

# EX-CONGRESSMAN MOODY INDICTED BY GRAND JURY

## Charged With Holding Letter From Person To Whom It Was Addressed

## HE PLEADED NOT GUILTY

### Court Released Him On Own Recognizance

### Claims Charges Were Trumped Up For Political Purposes

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 28.—The Federal grand jury today returned an indictment against ex-Congressman Malcolm A. Moody, charging him with holding a letter from the person to whom it was addressed. Mr. Moody appeared in court this morning and his counsel waived arraignment and entered a plea of not guilty. He asked to have the hearing set for the first day of the trial term. The court placed Mr. Moody on his own recognizance without bail. Mr. Moody asserts the charges were trumped up for political purposes.

The letter in question was addressed to Mrs. Margaret L. Conroy by the controller of currency, containing a receipt for her signature for a claim against the First National Bank of the Dalles, of which Mr. Moody was an officer.

Story by His Friends.

According to the statements of friends of Mr. Moody, who are conversant with the facts in this case, and of his counsel, the incident leading up to the transaction wherein the indictment is based, are as follows:

The transaction on which the charges arise relates to the final payment to depositors of The Dalles National Bank at Dalles City, Or., of which Mr. Moody was an officer. The department at Washington has declared the final dividend and sent letters to the depositors, addressed to them at The Dalles, notifying them that the final dividend had been declared. Numbers of the persons to whom these letters were addressed did not reside at The Dalles, and the postmaster asked Mr. Moody to assist him in finding their addresses.

## OFFER THEIR CO-OPERATION

### Senators Mitchell and Fulton Confer With Hitchcock

### THE LIEU LAND ABUSES

### Largely The Fault of Law Which Protects Land Operators

### PLEDGE THEIR SUPPORT TOWARD AMENDING TIMBER AND STONE ACT AND HOMESTEAD LAWS TO PREVENT FURTHER LAND FRAUDS—THOMSON CASE.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—The secretary of the interior today stated he did not accuse any United States senators of being concerned in the land frauds in the Pacific coast states. Senators Mitchell and Fulton, of Oregon, had a conference with the secretary today relative to the land frauds and assured him of their hearty co-operation in all his efforts toward the discovery and punishment for the irregularities.

They said they had united in recommending Receiver Thomson, of the La Grande office, who had been indicted for bribery, and had done so because of their confidence in him, the man being a farmer and a former member of the Legislature. They said that while they would suspend judgment pending trial, they would do nothing to shield him.

The secretary talked with the senators of the advisability of amending the timber and stone act and the homestead laws to prevent frauds such as those which are being perpetrated, and they assured him of their willingness to do all possible to that end.

The senators agreed with the secretary that there have been some fraudulent practices in the administration of the land laws, but contended that there were no more frauds in Oregon than in other states. They referred to the entry of land in lieu of patented land within the forest reserve and said that while there had undoubtedly been a sharp practice in that commission, the fault largely was due to the law. Senator Mitchell pointed out that a stricter inspection of the area to be enclosed in the intended forest reservation would do much to prevent the frauds complained of.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—United States Senator Mitchell, of Oregon,

whose name has been publicly connected with land scandals in Oregon, California and Washington, says that within a day or so he intends to issue a statement showing the exact status of affairs in these matters. Senator Mitchell's statement will not understate to protect other senators, whose names are being used in connection with the scandals, but he says he is going to make it clear that he has had no connection with irregular land dealings.

There is an erroneous impression, on the Pacific Coast that Binger Hermann was removed as Commissioner of the General Land Office because irregularities had been discovered under his administration. The facts are that Hermann was pushed out because he did not facilitate work in his office, and it was so hopelessly in arrears that nobody could tell whether irregularities were taking place or not.

Secretary Hitchcock today said that the investigation which he had been making into land frauds on the Pacific Coast had been practically completed, and he hoped to be able to present his report on them to the Department of Justice by the close of the present week.

"The report will not at present be made public," he said, "as that would defeat the ends of justice."

He also refused to discuss the contents of the documents, but confirmed the generally current rumor that there have been extensive efforts to defraud the public. He said, however, that had as the condition is, it had been grossly exaggerated.

