SHAMROCK WAS DEFEATED IN SECOND RACE OF SERIES

The Gallant Defender Reliance Shows Her Superiority Over Challenger

IT WAS A BEAUTIFUL RACE

Reliance Came Near Breaking Record Made by the Columbia

Captain Barr Out-Generaled Capt. Wringe From the Very Start of Race

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—In a glorious breeze, over the triangular course, ten miles to a leg, the fleet-footed Reliance again today showed her heels to Sir Thomas Lipton's challenger, taking the second race of the cup series by one minute and nineteen seconds. It was as pretty and hard fought a contest as has ever been sailed off Sandy Hook and had the wind not fallen during the last ten minutes, the record for the course, three hours, twelve minutes and fifteen seconds, made by the Columbia two years ago, would have been broken.

As it was the Reliance sailed thirty miles within two minutes and thirty seconds of the record. The Reliance's victory, narrow as it was, would have been even smaller had not Captain Wringe, the skipper of Shamrock III, bungled at the start, sending his craft over the line nineteen seconds after the last gun and handicapping her to that extent.

At every point of the sailing the defender's superiority was demonstrated. She gained one minute and fifty-five seconds in the windward work, forty seconds on the run to the second mark and forty-five seconds on the close reach for home.

Early morning had held out little hope of a race. A smoky haze hung over the sea, and the wind was very light from the south, but as the day wore on, the curtain lifted slightly and the wind blew strong and clean out of the south.

English Skipper Out-Generaled.

The course was a beat due south into the wind for ten miles, then a broad reach or run, as the case might be, thence home again. The spectators watched the jockeying for the start with eager interest. It was hair-raising to see what close company the giant single-stickers kept. It seemed momentarily as if the spars and hulls would clash, but they wheeled and circled like gulls. It was seen the American skipper, by clever work, had again out-generaled his rival and secured the weather gauge. Not only was the challenger's captain defeated in his effort to secure the windward berth, but he actually failed to cross in time to save the handicap, an almost unpardonable offense in a cup contest.

Barr never relinquished his advantage after the start, holding the challenger under his lee all the way to the first mark. Slowly but surely thousands aboard the observation fleet saw that the Reliance was gaining, opening wider the stretch of water between her and the challenger.

A Roaring Finish.

As soon as the Reliance rounded the mark the patrol flotilla blew their whistles, which sent the whole fleet toward the second mark. Bowling

along at a terrific pace came the yachts around the second mark. The Reliance sailed this leg of ten miles in fifty-six minutes and twenty seconds. The last leg was also covered at a roaring speed. The Reliance still increasing her lead with her wake streaming alee.

Just before the finish the wind died down, but the Reliance went across in ample time to win, having covered the ten miles in fifty-seven minutes and forty seconds.

There followed the usual riot of whistles, mingled with the wail of sirens, the clang of bells and the exultant shouts of the patriots and the booming of cannon. The Shamrock was about a mile astern and crossed four minutes and forty seconds later to the repetition of the riot which had welcomed the Reliance's victory.

The First Accident.

New York, Aug. 25.—The first serious accident which has marked the night race, home of the steamship fleet from the racing course took place tonight in a collision of J. P. Morgan's yacht Corsair with the fast Sandy Hook steamer Monmouth. The Corsair struck the Monmouth a glancing blow nearly amidships, her bowsprit raking the Monmouth's side, breaking the stanchions and awning supports and smashing the woodwork and glass. The Corsair fell astern carrying part of the twisted iron support on her bowsprit, but not appearing to be disabled. On the Monmouth there was a brief panic, many passengers on the side of the boat rushed away to safety. Several women fainted, but it is said no one was hurt.

Wireless Telegraphy a Failure.

New York, Aug. 25.—The experience of two years ago demonstrated the uncertainty of all wireless telegraphy, but no one was prepared for the utter collapse of the system which occurred today. There were four competing systems. The Marconi system, with all its careful preparation, was available for but a single message throughout the entire day. It would not have been so exasperating if the rival companies had been honestly striving to send their own bulletins but much of the interference was obviously malicious.

