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CORONATION AUGUST NINTH

Pope Pius X, Leo's Successor, Assumes Holy Office

AND PONTIFICAL ROBES

His Election Unanimous and Was Certain After Monday's Balloting

WILL FOLLOW LEO'S POLICY, ALTHOUGH HE MAY NOT ACCENTUATE IT—HE WAS OVERCOME WITH EMOTION WHEN ELECTION WAS ANNOUNCED.

Pope Pius X.
ROME, Aug. 4.—Cardinal Giuseppe Sarato was born at Riese, province of Venice, June 2, 1835. He was created Cardinal and Patriarch of Venice, June 12, 1893. He is learned in the ecclesiastical doctrines, is modest, energetic, a good administrator and organizer, a patron of the arts, and his seriousness always has been proverbial. He has been known for many years as one of the greatest preachers in the church. Cardinal Sarato belonged to the ecclesiastical congregation of bishops and regulars, sacred rights, indulgence and sacred relics. He enjoyed great popularity in his diocese. He is a moderate and agreeable man, highly cultured, very kind hearted and still strong and robust in spite of his 68 years. He has never taken great part in the political and public life of the church, but divided his time between good works and study. Although most faithful to the Holy See, he was presented to the King and Queen of Italy in Venice. He was considered among the more liberal members of the Italian episcopate and Sacred College. It is stated that Pope Leo XIII sided with him on one occasion when Sarato disapproved Rampolla's policy.

ROME, Aug. 4.—The conclave, after being in session for four days, today elected Giuseppe Sarato, the Patriarch of Venice as Pope to succeed Leo XIII, and Sarato now reigns as the Vatican and over the Catholic world as Pope Pius X.

Tonight all Rome is illuminated in his honor. His election and assumption of his holy office were marked by a striking demonstration and impressive ceremonies at the Vatican which ended only this evening. Tomorrow the new Pope, clad in his new Pontifical robes, and with all the ritualistic ceremony, will receive the members of the diplomatic corps, the Cardinals and bishops, who will then offer their official homage, this notwithstanding the fact that twice today the Cardinals and many high officials of the Vatican went through a similar ceremony. The day on which the coronation of Pius X will take place has not yet been decided, but the impression prevails that it will take place on August 9.

A Disciple of Leo.

Rome, Aug. 4.—Although the election was over at 11 o'clock this morning and was announced to the world forty-five minutes later by the appearance of the new Pope at the window of St. Peter's, the conclave was not formally dissolved until 5:30 o'clock this afternoon. The Cardinals then returned to their various departments in Rome. The Cardinals will remain in Rome for tomorrow's ceremonies, and should the coronation be fixed for next Sunday, they are likely to remain until after the ceremony.

The election of the Patriarch of Venice was unanimous. After Monday's ballots it was a foregone conclusion he was the only candidate sufficiently acceptable to all to secure the necessary two-thirds the laws of the church require. One of the Cardinals said tonight he believed Pius X would follow Leo's policy, although he probably would not accentuate it. This voices the general feeling here.

Sarto Broke Down.

Rome, Aug. 4.—The members of the Sacred College declare they are satisfied with the election of Sarto, but the party opposed to Rampolla believe it their special victory. When the first ballot was taken it showed that the Sacred College was divided into two groups, the stronger one for Rampolla and the lesser one for Serafino Vannutelli. On the subsequent ballots, Sarto gradually gained until the ballot Monday afternoon, his vote was increased to thirty-seven, within six of the necessary two-thirds. When the result of this ballot was announced in the conclave, Cardinal Sarato was so overcome with emotion that he could no longer control his feelings, and declaring such a responsibility were not for him and he must refuse it, he elected Sarto. He broke down. The Cardinals spent much of the night in convincing him that his election was the will of Providence.

Several times he almost fainted and had to be revived by the use of salts. On the final ballot he looked a statue of resignation. Cardinal Casetta, as scrutineer, was reading out the vote. When forty-two votes had been recorded for Sarto, the scrutineer arose and lifting his red zucchetto, said: "We have elected a Pontiff."

The Cardinals, as of one accord, surrounded the new Pontiff and, according

to tradition, demanded to know if he would accept the Pontificate. Cardinal Sarato's lips trembled so that he could hardly articulate, but after a visible effort, he said: "If this cup cannot pass from me—No." Thereupon he replied firmly, "Yes."

