

HEALTH BOARD WAS ELECTED

The Council Finally Decided to Take Action in the Matter

NEW BOARD IS COMPOSED OF REPRESENTATIVE BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL MEN OF SALEM—WILL BE REQUIRED TO APPOINT HEALTH OFFICER.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

The city council has at last taken action in the matter of improving the sanitary conditions of Salem. At the regular meeting held in the police court room at the city hall last evening, at which were present Recorder N. J. Judah, Aldermen Walker, Pohl, Stolz, Larsen, Hubbard, Catlin and Sims, Recorder Judah presiding in the absence of Mayor C. P. Bishop. Upon the motion of Alderman Stolz, the council proceeded with the election of a health board, as provided by the new charter. The motion was seconded by Alderman Catlin, and when put to a vote all the members present voted in the affirmative, with the exception of Aldermen Larsen and Pohl, who were opposed to the council taking action in the matter.

By request of Alderman Stolz, Dr. E. A. Pierce, a member of the State Health Board, who was present at the meeting, was called upon to address the council upon the sanitary conditions of Salem, and matters in general pertaining to the appointment of a city health board. Dr. Pierce stated that in company with Mr. Stolz he had visited different sections of the city from which complaints had been made to the authorities, and said he had found conditions which were simply beyond description. He stated that the stench from some of the cess-pools found almost in the heart of the city, was so foul that no human being could approach them within reasonable distance.

One of these was found on Oak street, near the Keeley Institute building. It was also found that a great deal of sewerage was turned into the bed of South Mill creek, where there was no water, the sewerage being allowed to remain on dry land. Several water-closets were found in different portions of the city which were not connected with the sewer, and the conditions surrounding them were "simply awful."

He told the members of the council that the typhoid fever epidemic in Salem had reached a stage where it was absolutely necessary that something be done. He said the disease had to be stamped out at the earliest possible moment, that the State Health Board was now waging war against the epidemic, and he asked the members of the council to take prompt action in the matter of appointing a city health board, which would co-operate with the State Board in this important and necessary movement. The doctor said it was necessary that the board be composed of men who would be fearless and aggressive, and who would carry out their important duty to the last letter of the law. He also stated that it was necessary that the council back up the board in their every action, and provide for the board such laws as would clothe it with full legal authority in all matters pertaining to sanitary conditions in Salem and the general health of her citizens.

At the conclusion of Dr. Pierce's remarks, the following business and professional men were placed in nomination for members of the board: J. B. T. Tutthill, Theo. M. Barr, C. S. Hamilton, Dr. W. C. Smith, C. A. Murphy, Dr. F. E. Smith, Jos. A. Bernardi, W. H. Holmes and D. Keeler.

The first ballot resulted in the election of J. B. T. Tutthill, C. S. Hamilton, Dr. F. E. Smith and W. H. Holmes. The second ballot resulted in a tie vote, Messrs Barr, Murphy and Bernardi each receiving two votes. On the third ballot Mr. Barr received three votes, Mr. Murphy two and Mr. Bernardi one.

On motion of Alderman Hubbard, Mr. Barr was declared elected, which completed the board. Alderman Stolz moved that the board, as elected, receive the unanimous endorsement of the council, which vote was carried. As soon as the new health board has performed its duties it will be required to appoint a health officer, whose salary is to be fixed by the council.

A large part of the credit for Salem being provided with a health board is due to Alderman Stolz, who has labored incessantly during the past few months to induce the council to take action in this matter. He tried at every meeting to have the members proceed with the election of a board, but not until last evening did his efforts bear fruit. Alderman Stolz should be heartily commended by the citizens of Salem for the deep interest he has, and is taking in a matter affecting the general health and reputation of the city, and for his untiring effort in bringing about the election of a health board.

Recorder Judah, as presiding officer during last evening's meeting, also put in a strong plea for favorable action in the matter, and further stated that when such a board was elected, the council should give it all possible support, and offer every assistance to enable the board to carry out its duties. He said if the council did not propose to do this it was better not to elect a board, as the board without the support and backing of the council would be practically powerless to carry out its duties.