As Told by the Bulletin.

New York, Aug. 25.—10:09 A. M.—Both yachts have arrived at lights. Wind a little east to south, about seven knots.

10:25 A. M.—Regatta committee has just signalled a triangular course. The course is signalled south for the first leg. The other two legs will be northeast by east one-half east and northwest by west. The weather is getting a trifle thick.

10:46 A. M.—The preparatory signal was fired at 10:45 A. M. The starting gun was fired at 11 o'clock.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—Reliance crossed the line first. Official time of the start:

Reliance 11:00:35

Shamrock 11:02:00

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—Apparently Shamrock is handicapped about 25 seconds, as she crossed that mark after the handicap gun was fired. Reliance crossed the line on the starboard tack, but Shamrock held away too long, and was behind the handicap gun. She immediately on reaching the line came about and pointed for the Jersey shore.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—The yachts maintain their relative position, Sham-

rock pointing as high and as fast as Reliance. Wind fallen to five knots.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—11:25 A. M.—Reliance has a lead of a quarter of a mile.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—Reliance tacked to starboard having held port tack since 11:01:11. At 11:43:30 Shamrock went about on starboard tack, after getting to the weather of Reliance's wake. It looks as if Shamrock had gained on Reliance during the past few minutes.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—With strengthening wind Reliance has increased her lead to three-eighths of a mile.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—12:05 P. M.—Shamrock has been gaining on Reliance until she has secured windward position, but Reliance is fully a quarter of a mile in the lead.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—12:10 P. M.—Yachts still holding starboard tack. Are about opposite Megmouth, nearly five miles off shore. Reliance leading by quarter of a mile. Shamrock seems to point higher today than Reliance.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—12:30 P. M.—Reliance went on port tack at 12:21:05, Shamrock at 12:23:35. Weather very hazy; yachts difficult to discern.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—12:40 P. M.—As Reliance crossed the line a minute and 24 seconds ahead of Shamrock, she will have to lead the challenger at the finish at least three minutes and 21 seconds to win the race.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—1 P. M.—Yachts are still lost to view in the haze.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—By Marconi, 1:05 P. M.—Both boats have turned first mark and set spinnakers for run to second mark.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—1:36 P. M.—Part of the excursion fleet can be discerned well to the eastward from Highlands, and it looks as if the yachts were nearing the second mark.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—1:54 P. M.—One of the excursion steamers is coming in off shore, and heading for lights. It looks as if the yachts had turned the second mark.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—1:58 P. M.—Others of excursion fleet can be seen about the scene of the lights. The yachts, however, cannot be made out.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—2:02 P. M.—Movement of excursion fleet indicate yachts are four or five miles from finish. One yacht seems to be coming out of the haze four miles from the lights.

2:05 P. M.—Both yachts can now be seen, and the leading one is apparently a mile and a half ahead.

2:06 P. M.—Both yachts are now nearing the finish. Leading boat, which looks like Reliance, is about two miles from lights. If the leading boat should prove to be the Reliance it looks as if she would win the race by a margin of less than two minutes.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—Shamrock crossed finish line 2:19:20, unofficial.

2:14 P. M.—The leading boat crossed the finish line at 2:15:07, and Shamrock at 2:19:20, unofficial.

PRAIRIES LAID BARE

FOREST FIRE CAUSES HEAVY DAMAGE TO GRAZING LAND IN MONTANA.

HAVRE, Mont., Aug. 25.—A large area of prairie land has been burned over by the forest fire that has been raging for several days on the Canadian side of the international line, just north of Wild Horse Lake. As yet none of the hay meadows have been reached by the fire, although many miles of choice grazing land have been blackened in waste.

All the men available in the section have been fighting the fire since Friday noon. The origin of the fire is a mystery, although it is supposed that it was set by some campers or some round-up outfit.

BABY BURNED TO DEATH

THREE-YEAR-OLD MARGARET GRADY SETS FIRE TO HER CLOTHING.