Dr. apioni Appointed.
Rome, Aug. 4.—Pius X has given orders that he will receive the Papal coronation in great state tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. He has reappointed Dr. Lapponi Papal doctor.

SENTENCED TO PENITENTIARY

Ira Lathan Will Serve One Year There for Stealing Bicycles

THREE DIVORCES GRANTED—IN JUDGE BOISE'S COURT YESTERDAY—BOTH DEPARTMENTS WERE IN SESSION AND SEVERAL DOCKET ENTRIES MADE.

In Department No. 2 of the circuit court Judge Boise yesterday granted divorces in the case of Cora Whorley vs. A. H. Whorley, and Charlie R. Moore vs. Della N. Moore. In the first case desertion was pleaded and Mrs. Whorley was given a divorce with the custody of the two minor children, two boys aged 15 and 11 years. The defendant deserted his wife eight years ago and is now in Alaska. In the second case adultery was pleaded by Mr. Moore, who succeeded in proving that his once wife now resides on Ferry street, in Salem, Oregon, and the court granted the relief prayed for. Carey F. Martin, of the firm of Bonham & Martin appeared for plaintiff in both actions.

C. Pote was also granted a divorce from his wife, Jane Pote. In this case L. H. McMahon appeared as the attorney for the plaintiff.

In Department No. 1.
Ira D. Lathan was arraigned in Judge Burnett's court upon the charge of larceny in a store. The defendant waived counsel and entered a plea of guilty. He also waived time and was sentenced by the court to serve a term of one year in the Oregon State Penitentiary.

Lathan is the man who entered Roscoe Langley's bicycle establishment at Silverton on the night of July 16, and stole two bicycles, one of the stolen wheels being in his possession when arrested. He succeeded in eluding the officers for over a week, but was finally captured at Jefferson by Constable W. L. Jones.

It is supposed that Langley had accomplices when the crime was committed, but the officers have been unable to locate the other man or to find any trace of the missing wheel.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 4.—Ben Stroup, a workman on the railroad at Creswell, met with an accident yesterday that cost him his life. Some logs rolled internally. Stroup died on the train en route to Portland and he was badly injured bound for Portland.

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ARCH FIEND IS LYNCHED

The Cruel Fate of Little Mable Richards Is Avenged

CHILD OUTRAGED FIRST

Then Brains Were Mashed Out by Her Brutal Assaulter

WEALTHY FARMER CONFESSED TO CRIME AFTER ARREST AND ANGRY CITIZENS STRUNG HIM TO THE GUY WIRE OF A TELEPHONE POLE.

ASOTIN, Wash., Aug. 4.—Mabel Richards, 13-year-old daughter of Sheriff Richards of this county, disappeared last Sunday. Yesterday her body was found with the brains mashed out and an examination showed she had been brutally murdered. Suspicion was directed toward Wm. Hamilton, a well-to-do farmer, and after arrest he confessed.

The country for miles around was aroused by the heinousness of the crime and all day crowds have been gathered here with but one thought—that of lynching the confessed murderer.

At 12:15 this morning a mob of 1000 men stormed the county jail and gained possession of Hamilton and dragged him to the street. As the leaders emerged from the jail with the terror-stricken fiend the mob took up the cry and he was beaten, kicked and dragged to a point three blocks away, where he was hanged to the guy wire of a telephone pole.

CAPTAINS' HOT CONTEST

SHAMROCK I BLANKETED SEVEN TIME BY THE NEW CUP CHALLENGER.

ATLANTIC HIGHLANDS, Aug. 4.—Captain Winger, of the Shamrock III, and Captain Revis of Shamrock I, got into a hot contest in today's races. Captain Winger sent the challenger over the line with the old boat under her lee for a ten-mile beat to the windward, and run home on a rattling 22-knot breeze. Captain Revis fretted for fifteen minutes while his craft was blanketed by the challenger. Then he whirled the Shamrock I about on another tack. Captain Winger followed and again blanketed Revis' craft. The Shamrock I promptly tacked again, just as promptly the challenger whirled about. Seven tacks were made in three minutes. The seventh time Captain Revis got ahead while the challenger was filling away, and the Shamrock I got her wind clear, but she had not the heels to hold it. The Shamrock III was still to the windward and soon overhauled her pace-maker. The latter had to tack again. Captain Winger did not follow, but gave his attention to getting to the turning mark. After that the Shamrock I rapidly dropped astern and was beaten by seven minutes elapsed time.

