both Mr. and Mrs. Russell claimed ownership of three head of cattle, and upon Russell's return from the north, he took possession of the stock, which resulted in his arrest.

The case was tried before Justice of the Peace Younggreen, five witnesses being introduced on the part of the state and two by the defense. The trial resulted in the acquittal of the defendant, the justice in rendering his decision saying that he was in doubt, from the testimony introduced, as to who was the owner of the cattle in dispute. It seems that the whole matter was nothing more than a family row.

During the progress of the trial the state was represented by Hon. L. J. Adams and M. Van Valkenburg, while A. E. Forward and L. H. McMahon, of this city, appeared for the defendant.

A DESPERATE DEED

SIX HIGHWAYMEN HOLD UP A CAR AND ROB THE PASSENGERS.

PORTLAND, Or., July 15.—With desperate daring and wantonness supreme six masked men held up car No. 31, of the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company, at the Southern Pacific crossing on East Eleventh, near Division street, at 11:45 o'clock last night, robbing the forty passengers and also shooting B. F. Day through the back with a .28-caliber revolver. A reward of \$500 has been offered by Chief of Police Hunt. There is not the slightest clue to the perpetrators, and no arrests have been made.

RUSSIANS GLOATING

HAVE NO IDEA OF WITHDRAWING TROOPS OR "CRAW" FISHING.

PORT ARTHUR, Manchuria, July 15.—The conference of the prominent Russian officials has ended. The exultation over Russia's increasing power in Manchuria was the dominant note in the gathering and the possibility of taking any backward steps are scoffed at. The continuance of the warlike preparations and of the intention to bring more troops to Manchuria are abundant.

KNOWN AT SUMPTER

JAMES STEWART, WHO SHOT HIS WIFE AND HIMSELF, WAS JEALOUS.

SUMPTER, Or., July 15.—The recent tragedy at Idaho Falls involved a well-known Sumpter couple, Mr. and Mrs. James Stewart, the principals, lived here two or three years and moved to Idaho Falls about one year ago.

From what can be learned at present Stewart became jealous of his wife's attentions to another man, and finding the two together he tried to shoot the man, but he got away. Stewart then turned the revolver upon his wife and shot her twice, after which he shot and instantly killed himself. At last report Mrs. Stewart was still alive, with little show of recovery. It is said she made a statement after the tragedy, claiming that her husband was justified in shooting her. Stewart's occupation here was that of a carpenter and teamster.

HE PAID HIS FINE

BUT THE MONEY WILL BE HELD PENDING DECISION OF THE DEPARTMENT.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 15.—Captain William W. Harts, U. S. A., who came from the Orient on the transport Thomas and who failed to declare 163 articles in his baggage subject to customs duty, today paid a fine of \$1571 to the collector. This money will be held subject to the decision of the Treasury Department, to which Captain Harts will appeal. The articles were appraised at \$657 and will be confiscated unless the Department decides favorably to Harts.

HE GOT THE LIMIT

JULIUS LEHMANN SENTENCED TO SEVEN YEARS IN BRIBERY CASE.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 15.—The jury in the case of Julius Lehmann, a former member of the House of Delegates, charged with bribery in connection with passing the city lighting bill, returned a verdict of guilty this afternoon. The punishment was fixed at seven years in the penitentiary, the maximum punishment for the crime.

LINEMAN REWARDED.

ASTORIA, Ore., July 15.—Andrew Brunold, of this city, has been appointed manager of the business of the Oregon Telephone Company, in this city and Pacific county, Washington. Until a few days ago he was a lineman for the company. He refused to go on a strike when the other linemen of the company did so. His advancement is understood to be his reward.

HE JOLLIED THEM UP.

OYSTER BAY, L. I., July 15.—President and Mrs. Roosevelt dined on board the naval yacht Sylph tonight, as guests of the enlisted men. During the afternoon the President witnessed a boat race, the contestants being crews of the yacht Sylph. He added zest to the contest by offering a purse of \$35.

CHINESE FLOCKING IN.

TUCSON, Ariz., July 15.—A Steamer for Guaymas, Mexico, says the English tramp steamer landed 1400 Chinese here yesterday. During the last thirty days fully 3000 Chinese landed here.

WAS AN EASY WINNER.

NEW YORK, July 15.—The two Shamrocks took a sixteen-mile spin today and the new boat beat the old one about a minute and a half. The mast-head runner back on the Shamrock III fell, but no other damage resulted.

IS A DEFECT IN THE TITLE

Act of Legislature Does Not Compel Board to Sell School Land

STATE LAND BOARD OF THE OPINION THAT OLD ACT REGARDING SCHOOL LAND IS OPERATIVE AND THAT LAND MAY BE SOLD FOR \$1.25 PER ACRE.

(From Thursday's Daily.)

Application has been made to the State Land Board for the purchase of a tract of school land located within the boundaries of one of the proposed forest reserves in Eastern Oregon. This land has been withdrawn from sale by the State Land board for the reason that if the reserve should be created the land would probably be more valuable for "base" than for sale as school land. The applicant in this case contends, however, that the board has no right to refuse to sell any school land when the legal price, \$2.50 per acre, has been tendered.

The State Land Board, in considering the question, has discovered that there is a defect in the title of the act of the last Legislature which makes it doubtful whether the Legislature raised the price of school land to \$2.50 per acre and required the board to sell at that price. The title of the act refers to indemnity land, while the act itself applies to both indemnity land and school land. The board is inclined to the opinion that so much of the act as applies to school land is inoperative and that the old law is still in force on that subject. The old law authorizes the board to sell school land at any price not less than \$1.25 per acre. Under that law the board could withdraw the land from sale, or could fix the price at \$2.50, which was intended by the Legislature.

If the land should be placed in a forest reserve and could be used as a base, it would be worth \$5 an acre. For that reason purchasers are anxious to get it and the State Land Board is desirous of holding it. The question of law involved will be submitted to the Attorney General for his opinion.

WAS NOTHING DOING

MEETING OF OFFICERS OF THE COAST LEAGUES WITHOUT RESULT.

CHICAGO, July 15.—A conference was held tonight between President Henry Harris, of the San Francisco team, of the Pacific Coast League, and Secretary Farrell, of the National Association, professional baseball leagues the object of the meeting being the desire on the part of Farrell to promote peace in baseball circles on the Pacific coast and to bring all the factions into the organization he represents. Practically nothing came of the meeting, however.

NEW MEXICAN ROAD.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15.—Colonel John Weir has just arrived here from Mexico, where he has invested in a 2,500,000-acre tract of timber near the city of Chihuahua for himself and associates, Vice President Morton, of the Santa Fe, and Walter S. Eddy, a Saginaw lumberman. In order to make the land available, its owners, according to Colonel Weir, are contemplating the construction of sixty miles of railroad southwest of Terrazas, the southern terminus of the Rio Grande, Sierra Madre & Pacific Railroad, or about fifty-five miles northwest from Minaca, on the Chihuahua & Pacific Road, the connecting link in the new system of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railway. Part of the project is to have a portion of the newly acquired territory colonized by Boers.