BUTTE, Mont., Aug. 25.—While her parents were attending church, 3-year-

old Margaret Grady, daughter of Michael Grady, played with matches and was burned to death. No one was aware that anything was wrong until neighbors heard the child's agonizing shrieks and saw her run and fall from the porch, her clothing a mass of flames. When her parents returned the baby was dead. Its body had been literally cooked.

FIRST SHIPMENT OF NEW HOPS

Jos. Harris, the Salem representative of the firm of Benjamin Schwarz & Sons, of New York, will today make the first shipment of the new crop of Oregon hops. There are thirty-five bales of these hops, and they have been bought from Mr. Smede, of Eugene. They are of the Fuggies variety, the early variety, as is well known among hop men. The price paid Mr. Smede was 22c a pound, and the hops are consigned to the firm in New York.

AWFUL CRIME IS INCREASING

Blood-Thirsty Turks Commit More Atrocities

LREUSHEVO WAS RUINED

And Women and Children Are Exposed to the Weather Famine

CORPSES LYING ABOUT TOWN BEING DEVoured BY DOGS AND PIGS AND WOMEN BEING RAVISHED AND TORTURED—REVOLUTIONISTS MAKE TEN STRIKE.

MONASTIR, Aug. 25.—The once beautiful city of Kreushevo is a heap of ruins. The women and children homeless and exposed to the weather and famine. The town is rendered uninhabitable by the odor of corpses, which are being gnawed by the dogs and pigs. The Turks being informed of the capture of a town by the insurgents sent three squadrons of cavalry which were attacked and compelled to retire with a loss of 100 killed.

On August 13th the Turks concentrated seven battalions and one battery on Kreushevo. The Turks attacked a house seized money and jewels and ravished the women, those who resisted being killed. A Greek priest, who sought to protect his daughter, was killed. The girl's earrings were torn out and her hand chopped off to secure a bracelet.

Farewell Bashi Bazouks. Sofia, Aug. 25.—Eighteen revolutionists at Mahla attacked 250 Bashi Bazouks who entrenched themselves in a stone tower. The revolutionists blew up the tower with dynamite at night and killed all the Bashi Bazouks.

SUICIDE OR ACCIDENT

CORPSE OF JOHN FLYNN, COWBOY, FOUND IN YELLOWSTONE PARK.

MILES CITY, Mont., Aug. 25.—The corpse of John Flynn, who was recognized as one of the most expert horsemen and cowboys in this section of the state, was found floating in the Yellowstone river Sunday evening, about 40 miles from here. Flynn's friends scout the idea of suicide, and as no marks of violence were found on the body, it is presumed that his death was accidental, though Flynn was known to be a good swimmer. A boy said that he saw Flynn tie his horse to a tree, go down to the river and then disappear.

WILL CONTINUE TWO DAYS

WASHINGTON STATE BAR ASSOCIATION IN SESSION AT TACOMA.

TACOMA, Aug. 25.—There was a large attendance today at the annual meeting of the State Bar Association. This morning reports were read and President Hudson delivered an address. This afternoon Hon. Thomas Burke, of Seattle, delivered an address on the "Life and Character of the late Senator John B. Allen." The session will continue two days.

NOMINATED FOR SENATE

A. P. GORMAN, JR., IS THE CHOICE OF MARYLAND DEMOCRATS.

BALTIMORE, Md., Aug. 25.—A. P. Gorman, Jr., the only son of United States Senator Gorman, was nominated today by the Howard county Democratic convention for the State Senate. Gorman is 30 years old, and begins his political career where his father began thirty years ago.

WHALES DRIVEN ASHORE

SCHOOL OF 143 YOUNG LEVIATHANS ARE KILLED BY NATIVES.

ST. JOHNS, N. F., Aug. 25.—A school of 143 small whales has been driven ashore at St. Mary's bay and was unable to retreat. The residents, men and women, waded waist deep into the water and killed all the whales with hatchets, scythes and pitchforks.

ANOTHER TYPHOID CASE

Wayne Henry, of Zena, was brought to Salem yesterday and taken to the Salem Hospital. He has been sick for a week, and had developed a severe case of typhoid fever. Yesterday Mr. Henry's father telephoned for the ambulance, which went out and brought the sick young man to the hospital.

