

RUSSIA HAS GROWN BOLD

Threatens to Assume Full Control of Manchuria

AND OF ITS GOVERNMENT

Unless China Yields To Latest Demand Made Upon Her

INSISTS UPON THE DISMISSAL OF TAO TAI YUEN, OF MUKDEN, AND DECAPITATION OF ANOTHER MANDARIN, WHO PUNISHED THE CHINESE BANDITS.

TOKIO, Nov. 4.—Reports from Peking say that Russia now threatens to assume sole charge of the government of Manchuria unless China promptly dismisses Yuen, the Tao Tai, of Mukden, and decapitates another mandarin who recently punished the disorderly Chinese bandits in the Russian employ.

London, Nov. 4.—A special cable says that 10,000 Russian troops have occupied Mukden.

Paris, Nov. 4.—War Minister Andre, as a result of the inquiry which he has made into the Dreyfus affair, has informed the cabinet that in his opinion the sentence of the Rennes court-martial should be revised.

HE HERALDS WAR

FAMOUS CORRESPONDENT, BENNETT BURLEIGH, HEADED FOR THE ORIENT.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 4.—Bennett Burleigh, the famous war correspondent, who has been under fire more times than most army officers, left here on Tuesday on the Empress of Japan for the far East. He goes to represent the London Daily Telegraph, for whom he reported the Boer War and a dozen other campaigns of greater or less moment.

The fact that the Daily Telegraph has sent him out is taken to mean that diplomatic circles at St. James' have given the editors of the big newspaper the tip that war, though delayed, is bound to come. Where Bennett Burleigh is, war is not far off.

Every one on this continent as well as in Europe has read of Burleigh. He has been to the front in every war for the past two decades. Those who know how Rudyard Kipling wrote his "Light That Failed" swear that the big skookum war correspondent, the noblest of them all, is none other than the man who has now gone westward to the far East. He is the doyen of war correspondents.

The veteran Frederick Villiers is also en route to the coast, making for Japan. He first made a name on the London Daily News during the Franco-Prussian War. With these two celebrated war correspondents going to the scene of trouble, it is not improbable that things there are worse than the moderate dispatches of the last few days indicate.

NEBRASKA REPUBLICAN

DEMOCRATS CAPTURE CLERK'S OFFICE IN THE COUNTY OF DOUGLAS.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 4.—Judge Barnes, Republican, is elected Supreme Judge over Judge Sullivan, the present incumbent, by a plurality which may reach 8000. The remainder of the Republican state ticket is elected by 10,000. Barnes running considerably behind the other candidates. These figures are conceded by the Democrats. In Douglas county the Democrats elect the county clerk and probably one other candidate on their ticket, and the Republicans secure the remainder of the offices. On the judicial ticket the Republicans gained a victory, electing at least five or six candidates.

Much excitement was caused this morning in the polling booth of the fourth district of the fifth ward by the election judges forcibly ejecting an officious colored policeman. After the count was completed the judges discovered an error which required revision. The patrolman undertook to force the judges to turn the ballots into the county clerk's office, and his interference was resented.

Judge Barnes' Plurality 12,000.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 4.—The Republican state committee has received enough figures to convince them that Judge Barnes' plurality over Judge Sullivan will be about 12,000, and that Republican candidates for regent will run ahead of Barnes.

HUNTERS' PARADISE

BIG LAKE BELOW TABLE ROCK ALIVE WITH DUCKS AND FISH.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Nov. 4.—The big lake and its surrounding hunting grounds, at the foot of Table Rock, near Tolo, formed by the power dam of the Condon Water & Power Company, is an attraction for a hundred or more visitors nearly every Sunday, and many visitors come every day from all sections of Southern Oregon. At this season the lake is alive with ducks, and in the woods about it quail

are abundant. It is this feature that makes the lake attractive, at least to members of the Gold Ray Rod & Gun Club, as they have the exclusive right to use the grounds for fishing and hunting purposes. The club is now building a large boat house, and will spend several thousand dollars in the way of improvements and conveniences for the lake in the next few months.

ONE SUSPECTED OF MURDER.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 3.—Six Japanese who were brought here on the steamer Tartar from Yokohama, have not been allowed to land. Provincial Immigration Agent Russell has ordered them deported, as they are undesirable. One is supposed to have committed a cold-blooded murder in Japan and the Oriental boats were watched for him.

WERE KILLED BY EXPLOSION

Six Men Lost Their Lives In United States Arsenal

WERE DRAWING CHARGES

From Old Shells From Battleship Massachusetts When It Happened

TEN OTHERS WERE INJURED—ONE GIRL KILLED AND FIFTY-ONE OTHER PEOPLE INJURED IN CABLE CAR COLLISION IN KANSAS CITY.

IONA ISLAND, N. Y., Nov. 4.—Six men were killed and ten injured this afternoon by an explosion in the United States Naval Arsenal. The explosion occurred while the men were drawing explosive charges from old shells sent here from the battleship Massachusetts. Three massive shell houses were totally destroyed. The force of the explosion, or the series of explosions, broke windows at Peekskill, three miles distant.

