WATER SUPPLY AND GENERAL SANITARY CONDITIONS OF CAP-ITAL CITY WAS THE GENERAL TOPIC OF THE DISCUSSIONS. WILL INVESTIGATE.

(From Saturday's Daily.)

Dr. Woods Hutchins, of Porland, the state health officer arrived in Salem last evening and will remain here a few days and coduct an investigation as to the sanitary conditions of this city. He was a guest at the meeting of the Marion County Medical Society held at the office of Drs. Morse & Robertson last evening, and during the meeting made an unofficial report of the recent examinations made of specimens of water taken from the streams and different wells in this city. In the specimens, which were examined both chemically and microscopically, there was nothing found to indicate the presence of typhoid or other disease germs. The examinations were made by the state biologist and by the State Health Board at Portland.

Dr. Hutchinson, during his stay in Salem, will investigate a number of the typhoid fever cases, in order to ascertain as many facts as possible in connection with the cases, looking toward the possibility of finding the source of the trouble, and also a remedy for it. He will also investigate the river front, the cesspools, sewers and everything of a similar nature emptying into Mili creek, also the closets not connected with sewers.

One conclusion arrived at by the doctors was that it is positively dangerous for anybody to use the water from any wells about this town unless the water is boiled, because of the fact that the formation of the soil here is suca that all wells are supplied with surface water and that the circulation of the water underground is so free that wells might easily be contaminated from distant sources on account of a lack of proper filtration.


