

SULTAN CALLS HIS RESERVES

There Will Be 350 Battalions in Macedonia

WILL MAKE MIGHTY FORCE

Almost Double the Number Used in Turkey's War With Greece

THE TURKISH CLAIMS IT WILL MAINTAIN ORDER IN THE TROUBLED DISTRICTS AT ALL HAZARDS—NO WAR DECLARED AGAINST BULGARIA.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 26.—The government has decided to call to the colors all the remaining European reserves belonging to the Second and Third Army Corps, and a number of other reserves, which will bring the total of the Turkish soldiers in Macedonia up to 350 battalions, or almost double the force utilized in the Greco-Turkish war. The enrollment of such large bodies of troops indicates the seriousness with which Turkey views the situation, and her determination to use all the means at her disposal to repress the rebellion. Ibrahim Pasha, the new commander of the troops, is a young and capable officer. Seven battalions have been dispatched to Florina from Monastir.

The walls of Monastir and Salonica telegraph that they are now unable to guarantee the maintenance of order in their respective towns.

London, Aug. 26.—According to a Sofia telegram to the Times, the Turkish representative measures in Macedonia have reached the utmost limits of barbarism and it is evident that it is the intention to accomplish by degrees the total extermination of the Bulgarian population.

Turks Butcher Helpless.

Within the last few days, says the Times correspondent, 12 more Christian villages have been handed over to fire and sword, and women, children and the aged have been massacred indiscriminately. Convoys of prisoners despatched to Monastir have been murdered by their escorts on the way. A private letter from a foreign resident in Monastir says even the local Turks are disgusted and meditate assassinating the Consuls in order to provoke European intervention.

Revenge of Insurgents.

The insurgents are doubtless taking a terrible revenge and are executing the revolutionary program to the letter. The reported concentration of large Turkish forces in the Adrianople district at Mustafa-Pasha, Kizilgach and other points on the Bulgarian frontier is regarded with much apprehension in Sofia, as it is well known that in case of war an invasion would occur from this direction.

Powers Take Gloomy View.

In the special dispatches from the East, published this morning, a gloomy view is taken of the crisis in the Balkans. According to reports from Constantinople a rumor was current that war had already been declared against Bulgaria. It was proved to be unfounded, but the state of popular feeling is said to be such that no other issue is regarded as possible. It is further stated that although the Russian squadron was withdrawn from India it continues to cruise near the Bosporus. It is reported that several Italian ships have been ordered by Turkey to leave the Adriatic, 53 miles southeast of Constantinople.

Servia Suppresses Macedonia.

From Belgrade it is announced that a big mass-meeting of Macedonians intended to be held August 23 was postponed to August 29 by order of the government on account of Turkish protests. It is also stated from Monastir that the revolutionary committee are appealing to the Christian population to refuse to pay taxes and that their appeal is meeting with much success.

Turkey Acts Under Powers' Advice.

In taking more energetic measures for the suppression of the revolution, Turkey is acting in accordance with the advice of the powers. The forthcoming conference of King Edward with Emperor Francis Joseph and King George of Greece at Vienna, and the visits of the Czar and Emperor William to Vienna, will enable the monarchs to discuss Balkan affairs thoroughly, and before the conclusion of the conference Turkey proposes so far as possible to restore order, so that international action will be unnecessary.

HE HAS NOT LOST HOPE

Still Thinks Shamrock III Can Win the Race

LIPTON A GOOD LOSER

If Beaten He Will Take His Defeat in Proper Spirit

TOM JOHNSON IS ON TOP

Nominated by Ohio Democrats for Governor

IT WAS MADE UNANIMOUS

The Zimmerman Forces Were Licked to a Standstill

THE PARTY ORGANIZATION IS LEFT IN THE HANDS OF THE BRYAN-JOHNSON ELEMENT AND THE STREET CAR MAGNATE RULES THE ROOST.

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 26.—The Democratic state convention met here today and nominated the following ticket: Governor, Tom L. Johnson, Cleveland; Lieutenant Governor, Frank B. Niles, Toledo; Supreme Judge, Edward D. Dempsey, Cincinnati; Attorney General, Frank S. Monnett; Treasurer, Chas. A. Klobb, Wapakoneta; School Commissioner, J. H. Secrest, Ottawa; Member Board Public Works, T. H. B. Jones, Ironton; United States Senator, John S. Clarke, Cleveland. Johnson's program was carried out completely.

After the opposition had obstructed the proceedings with minority reports for some hours, the name of John L. Zimmerman, of Springfield, was not presented for gubernatorial nomination and then every nomination on the state ticket was made by acclamation without opposition. Even after the chair announced that the name of Tom L. Johnson was the only one before the convention for Governor, there were some dissenting Zimmerman votes on the motion to make the nomination unanimous, but the Zimmerman men quit after the selections for Governor and Senator were made.