ROOSTER LOCATED BODY

JAPANESE AT NANAIMO FOLLOW ANCIENT CUSTOM WITH SURPRISING SUCCESS.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 4.—Superstitious Japanese have a peculiar method of locating the corpse of a drowned person by invoking the aid of a rooster. The rooster, when liberated, is supposed to light in the water above the exact spot where the corpse is. There was a Japanese drowned near Nanaimo. Every attempt was made to find the body, but in vain. Early the next morning, just as dawn was breaking, three Japanese alighted from a buggy, carrying a slatted box, which contained a rooster. They went to the edge of the river, took out the rooster and threw him high in the air. He lit on the water near the far shore below the falls. The Japanese hurried across and found the corpse in three feet of water just where the rooster had lit.

PLACERVILLE, Cal., Aug. 4.—If the expectations of Sheriff Bosquit, of Eldorado, are realized there will be a fight in what is known as the Webber Creek country before another day has passed, with the escapee convicts.

C. H. Ferrell, who arrived here this afternoon from Reno with his trained bloodhounds, is with one of the possemen from Placerville and will put the bloodhounds on the trail tomorrow at a point near where the Webber creek joins the American river. It is known the convicts secured two cans of Cayenne pepper at Pilot Hill a week ago

POPE'S POLICY IS UNCERTAIN

Relations of Vatican and Quirinal to Remain Unchanged

FAVORS ROYAL FAMILY

But Is Unfavorable to Austria on Account of His Fatherland

ADMIRES PROGRESS OF CATHOLICISM IN AMERICA AND BELIEVES UNITED STATES FERTILE FIELD FOR THE CHURCH—A SUCCESSOR FOR RAMPOLLA.

ROME, Aug. 4.—There is much speculation regarding the political attitude of the new Pope inasmuch as he has not participated in the general affairs of the church during his career. The general opinion, however, is that he will make no changes in the relations between the Vatican and the Quirinal except, perhaps, to render them more courteous, inasmuch as he enjoys personal acquaintance with the King and the members of the royal family.

Queen Marguerita holds him almost as a friend. No one steps certainly will be to ameliorate the relations between the Vatican and France and to try and prevent a similar struggle against the congregation of the choice of a new Pope. The circumstance of his Holiness' mention of Cardinal Sarato is interesting. Father Lorenzo Perosi, musical director of the Sistine Chapel, and a favorite of the Pope, was conversing with him, when the Pope asked for news of Cardinal Sarato.

"Hold him very dear, Perosi," said Leo XIII. "In the future he will be able to do much for you." Then followed the definite prediction of his succession.

Cardinal Sarato is a great preacher, and a reformer of a type after the former Pontiff's own heart. As a member of the congregation of the Sacred Rites and Studies he caused the destruction of many so-called relics, venerable and sanctified persons, because their authenticity was open to doubt. He is also a member of the congregations of Bishops and Regulars, Sacred Rites and Indulgences.

Cardinal Sarato's whole life in the church has been that of parish priest. Born at Riese, in Northern Italy, in 1835, he was educated first in the seminary of the home diocese and then at the Sacred Theological, in Rome, where he began work as a priest in Venice and became Cardinal and patriarch of that province as late as 1893. He is well known as a writer and has shown a genius for organization, Venice alone of the large cities of Italy is the seat of a bishop, but has only a patriarchal rank. Cardinal Sarato, therefore, is not a bishop. His titular parish in Rome is annexed to his Cardinalate is that of San Bernardo.

It was Sarato who turned the career of Don Lorenzo Perosi to the church. Perosi has won great fame as a composer of sacred music, and encouraged by Pope Leo and Cardinal Sarato he has worked a definite reform in the music of the Catholic church at large.

SALMON RUN IS IMMENSE

Canneries Are Taxed to Utmost to Pack Enormous Catches

ON ACCOUNT OF LATENESS OF RUN AND FEAR OF SHORTAGE OF SUPPLY GOOD PRICE IS MAINTAINED—MUCH INTEREST IN REGATTA.

(Special to Statesman.)

