

BIG DISASTER THREATENED

A Repetition Of Johnstown Flood Is Feared

THE DANGER GUN IS FIRED

And the People of Patterson, N. J. Are Ready to Vacate

WATER FIFTY INCHES HIGHER THAN EVER BEFORE, AND DAM AT GREAT DUNDEE IS EXPECTED TO COLLAPSE—OVER \$2,000,000 DAMAGES.

PATERSON, N. J., Oct. 16.—The situation tonight is very grave.

The water is higher by fifty inches than in 1862. The damage is estimated at over \$2,000,000.

Men are guarding the gate across at the mill race and at the first indication that the gate will break the dam will be blown up with dynamite.

The people are expecting to go at any minute, and a gun has been fired as a signal of extreme danger.

At 1 o'clock tonight the water is within three inches of the boiler in the Madison Electric Light Works.

The bridge over the river is in danger of being blown up by one, causing a panic.

Passengers in Danger. New York, Oct. 10.—So far as New York City is concerned, the great flood storm is a thing of the past.

Atlantic City, Oct. 10.—The storm of yesterday and last night has abated somewhat, but the wind is blowing a gale.

No Damage in Baltimore. Baltimore, Oct. 10.—Several steamers were blown ashore by the severe north-west gale.