The only fight that worried the Johnson managers was on the Senatorship. A minority report on rules and order of business, which was intended to omit the endorsement of a Senatorial candidate, was defeated by a vote of 211 yeas to 44 nays, and that was considered a test vote between Johnson and Zimmerman. The result of the convention leaves the party organization eighteen to three in the hands of the Bryan-Johnson element for next year's convention, when delegates to the Democratic national convention are to be selected.

Victory For Fusion.

OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 25.—The result of last night's Democratic and Populist convention is generally accepted as a complete victory for the fusion forces of the State as opposed to the middle-of-roads.

HE HAS NOT LOST HOPE

Still Thinks Shamrock III Can Win the Race

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SIR THOMAS WOULD CONSIDER PROPOSITION OF FOUR CORNERED RACE BETWEEN SHAMROCK III, RELIANCE, COLUMBIA AND CONSTITUTION—THE WEATHER FORECAST FOR TODAY.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—Sir Thomas Lipton said this afternoon in response to a telegram, hoping he would win tomorrow: "I have not lost hope, and I shall fight defeat hard. If I cannot win I will take my defeat in the proper spirit."

In response to a query as to whether he had been asked to have a four-cornered race between Shamrock III, Reliance, Columbia and Constitution, he said he had not, but that if such a proposition should be made, he would undoubtedly consider it. He did not care to have it understood that he was taking the initiative.

May Not Race Today.

New York, Aug. 26.—The wind at Sandy Hook at midnight was from the southeast and was blowing at the rate of about three miles an hour. The sky is cloudy and the prospects for a race tomorrow appear poor.

SAVED HIS BROTHER

REMARKABLE STRENGTH OF NEW YORK MAN IN SAVING HIS BROTHER.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—From an insecure position on a window sill 90 feet from the ground, George Brunner saved his brother Edward from being dashed to death on the paved court below, by the fall of a swinging scaffold. William Carpenter was instantly killed and the lives of the two brothers were saved only by the great strength and agility of George Brunner, who caught and held his brother with his left arm, while clinging to the wall with his right.

Three men were painting a public school in West Forty-fourth street and had suspended a scaffold from the roof. A chimney from which one end of the scaffold was hung gave way, and Carpenter fell to the ground. Edward Brunner had just stepped from a fifth story window to the other end of the scaffold, and fell past the window in which his brother was standing. With one arm the brother grasped him as he fell.

CANDIDATES FIGHT

JUDGE OF SUPREME COURT OF ARKANSAS STRIKES THE GOVERNOR.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 26.—A special to the Post-Dispatch from Little Rock, Ark., says: Judge Carroll T. Wood, of the Arkansas Supreme Court, who is opposing Governor Davis as candidate for the third term, knocked Governor Davis off a speaking platform, four feet to the ground, during the campaign at Bismarck yesterday. Governor Davis was not hurt, and friends prevented further trouble. Judge Wood was immediately arrested on a charge of assault and battery. Governor Davis had publicly asked Judge Wood questions and before they could be fully answered, interrupted with more questions which so angered

Judge Wood that he knocked Governor Davis from the platform.

Later the matter was adjusted and Judge Wood returned to Little Rock today.

TANNERY FOR ALBANY.

ALBANY, Or., Aug. 25.—Work has commenced on the new tannery in this city. It will be located on Water street, near the Willamette river, just above the Corvallis & Eastern railroad bridge. The tannery will be managed by J. T. Shea, the former manager of the one which has been in operation in this city for several years.

ON THE TOP OF MT. JEFFERSON

The Topmost Pinnacle of the Snowy Sentinel Was Reached

FOURTEEN WHITE MOUNTAIN PEAKS WERE IN VIEW FROM THE POINT OF VANTAGE OVERLOOKING THE WILLAMETTE VALLEY AND THE INLAND EMPIRE.

OREGON CITY, Aug. 26.—S. S. Mohler returned Monday from a trip through the mountains on the headwaters of the Clackamas, and made a remarkable ascent of Mount Jefferson. He considers it unlikely that any other man has ever reached the extreme peak of the mountain, and it was only after a hard and dangerous climb, taking all one day, that he was able to reach the summit. He planted a flag pole and flag on the topmost point of the mountain to prove his statement that he made the climb, but states that he would not repeat the feat for hundreds of dollars.