Bicycle Ordinance Wavering.

Alderman Stolz moved that the ordinance committee be instructed to frame an ordinance providing for the building of bicycle paths as recommended by the ordinance committee at a previous meeting of the council. The motion was lost by a vote of 5 to 2. Alderman Hubbard then introduced a bill for an ordinance to repeal the new bicycle ordinance passed at the last regular session of the council. Alderman Stolz moved that the matter be laid on the table, but there being no second to the motion, the bill was read the first and second times and referred to the ordinance committee.

The monthly report of Recorder N. J. Judah for the month of July was read and approved, the report being in substance as follows:

In the police court there were fifteen cases, from which \$50 in fines was collected, two fines were suspended, one case dismissed, the balance being served out under commitment of fifteen days.

In the justice court there were four criminal cases in which the total justice's fees amounted to \$17.30, and the constable's fees to \$12.60.

The committee on licenses reported favorably on the bonds and applications of J. P. Rogers for three saloon licenses. The report was adopted and the licenses ordered issued.

Street Commissioner Griswold was instructed to build a cement walk six feet wide along the west side of 12th street from State south to the railroad switch, the same to be completed before October 1, 1903.

Alderman Pohl, chairman of the committee on fire and water, reported the work of attaching the new Fox boiler to the Silsby engine had been completed. It was moved and carried that the matter of the final test and the acceptance of the new boiler be referred to the committee on fire and water.

The matter of considering the readjusting of the ordinance licensing and regulating various callings and occupations in the city of Salem, was postponed until the first regular meeting of the council in September.

The ordinance granting a right of way to the Oregon & California Railroad Company from its track on Trade street to a point in block 19, was read the third time and passed by a unanimous vote.

The committee on ways and means was granted further time in which to report upon the claim for \$70 damages filed at the last meeting of the council by F. A. Sutton.

Colonel J. Olmsted was granted permission to erect a temporary iron shed over the boiler used by the Salem Steam Laundry.

H. S. Gile petitioned the council for permission to erect a shed platform between the agricultural works building and the railroad switch on Trade street. The matter was referred to the committee on streets and public property with instructions to report upon the same at the next regular meeting of the council.

The regular bills against the city were read and approved, after which the council adjourned.

CLOSING GAME WAS A FLUKE

Roseburg Management Suffered Attack of Frigidity of Pedal Extremities

GAME AND VALLEY LEAGUE PENNANT FORFEITED TO RAGLANS BECAUSE SALEM MANAGERS WOULD NOT CONSENT TO GRAYS' HIRED UMPIRE.

A more disappointed or disgusted crowd of baseball enthusiasts could hardly be imagined than that which assembled at C. A. A. C. Park on Sunday afternoon last with pleasurable anticipations of the promised game of ball between Salem and Roseburg, the last game of the season and the decisive one for the League pennant, and bid fair to be the fastest of the entire series. It was not to be, however, for long before arriving in the Capital City the management of the Stalwart Grays had made up its mind that the game would not be played and they had no intention of playing it when they came down from Eugene.

So far as Salem engaging "borrowed" players for the game was concerned, the Roseburg manager forgot to mention that they had an agent in Portland the latter part of last week and had engaged several league men for the game, but, having decided to "flunk," the deal was called off and, with the exception of O'Day and Shanahan, the two best players of the Eugene team, Paul Engle and Kostani, two league pitchers, the team appeared on the field as when they first arrived.