"It is absurd," he said, "to say that the frauds amount to \$15,000,000 or \$18,000,000, or anything like that sum. A million acres would be a large estimate of fraudulently entered lands, and the government price for land ranges from \$1.25 to \$2.50 per acre."

The secretary also said that while the investigation doubtless would involve some officials of the government, he had not intimated that members of the United States Senate are involved in the scandal.

### DRIVERS DECLARE STRIKE.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 28.—Drivers of all St. Louis express companies, to the number of 400, went on strike today because the demands of the Pacific Express Company's employees for a wage increase of 10 per cent. has not been granted. Policemen were on duty around the express companies' buildings at the Union Station and there was no trouble of any kind, and no express cars were delayed.

The express company officials say they have arranged to fill the strikers' places at once, and prompt delivery of goods is anticipated.

Moody opened the letter which had been addressed to Mrs. Conroy, in her presence, and gave her the receipt which it contained, for her to sign, which she did. She then took the receipt and mailed it herself to the department at Washington, and received the money therefor in due course of time.

As to the charge that Mr. Moody withheld from Mrs. Conroy the letter from the department, his counsel said that he did not do so, but acted in the transaction solely at her own request, and without any interest whatever in the matter. The letter was a printed circular notifying the depositors of the fact that the final dividend was ready to be paid, and contained a receipt for the depositors' signature.

The United States statute under which the indictment is drawn makes it an offense for a person to take a letter from the postoffice or mail carrier, or that has been in the postoffice, with design to obtain the correspondence of the person to whom it is addressed, or to pry into the secrets or business of such person, or to destroy or embezzle such a letter. The indictment charges all the elements recited in the statute.

Mr. Moody's counsel says that the grand jury put an unfavorable construction upon these facts; that it was an entirely innocent transaction on his part, and that the indictment is the result of purely malicious and personal enmity against him, and that Mrs. Conroy is a mere instrument in the hands of others.

Mr. Moody's statement. "It is an outrage. I am shocked and mortified beyond expression that such a charge against me could possibly be made by a grand jury. It is false and malicious, which I will fully show without delay."

"Immediate trial and thorough investigation of every charge that has been made against me is the stand that I have taken. I know that I am innocent, and that this attack upon me is the result of some personal grudge or conspiracy. I can prove my innocence, of course, but I shall not discuss the methods to be employed in my defense, for I owe it to myself and to my friends not to allow my enemies free access to my plans."

"I will make an immediate statement of the exact facts of the case," he said. "My stenographer is at work on this document now, and it will be at once supplied to each of the Portland newspapers and to the Associated Press—not as a sensational news story but as a presentation to the people of Oregon and of the world of the exact truth. I do not believe in slandering the responsibility of the battle. They have attacked me, and I have and propose to exercise the right to defend myself."

## TROUBLE IS NOT YET OVER

### Mrs. McBride No. 2 Makes Another Attempt To Kill Her Husband

### TRIED TO SHOOT HIM IN CHIEF OF POLICE'S OFFICE, BUT IS PREVENTED—COUPLE NOW RECONCILED—BACK TO WIFE NO. 1.

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 28.—The woman known as Mrs. McBride No. 2 attempted to shoot McBride in the office of the chief of police this afternoon, but the prompt action of Detective Welner in disarming the woman prevented a tragedy. The couple later left the station apparently reconciled, but the police fear a tragedy will yet occur.

The woman states her mother was related to Mrs. McKinley, the wife of the ex-President, but offered no proof to support the claim, however. She has confessed to the police she attempted to kill McBride Sunday night.

McBride returned to the apartments of the woman known as wife No. 1 tonight. He would vouchsafe no information regarding the alleged reconciliation affected with wife No. 2 at the office of the chief of police this afternoon.

District Attorney Manning expresses the hope that the marital difficulties of the trio may in some manner be patched up without the law having to take a hand in the matter.