Mr. Mohler is an experienced mountaineer, and regards this one of the hardest climbs he has ever made. In fact, the ascent for the last 200 feet is almost as steep as a church spire, and is extremely dangerous and difficult. Although Mr. Mohler climbed the peak alone, without ropes or other helps, he also carried a camera and took several excellent views on the trip. From the summit he could see eight snow capped mountains to the south and six to the north. So steep is the peak of Mount Jefferson that the snow will not stick on it, the rock being bare. A resident of the district near the mountain did not credit the statement that Mr. Mohler had reached the summit, saying that there had been only one man at Detroit who was able to reach the top. But the flag and pole planted by the adventurous climber proves his claim that he made the ascent. He, however, found no evidence that any one had preceded him, and is of the opinion that he is the first to reach the summit.

Mr. Mohler was accompanied on the trip to the mountain by E. E. Charman and L. McMahon, both of this place. They were gone five weeks in all, and visited Table Rock, Elk Lake, the Panxy Mountains, besides traveling through the Cascades. They killed three deer on the trip, and caught over 700 trout. The party secured many excellent photographs of the scenes along the route, gaining some especially interesting views of the ice caves in the mountains. They will make these views into stereoscopic pictures.

The members of the party had a splendid trip, and believe it was a record breaking one in that one of their number was successful in reaching the top of the highest pinnacle of Mount Jefferson. Mr. Mohler found the summit so small that there was hardly room to sit down, but hung over the top with his feet on one side of the mountain and his head on the other.

(The above was printed in the Oregon City department of the Portland Evening Telegram of yesterday. The writer believes it is a mistake that this is the first ascent of Mount Jefferson. It is believed that E. C. Cross, of this city, made the ascent to the topmost pinnacle a few years ago, and probably George J. Pearce, of this city made the ascent also.)

HARVESTING IN POLK COUNTY.

DALLAS, Or., Aug. 25.—Grain harvesting in Polk county is well advanced, and the yield is much above the average. Great satisfaction is expressed by the farmers at the quantity, quality and the price of all kinds of cereals. Showers have somewhat retarded threshing but no damage has been done. Hops are rapidly approaching harvest, with some complaint that the damp weather is an encouragement to the increase of lice, a few of which are to be found in all the yards of the county. Pickers are reported to be in demand. Some yards have completed their crews. The prime crop will be abundant in all the well-cultivated orchards.

ALL WORKMEN TO TAKE OATH

Order of the Public Printer of United States

ORDER CREATES A STIR

The Printers and Bookbinders of Government Are Affected

EACH MAN WORKING IN THIS DEPARTMENT MUST TAKE THE OATH OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE UNITED STATES, NONE BEING EXEMPT.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—An order from the public printer, Palmer, was issued to the heads of divisions in the Government printing office today, to appear before a notary public and take the oath of allegiance to the United States, as subscribed to by the clerks under the civil service law. He said every employee of the office would be affected by the order.

The issuance of the order created considerable surprise among the employees of the office, especially among the members of the Bookbinders' Union, who believe it has indirectly a bearing on the issues growing out of the case of W. A. Miller, assistant foreman of binders, who was discharged from the office because he had been expelled from the local Bookbinders' Union, but was afterward reinstated by President Roosevelt.

CIRCUITS OUTLINED

REPRESENTATIVES OF BASEBALL LEAGUES HELD IMPORTANT MEETING.

BUFFALO, Aug. 26.—One of the most important meetings in the history of baseball ended tonight after a two days session. Representatives of the National American and National Association of Minor Leagues participated. James A. Hart, of Chicago, representative of the National League said:

"We have conceded practically every demand of the minor leagues. They will have absolute control of their internal affairs. The circuits of each major league shall consist of the following cities: National League—Boston, New York, Brooklyn, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Chicago, St. Louis, and Cincinnati; American League—Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Washington, Cleveland, Detroit, Chicago, and St. Louis."

AUBURN HOTEL BURNED

DANIEL CHRISTY AND ALBERT MATHER PERISHED IN THE FLAMES.

AUBURN, Cal., Aug. 26.—The Auburn hotel was totally destroyed by fire at an early hour this morning and two of the guests perished in the flames. Daniel Christy, a resident of Auburn for many years, had a room on the ground floor next the street, but deafness and other infirmities prevented his getting out of the house. From the position of the body it is evident he was either suffocated or struck by falling walls just as he was passing the door.

Albert Mather, a man about 22 years of age, had a rear room, and as the fire started in that part of the house, it is presumed he tried to make his escape through a front hallway, but was suffocated by the smoke.

When notified of his good fortune, Gros for a time could not remember his benefactor. After racking his memory, he recalled a day in 1898 when as he was fishing on a Strausburg dock, he rescued from drowning an elderly man whose sailboat had capsized. Gros said he did not learn the man's name for some time, and supposed the incident had been forgotten.