As evidence that the Roseburg team never had any intention of playing the game, and has been looking for the best of it one of the members of the Roseburg team in the name of its manager, called up the manager of the Salem team and stated that the Eugene team had offered Roseburg one-half of the gate receipts if they would play their postponed game with Eugene in the latter place on Sunday, and that if Salem would not make the same concession they would be constrained to accept Eugene's proposition. The representative of the Salem team informed the Roseburg spokesman that acceptance of such a proposition was entirely out of the question, and that if Roseburg desired to play Eugene on Sunday, and forfeit the game with Salem, it was their privilege to do so. Later the manager of the Eugene team called the manager of the Salem team by phone and said that the manager of the Roseburg team had informed him that Salem had promised them one-half of the gate receipts to play there on Sunday. The managers of the Salem and Eugene teams thereupon decided that Roseburg was fishing to sell out to the highest bidder on a pretty bit of flimflam, and they both turned the confidence game down, with the result that Roseburg went to Eugene and played on Saturday, and came to Salem to play on Sunday, as was originally scheduled.

Roseburg won the game from Eugene by a score of 7 to 5, and came to Salem apparently with the intention of fulfilling the agreement. When the team arrived at the grounds, however, and all was in readiness for the game, for want of another excuse, the Roseburg management objected to McCormick, the official umpire of the league for Albany and Salem, and insisted that Rankin, of Portland, whom they had brought along with them, officiate at the game, asserting that President Turner, of the League, had so designated. The Salem management wired Mr. Turner upon the matter, and received the answer that McCormick, or nobody, should umpire the game, disclaiming all knowledge of Roseburg's contention.

Thereupon Salem refused to accept any other umpire or to compromise, having two umpires, and the Roseburg team left the field and forfeited the game to Salem, also the pennant for the Willamette Valley League, by a score of 9 to 0.

There are others, however, who will say that the management of the Salem team was altogether too selfish in the matter, as they should have been ready to make any kind of a reasonable concession to the Roseburg team in order to have played the game, in justice to the Roseburg team, themselves and the great crowd of spectators who had paid their money twice to see this game and then had to go away disappointed. The Salem management could have afforded to have devoted a small percentage of the gate receipts toward helping out the visitors, who were somewhat behind in their expenses for the season, and it could have at least been arranged so that there would have been two umpires for the game, which is often the case in big games. However, the whole thing has blown over and there is no use crying over spilled milk.

Being prepared for such an emergency, and rather anticipating it, two teams were made up with the regular team, and the new men engaged for the game, with Whalen, San Francisco's crack pitcher, and Danny Shea, the Portland Brown's fast catcher, as the battery for the make-up team, and Morris and Teabo, Salem's star battery, for the regular team. Andrews, the Brown's speedy third baseman, played third bag for the make-up, with the result that a twelve-inning game of the most interesting character followed, a better game by far than Roseburg could have put up. The score was 6 to 5 in favor of the make-up. The game was a most exciting and fast one from start to finish, and the crowd was pleased with the sport, notwithstanding the disappointment over the failure of the regular scheduled game. The forfeiture of the game gives the Salem team the undisputed claim up to the pennant of the Willamette Valley League.

Features of Game. Barring several errors made by some of the players on both teams, the game was a very interesting one, and had there been anything at stake would have been a most exciting one. The disappointment over the regular game, however, was very keen, and could not be entirely overcome, either by the crowd of spectators or the players themselves.

There were numerous redeeming features of the game, however, notwithstanding the low ebb of enthusiasm, that did not fail to elicit great applause and there were none who would not say that they had received the worth of their money, although several took their departure and their money back before the game on account of the delay in getting it started.