### SAVED BY COSSACKS

### AN ATTEMPT MADE TO ASSASSINATE PRINCE GALITZIN, AT TIFLIS.

TIFLIS, Russia, Trans-Caucasia Oct. 28.—Prince Galitzin, Governor General of the Caucasus, had a narrow escape from assassination today in the outskirts of the town. Three natives stabbed the Governor General thrice. They fled, but were subsequently shot down by Cossacks. Prince Galitzin was driving with his wife when the would-be assassins rushed upon the carriage, daggers in hands. Two seized the Governor General and attempted to drag him from the vehicle, while the third man inflicted two ugly wounds on the Prince's head and a third cut on the hand.

A Cossack who was in attendance

upon the Prince threw himself upon the assailants. While a hand-to-hand fight was in progress the carriage was driven off at a gallop. Ultimately the assailants fled, followed by a mounted guard of Cossacks who had hurried to the scene.

The Cossacks chased the fugitives through the brush, firing constantly with their rifles. They killed one man instantly. The other two were shot down and died soon afterwards.

After his injuries had been dressed Prince Galitzin attended a banquet given by the citizens of Tiflis.

The outrage has produced great indignation, the Governor General having become very popular on account of his interest for the welfare of the people.

## WOULD HAVE BEEN AWFUL

### Northern Pacific Dynamiters Working In Seattle

### AN EXPLOSION AVERTED

### By Workman Finding Materials Concealed In Depot Toilet Room

### TWELVE STICKS OF DYNAMITE HIDDEN AWAY ALL READY FOR USE—WOULD HAVE DESTROYED MANY BLOCKS OF CITY HAD IT GONE OFF.

SEATTLE, Wn., Oct. 28.—Twelve sticks of dynamite in two packages, with split fuses attached ready to light, were found concealed in the toilet room of the interurban depot this afternoon. There was enough explosive to have blown up all the buildings within a radius of two blocks and to damage property for a distance of ten blocks from the depot. One package, containing six sticks, had been placed behind the wash stand bowl. The second package, containing the same amount, was secreted behind a toilet bowl.

The discovery was made by a laborer named Wilson. His eye fell on the package behind the wash stand and the fact that it was concealed struck him as peculiar. He pulled it out and discovered it was dynamite. Detectives are searching for the dynamiters, but have slight hopes of apprehending the criminals. Several arrests have been made the last few weeks, but the suspects usually told a plausible tale and were released.

### PUZZLE FOR SCIENTISTS

### ENGINEERING WORK OF PREHISTORIC TIMES DISCOVERED NEAR SPOKANE.

SPOKANE, Wn., Oct. 28.—A gigantic engineering work of prehistoric times is reported to have been discovered within a few hours' journey of Spokane. The discoverer of this enormous work is a surveyor, William Ashley, Jr., who has been engaged in laying out the boundaries to drainage district No. 1 in Hoodoo Valley, some 30 miles northeast of Rathdrum, Idaho.

Works that may form a link between the present and the unknown past were found in the valley, works that apparently took years to construct and the employment of many hands.

As Ashley was running the line of the drainage district along the edge of a swamp known as Hoodoo Lake, he ran across a mound of peculiar shape that caused him to stop and investigate. The mound was covered by trees two feet through, which may have been hundreds of years old, yet the sides of the mound and its construction seemed too regular to admit of its having resulted from any freak of nature.

A further investigation indicated the artificial construction of the mound. By digging into it broken rocks were found covered with earth. The mound was followed for 6,100 feet. It is stated that it was eight feet at the base four feet high and four feet wide on top.

In two or three places it is missing for a rod or two. In one place it has been cut in recent years, but in another it has the appearance of having been broken and swept away by floods in time long past. Trees over one hundred years old on its top attest in some degree to its antiquity.

Mr. Ashley had heard of the dyke before, but he was inclined to the belief that it was an old moraine of the glacial period, such as are frequently encountered. Upon seeing it, however, his attention was arrested by the singular irregularity of its form, and his investigations convinced him that it was the work of man.

The dyke lies along the edge of a swamp which is known as Hoodoo Lake, the country being thickly covered with timber and underbrush. From the present condition of the earth surface in that section, there is some question for which the dyke was built. Unless there has been some changes in the earth surface the dyke would have been useless for irrigation purposes, but it might have been constructed to keep back the waters of the lake. The theory is that it was not built by Indians, but by some prehistoric race of a more peaceful and progressive type than the red men. But the question is, who were they?