JOHNSON IS THE VICTOR

Named for Governor of Ohio by the Democrats

CONTROLLED CONVENTION

Through the Agency of the Ohio State Central Committee

CREDENTIALS FROM ALL COUNTIES WERE FIRST SUBMITTED TO THIS COMMITTEE, WHICH DECIDED IN FAVOR OF JOHNSON.

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 25.—The preliminary meetings this afternoon and evening of the Democratic State Convention resulted in favor of Mayor Tom L. Johnson, of Cleveland, in his contest with John L. Zimmerman, of Springfield, for the gubernatorial nomination.

Mayor Johnson had the uncontested control of the Democratic state committee last year, and the committee selected then, provided that the credentials from all counties were to be first submitted to the state central committee. The state central committee met today and passed upon the contests that effect 145 of the 690 delegates in favor of the Johnson men. The Johnson men secured the most of the members of the state central committee, which holds over to call the state convention next year when the delegates-at-large to the Democratic National Convention will be selected, and the endorsement be made for the Presidency.

Still Stick to Bryan.

Columbus, Neb., Aug. 25.—The Democratic state convention was called to order at 8:30 tonight. George L. Loomis was named as temporary chairman. He announced the nomination by the Populists at Grand Island of Judge John J. Sullivan, for Supreme Judge. Loomis then addressed the convention. The convention tonight reaffirmed the Kansas City platform.

Nominated a Democrat.

Grand Island, Neb., Aug. 25.—The Populist state convention met at 8 o'clock tonight. After a bitter discussion the fusionists showed a majority on the roll call. Judge John J. Sullivan (Democrat), the present Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, was renominated by acclamation. The convention nominated Prof. W. A. Jones and Dr. E. O. Weber (Populists) for regents of the State University.

FOR BETTER QUARTERS

MANY IMPROVEMENTS PLANNED FOR CONVENIENCE OF GARRISON.

ASTORIA, Or., Aug. 25.—The quartermaster's department of the United States Army has a number of improvements in contemplation for the convenience of the garrisons at the forts around the mouth of the river. Captain Goodale, constructing quartermaster, U. S. A., who is stationed here today, asked for proposals for one field officers' quarters and one set of double lieutenants' quarters at Fort Stevens, and is also authorized to ask for proposals for a hospital stewards' quarters. Plans are now being prepared for a set of officers' quarters and a double set of officers' quarters and a double set of non-commissioned officers' quarters at Fort Columbia, and an entirely new water and light plant for Fort Stevens will soon be contracted for.

MAN DIED TWICE

LAI D OUT FOR BURIAL WAKES UP, BUT SOON PASSES AWAY.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 25.—Dr. C. H. T. Atwood, a local physician, was called into the western portion of the county late last week and returned Sunday, saying that his patient had died before he could reach him. The man had behaved very much like a poisoned man, and was taken once for dead and laid out for burial. He was a lively corpse, however, and objected strenuously. But again he was taken suddenly worse and a physician was called, who was unable to do much for the man. Swidler is the man's name. He died Sunday morning while Dr. Atwood was on his way to attend him.

TO GIVE OREGON BOOST

O. R. & N. CO. WILL MAKE AN EXHIBIT AT NATIONAL IRRIGATION CONGRESS.

OGDEN, Utah, Aug. 25.—A. L. Craig, passenger agent of the O. R. & N. Co., has notified the officials of the National Irrigation Congress that his company will make an exhibition of fruits and barley, hops and sugar beets, grown on irrigated land in Oregon and along the line of the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company.

TWENTY-TWO FOR OLD HOPS

Julius Pincus, who has been working for local hop firms for some time, has gone into the business for himself. He is connected with his father and brother, who operate in Washington, in the Sound country, but he will conduct the Oregon end of the business in his own name. Yesterday Mr. Pincus bought twenty-five bales of the 1902 crop at 22c a pound, probably the highest price paid for old hops since last fall. The hops bought were from the Jacobson lot, in the Southern Pacific warehouse here. Last fall Mr. Jacobson was offered 25c a pound for the same lot of hops.