VISITED ALASKA

REVENUE CUTTER McCULLOCH ARRIVED AT VICTORIA WITH SENATORIAL PARTY.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 26.—The revenue cutter McCulloch arrived here today with the Senatorial party, which visited Alaska, on board. They went to Skagway, Dawson and Lower Yukon, and St. Michaels, where they boarded the McCulloch and visited the Pribiloff Seal Rookeries, on August 4. The party includes Senator Dillingham, of Vermont; Barnham, of New Hampshire; Patterson, of Colorado, and Nelson, of Minnesota.

TO RE-ESTABLISH STATION.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—Because of the increasing American interests on the Pacific Coast, it has been decided to re-establish the South Pacific station and to maintain a cruiser squadron there of from three to four protected cruisers.

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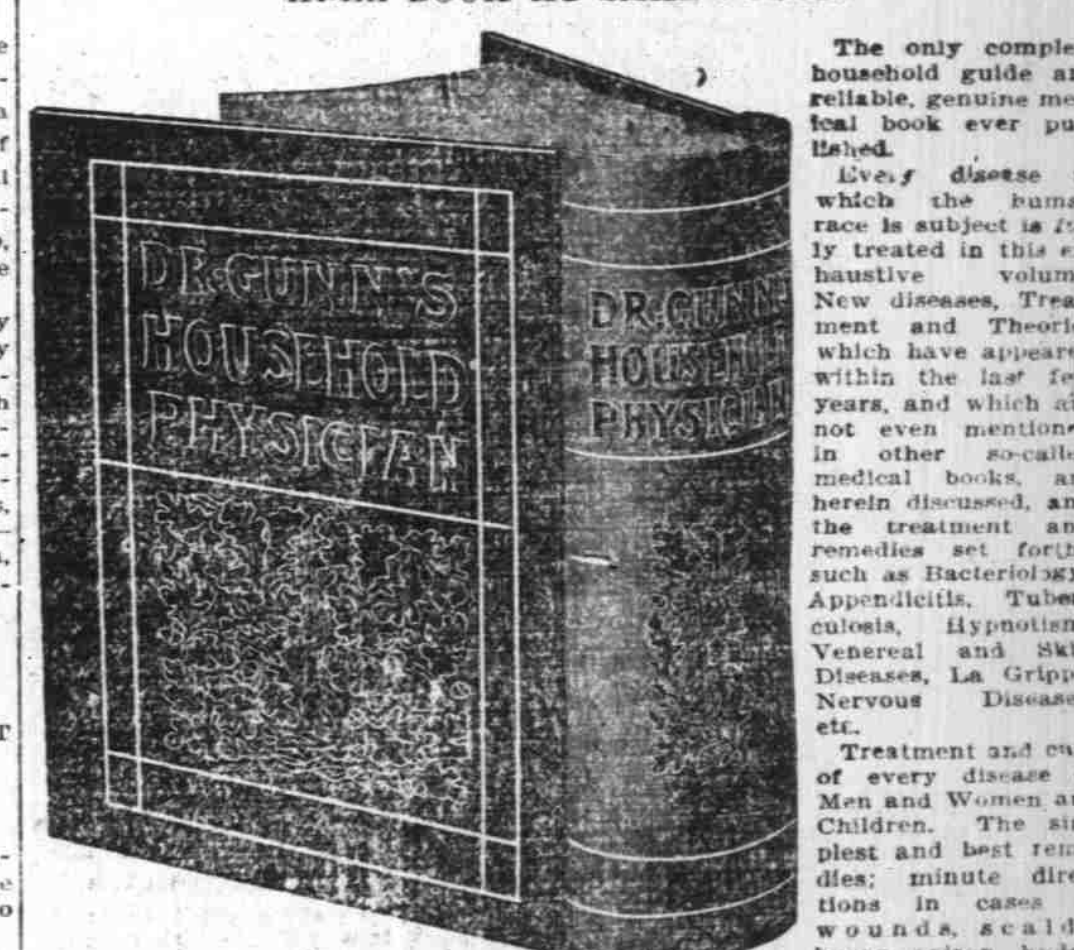

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OLD VESUVIUS GIVES A GRAND EXHIBITION

A Remarkable Spectacle Was Witnessed by the People of Naples at Noon Yesterday—The Mountain Opened Like a Huge Mouth and Belched Fiery Stream

NAPLES, Aug. 26.—The people in Naples and its environs witnessed a remarkable spectacle at noon today. One thousand feet below the central cone of Vesuvius the volcano opened like a huge mouth, out of which belched a fiery stream of lava, which ran down the side of the mountain. The eruption occurred without any warning whatever of an earthquake, detonation or rain of ashes; nothing

but a clear stream of lava and red hot stones which were thrown to a height of 700 feet, producing an extremely beautiful effect, which was seen from Naples. Those near the volcano were seized by a panic and rushed away from the adjacent country. The superstitious lower classes are agitating for the expulsion of Prof. Krull, of Munich, who predicted the eruption, declaring that he has an "evil eye."

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