## DIDN'T NEED OUTSIDE HELP

### The St. Louis Bankers Stand Their Depositors Off

### THEY APPLIED THE RULE

### Of Sixty Days' Notice of Intention to Withdraw Money From Bank

### CURRENT BUSINESS TRANSACTIONS AS USUAL AND CROWD GRADUALLY THINNED OUT AND DISPERSED—HELP OFFERED BY OUTSIDE INSTITUTIONS.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 28.—Long before the hour of opening lines of depositors stretched away from the closed doors of the Mississippi Valley Trust Company, the Lincoln Trust Company, the Mercantile Trust Company and the Missouri Trust Company. Small crowds assembled before the doors of other savings institutions nearby. Most of those in the line were working people, many of them women, whose savings were not heavy.

"Owing to the action taken last night by the officials of eight trust companies, doing business in St. Louis, requiring a thirty and sixty days' notice of intention to withdraw the funds, the depositors were not able to get any money. All they could do was to declare their intention of withdrawing their deposits at the end of the time taken advantage of by the companies under their rules. The trust companies also decided not to pay certificates of deposit before maturity."

At the various institutions named the officials stated to the Associated Press that current accounts are being received and paid out as usual. The early crowds which thronged the doors of the bank gradually thinned out, many of the savings depositors taking their blank notices of withdrawal home. The officers of all the trust companies state that voluntary offers of help were received from outside financial institutions, but declined for the reason that they had sufficient cash to handle their business.

### WANTS RENT FROM WIFE

### MAN WELL KNOWN IN EUGENE BRINGS SUIT AGAINST HIS WIFE.

EUGENE, Or., Oct. 28.—H. W. Holden, who built Eugene's first and only street car line, which was torn up a couple of years ago, has commenced suit in the Lane county circuit court against his wife, from whom he has been separated for some time, and his son, Harry M. Holden, to determine the possession of a certain piece of valuable business property which Holden claims to own, and which he alleges his wife and son have been occupying since December, 1899, without paying any rent. The property consists of a two-story store building and a residence.

Holden alleges that his son, while acting as his agent, gave a deed for the property to a certain party, and the next day the property was deeded to the young man, all of which, Holden claims, was done to defraud him out of the property. He also asks judgment for \$2,917.50, alleged to be due him for rent of the premises.

### YOUNG MAN SHOT

### AWFUL HUNTING ACCIDENT ON VANCOUVER ISLAND—GUN PREMATURELY DISCHARGED

CUMBERLAND, Vancouver Island, Oct. 28.—This place is getting a bad reputation for shooting accidents. Two fatalities and two serious injuries were recorded earlier in the month, now is reported the death of Toby, the eldest son of James Stewart, lately of Victoria. The father, the 18-year-old boy and a neighbor named Morgan went out after grouse. About two miles from town their dog raised some birds and the boy who was ahead called the attention of the men to the game.

Morgan somehow discharged his shotgun as he was bringing it to the shoulder and the charge struck young Stewart in the back of the head, tearing the scalp off. The boy fell dead at his father's feet.

### RICH MAN RUNS AMUCK

### OPENS FIRE IN TUSCON, ARIZONA. SALOON WITH SIX SHOOTER.

TUSCON, Ariz., Oct. 28.—Alexander Casey, a wealthy mine owner of Turquoise, Arizona, walked into the Willard hotel, at Tuscon, of which he is owner, and began to shoot in every direction. The guests escaped for the most part through windows. The shooting attracted five officers, who attempted to arrest him. Casey opened fire and seriously wounded Constable Pacheco. The other officers then began to shoot, and Casey was seriously and probably fatally wounded. Casey had been drinking heavily.

### SETTLE VEXED QUESTION

### PROSPECT OF ENDING DISPUTE REGARDING PRIARS' LANDS IS GOOD.

ROME, Oct. 28.—The latest reports received from the Vatican in regard to Archbishop Guidi, the apostolic delegate in the Philippines, contain much more hopeful news regarding the prospect for a definite settlement of the question of the friars' lands in the Philippine Islands, and also in connection with the financial point and on the subject of the friars leaving the archipelago.