Among the best features of the game was the splendid work of both batteries, with neither Morris nor Whalen exerted themselves in any particular, and as everybody was familiar with Morris' work in the box, there were many expressions of disappointment on account of not being able to see Whalen (better known as "Jimmy the whale") and "Battle Axe" Shea in action, for they had come here with the express determination of shutting the Grays out, and they doubtless have no doubt accomplished their purpose. It is probably due to the Grays' conviction of this fact the game was called off. Andrews, the Browns' third baseman, who held down the third station for the make-up team, is a regular warhorse on the diamond and he entered into the spirit of the game with as much vim and vigor as though the pennant of the Pacific Coast League were at stake. He was in the game at all stages and made some exceedingly brilliant plays. His hitting, like that of Whalen and Shea, was beyond reproach. There were others who are entitled to special mention, such as Downie, the young "whirlwind," Manager Irwin, who held down first base for the make-up, and played a star game. Reilly, Southwick, who makes some excellent and successful efforts in the right field; everybody knows what an excellent record Freddie Ross has in this position, and his work on Sunday was no disappointment; Patterson, who always plays a star game at shortstop; Cop Haynes, Salem's fast and sure first baseman, and O'Man Teabo, behind the bat. Joe made some splendid stops and catches, and his work was strictly up to the standard, which is saying a good deal. Cornford, Salem's swift and unerring left fielder, deserves especial mention for his faithful and excellent work throughout the season and it may be said here that in recognition of his ability he has been offered a similar position on the Central, Wash. team, which he accepted, and departed on Monday to don the glove for the balance of the season with that aggregation.

There were many good plays during the game, but the one which incited the most enthusiasm was in the ninth inning, the score a tie, when Sam Morris hit a whopper far into center field. Moshberger, make a splendid effort to get it but it was too heavy and he dropped, and Morris was making the best of the delay in a mad race to circle the arena and score a run. This was not to be, however, for Moshberger fielded the ball, threw it to Lavier at short, who, in turn, relayed it to Whalen and Whalen to Shea, catching Morris within three steps of home plate, and running like mad. Three assists were credited to this one play.

It is to be regretted that the baseball season has come to such a sudden termination, right in the midst of the summer, when the enthusiasm had just arisen to fever heat, but there is one thing certain, there will be baseball next year, more of it and faster, and some just as good exhibitions of the great National game will be witnessed just as soon as the Salem team can be seen in any league. This much if no more will have been accomplished and that is a good deal.

TO FRAME NEW CONSTITUTION

Unions Pass Resolutions Favoring Calling of Constitutional Convention

PROVIDING SUPREME COURT SUSTAINS DECISION OF MULTNOMAH CIRCUIT COURT HOLDING INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM AMENDMENT INVALID.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

The regular meeting of Salem Central Union was held last evening in Union Hall, State street. Routine business was transacted and the following resolution was passed unanimously:

"Resolved, by the Salem Central Labor Union, that if the Supreme Court of Oregon shall sustain the decision of the Circuit Court of Multnomah county regarding the initiative and referendum, we will exert our utmost efforts to have the Legislative Assembly in 1905 call a Constitutional convention at the earliest possible date for the purpose of submitting to the people of Oregon a new constitution, and will unite with all other good citizens in making the initiative and referendum a part of the new constitution."

The delegation from the Plumbers' Union reported that Burrows & Frazer have signed a contract with their union, which was a very pleasing occurrence to all the boys.

The Labor Day committee is hard at work for a big celebration here on Labor Day. The boys of the committee are hustlers and there will be something doing in Salem among the union boys.

At a special meeting held by Salem Central Union a week ago the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Company was declared unfair.

By this latter action it can very readily be seen that to a certain extent the local trades' unions will take a hand in the matter and a movement is on foot to declare a boycott upon the local telephone office. This, however, remains for the local linenmen-members of the Electrical Workers' Union to bring about and, it is understood they are working assiduously in that direction. Whether their efforts will bear sufficient fruit to have any effect upon the business of the local office remains to be seen, but, inasmuch as there is only one service in the city and the telephone has become an indispensable necessity in the office and household, it is not thought that the union men of the city, much less the business men, can be induced to discontinue the service for any length of time, if at all.

A communication to the local unions, however, states that a telephone company from Toledo, Ohio, is now negotiating for the installment of an office in Portland and intends to extend its service to this city and all over the coast. Manager Dancy says that the strike is having no perceptible effect upon the business of his office and that his work is being pursued unhampered and he does not anticipate any serious interference whatever.
