EFFECT WILL BE BEAUTIFUL

Painting of Interior of Capitol Dome is Almost Done

PUTTING ON OF GOLD TRIMMING WELL UNDER WAY—DOME WILL BE STUDED WITH INCANDESCENT LIGHTS, ADDING BRILLIANCY TO BEAUTY.

(From Saturday's Daily.)

The work of painting and decorating the interior of the great dome of the State House is progressing slowly, but surely, and Mr. Frank Willman, who has the contract, with his corps of two assistants, expects to have finished the job complete within the next two weeks. The men have now been at work upon the job, which is a very tedious and arduous one, for nearly six weeks. The painting has been finished and now the most particular work of all, the finishing touches, that of putting on the gold leaf trimmings, is well under way.

The panels were first treated to a coat of lead, after which was put on what is called a Naples yellow tone with cream trimmings. The gold trimmings so far have been put on very sparingly, and to complete the job at this rate will require about thirty boxes of gold leaf, at \$8 per box, making the cost for gold alone \$240. Although the present style of trimming heightens the effect greatly and adds a very brilliant tone, Mr. Willman thinks that it should be put on more elaborately, and will probably ask permission to use about ten more boxes, in order that he may decorate some bead work underneath the shelving of the dome, which would add very materially to the beauty of the interior. When the painting and decorating of the dome is finished, the whole interior will be studied with incandescent electric lights, the effect of which will be to add a dazzling beauty very difficult to conceive. Around the base of the dome, above the shelving, will be placed a row of thirty lights provided with strong reflectors, so as to throw their rays upward; the center of the base of each panel is provided with a circular panel, three feet in diameter, and in the center of these panels, sixteen in all, will be placed an incandescent light. Then at the top will be set another circle of about sixteen lights, making over sixty all told, and when they are all lighted at night, only upon special occasions, it will produce an effect most beautiful and pleasing.

SOME PERMITS WERE REVOKED

Barbers Arrested And Fined For Violating State Barber Laws

STATE BOARD OF BARBER EXAMINERS DETERMINED TO ENFORCE LAWS—AN AMENDMENT TO BYLAWS ADOPTED—MEET AT MARSHFIELD NEXT WEEK.

(From Saturday's Daily.)

H. G. Meyer, secretary of the State Board of Barber Examiners, returned last night from Portland, the regular quarterly session of the board having been adjourned yesterday afternoon.

The board returned Thursday evening from La Grande, where they held a session, and examined applicants residing in the eastern part of the state. The board had notified sixteen barbers who were working without permits to appear and be examined for certificates, but only seven appeared, and the permits held by the remainder were all revoked and the holders notified that they would be prosecuted if they continued to practice their trade.

Three arrests were made in La Grande for violation of the state barber's law. E. H. Hubbard was working without a permit, and A. E. Keen, an apprentice, had not taken out a card. Both were employed by M. H. Kirkby, who was also arrested, charged with employing a man without a permit. Each victim was fined \$10 and costs, amounting to \$45.00 each.

In Portland the board examined forty-six applicants, eight of whom failed to receive the coveted certificate, and cannot continue work. The permits of ten Portland barbers were revoked because they failed to take the examinations.

The board has determined that barbers in Oregon live up to the law of the state, and any barber who secures a permit by paying the fee of \$5 and then fails to appear for examination at the next regular meeting of the board will have his permit revoked and be prosecuted if he continues to practice.

In order to make it easier for barbers on the coast they were not compelled to appear in Portland, and the board will leave Sunday night for Marshfield, where an examination will be given to all barbers with out certificates, and they have all been notified to appear. Complaint has been filed with the board that several barbers are practicing at Marshfield without permits. No action was taken in regard to the barbers' college being conducted in Portland, but the matter is still under consideration, and something will be done in the near future.

The board adopted a rule not to allow a person to practice the barber's law, who, holding a second permit, failed to pass the examination. The following amendment to section 9 of the bylaws was passed:

"Any person failing to pass the examination holding a second permit shall not pursue the business of a barber or apprentice or conduct a barber shop, tonorial parlor, shaving saloon, etc., within the state of Oregon until such time as under the rules and regulations of the board he shall be entitled to registration and certificate."

Provided that the board may grant any person a permit to serve as an apprentice for such time as the board may direct who may have the qualifications therefor, notwithstanding the fact of his failure.