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 5.—Since last Saturday there has been a large run of Chinook salmon in the river here, and for a time the canneries were blocked. This is the regular run of fish which formerly came in June, but which has been coming in later and later each year. Fishermen on Tuesday were receiving 4 cents a pound for their fish. The price has not dropped as fast as it would had the fish come earlier. There are two reasons. The canneries are far behind in their pack and want to receive fish to their limit, and the other reason is the run may drop off and leave some short. Fish have been stacked several feet deep in the canneries and boats lay at the canneries in strings to deliver fish. A common sight is to see the large gas-line launches so loaded with fish that their bows are down almost beneath the waves, while their propellers are churning half out of the water. It will be impossible for canneries to make up the pack, and some estimate that the pack will be 100,000 cases less this year than last.

Will Be a Success.

Astoria, Ore., Aug. 5.—Since the election Saturday evening of Miss Frances Thomas as Queen of the Regatta, to be held here the 19, 20 and 21 of this month, new interest has been added to the event, and the affair this year promises to be better than any so far held. Reports are being given out daily at Regatta headquarters of the acquisition of some new attraction. There will be crews of oarsmen from all along the coast, from San Francisco to Victoria, B. C., and these contests will make the Regatta something more than a local affair. It is being extensively advertised, and there is no reason why it should not be a great success this year.

A UNION SERVICE

REV. RITCHIE WILL PREACH HIS FAREWELL SERMON ON SUNDAY.

The First Christian church has called Rev. Davis Errett, of Waco, Texas, to be its pastor. Rev. Errett will commence his work here the 1st of October. Rev. Ritchie will preach his farewell sermon on next Sunday evening, at which time the other churches will join with the Christian church in a union service.

A TURNIP OUT OF SIGHT

Capt. Henry Sturges, who formerly worked and still occasionally works in Salem in the "art preservative of all arts," but who is now following the equally honorable occupation of a farmer in the red hills in Polk county, about four miles from Salem, has a story of a turnip that is out of sight. That is, the story is out of sight, and so is the turnip. The turnip was of the red top variety, and it weighed seven pounds and measured twenty-nine inches around the waist, or rather in circumference. The turnip grew on the farm of J. W. McDaniels, one of the red hill farmers, and a neighbor of Capt. Sturges, and the latter gentleman says there are plenty more like it, or a good deal like it, some smaller, and possibly some still larger. It was thought that possibly it was not all turnip; that it might be hollow or defective in the interior. But such was not the case. When it was cut it was found to be all turnip, and as good clear through as ever grew. It was cooked and eaten. Capt. Sturges did not eat all of it; he had some competent help, but he ate a goodly portion of it, and he calls as witnesses of the truth of his statement concerning its weight and size those who helped him in the eating thereof, viz: L. H. Andrews and wife, of Oregon City; J. A. Kremla and wife, of the Oak Grove road, and his own wife (though the latter would probably not be a competent witness in law). In further proof of the truth and veracity of the turnip story, Captain Sturges can show the table where it was eaten, and if this will not do, he invites any doubting Thomas to go over and see the other turnips in the garden of J. W. McDaniels. The red hills of Polk county is willing to go up against the rest of the world in the matter of raising big turnips, and good ones.

IS ENTITLED TO THE RATES

Companies Operating on Land Grant Roads Subject

ASTORIA AND COLUMBIA

Operating Over Northern Pacific in Oregon Refused the Rates

ATTORNEY GENERAL INSTRUCTED TO BRING SUIT TO RECOVER OVER CHARGES—OREGON SHORT LINE AND UNION PACIFIC REFUSE "SCABBY" SHEEP.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—The Secretary of War has approved the decision holding the Government is entitled to reduced rates over the tracks of the land grant railroads operated by other companies. The Astoria & Columbia River Railroad, operating its lines over the Northern Pacific Railroad in Oregon refused the land grant rate, and the Attorney General has been requested to bring suit to secure the overcharge.

Must Have Clearance.

Salt Lake, Aug. 4.—The Oregon Short Line and the Union Pacific railroads have announced that hereafter, owing to the prevalence of "scabby" sheep among the flocks of the West, they will refuse to carry over their roads consignments of sheep not accompanied by a clean bill of health from the United States Bureau of Animal Industry.

MR. SCHWAB RESIGNS

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—The resignation of Charles M. Schwab, as president of the United States Steel Corporation was tendered and accepted at a meeting of the directors today. The formal announcement of Mr. Schwab's resignation was made in the appended form:

"At the regular meeting of the directors of the United States Steel Corporation today, Mr. Schwab, in consequence of ill health, tendered his resignation as president, and it was accepted. W. E. Corry, who has been for some time performing the active duties of the president, was elected to the vacancy."