Adjacent buildings, including two store houses for fixed ammunition, were riddled and the quarters of the marines composing the garrison were completely demolished. The dead were workmen employed by the Naval Ordnance Department.

A Terrible Collision.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 4.—One person was killed and fifty-one injured, two perhaps fatally, in a collision of cable cars in a fog early today on the steep Twelfth street viaduct. Most of the injured were shop girls on the way from their homes in Kansas City, Kansas, to the big department stores on the Missouri side.

The dead girl, Nellie Luscombe, aged 20, a clerk, was killed instantly. A small piece of steel, the size of a lead pencil, was driven into her skull between the eyes and the left side of her head crushed. She was so badly disfigured that it was several hours before she was identified.

Of the injured, Carrie Mooney, a dry goods clerk, suffered both legs broken, and Herman Watkins, a clerk in the Methodist Book Concern, whose jaw was broken, and otherwise hurt, will die, it is believed.

Seventeen others were more or less seriously hurt, five of them sustaining broken bones. The other thirty-four injured sustained minor cuts and bruises. All the injured lived in Kansas City, Kansas, or its suburbs. Several of them were children going to school.

MOURNERS SURPRISED

SUPPOSED DEAD MAN WALKS IN DURING PROGRESS OF WAKE.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—While a wake was in progress during the night in a West Fifty-fifth street boarding house over the supposed remains of John Siebert, who was believed to have been drowned, the mourners were thrown into a panic by the sudden entrance of what they took for the ghost of their friend. Some of the women fainted and there was the wildest excitement until the supposed apparition convinced the mourners that he was Siebert in the flesh. A call was then sent to the morgue for the removal of the body and the wake became a rave. The corpse bore a striking resemblance to Siebert.

A WILD GOOSE CHASE

ALBANY MAN CAPTURES A BEWILDERED BIRD IN HIS BACK YARD.

ALBANY, Or., Nov. 4.—A large wild goose was captured in Albany yesterday, within two blocks of the business section of the city. The goose had been wounded in the wing and flew through the northwestern part of town apparently aimlessly until it struck a clothesline in the yard of A. Austin, at the corner of Third and Washington streets, and fell to the ground.

Mr. Austin attempted to pick it up, but it flew across the street, striking against a residence and again falling to the ground. This time it was unable to rise and Mr. Austin captured it.

PANAMA NOW IS A REPUBLIC

Revolution Has Broken And Revolutionists in Control

GOVERNOR IS ARRESTED

And Government Favorable To Canal Construction is in Power

GOVERNMENT TROOPS DISSATISFIED AND THREATEN TROUBLE—WARSHIP BOGOTA SHELLED PANAMA AND KILLED CHINAMAN.

PANAMA, Nov. 4.—The threatened revolution which has been fermenting since the rejection of the Hay-Herran Canal treaty broke last night and the revolutionists are in possession of the city. Governor Obaldia and all the authorities under the old regime have been arrested by Dr. Emmanuel Amador and other revolutionary leaders.

The flag of the Republic of Panama was formally hoisted and the government favorable to the construction of the canal by the United States is in power, but its progress, at first, will not be smooth, as many friends of the old government express a determination to fight for the former leaders.

The troops are dissatisfied and threaten trouble, and will not acknowledge one government or the other, though tonight perfect order prevails in Panama. What another day brings forth is problematical.

The Colombian government warship Bogota shelled the city this morning, doing considerable damage, and killing one Chinaman. The presence of the United States gunboat Nashville it is believed has resulted in the avoidance of serious trouble. Marines were landed and the action of the American commander had summary effect. Tonight Colonel Torres guaranteed to maintain order if the Nashville marines were withdrawn, and later, the American blue jackets were withdrawn.

During the excitement this afternoon the blue jackets from the Nashville quickly placed bales of cotton on the tops of freight cars, forming excellent barricades. Several American and other foreigners took refuge on board the German steamer Markomannia. The opinion of everybody here is that the Isthmian Canal is now assured.

Communication Disturbed.

Washington, Nov. 4.—During the day a telegram was received at the State Department from the New York management of the Panama Railroad Company, stating that the property of that company was in danger, and asking for protection. In addition, a message came from the cable company saying in effect, that there was no telegraphic communication for points in Colombia outside of Panama and Colon by way of the Isthmus.

It is assumed that the revolutionists have cut the inland communications to prevent the government at Bogota from obtaining knowledge as to what is happening on the Isthmus, and it is expected that the effect will be to embarrass the Colombian government in its military movements.

In case of emergency 800 or more marines could be spared for service on the Isthmus, and should a greater emergency arise arrangements would be completed making a much larger force available for duty in Panama.

On the Pacific coast the marine force has been reduced to a small number. The Colombian warship Bogota was bought by Dr. Herran in Seattle more than a year ago and with an American officer in command was armed, equipped and sent down to Isthmian waters for use on the Pacific side. It is now commanded by a Colombian.

They Ask Recognition.

Washington, Nov. 4.—The State Department today received a request from representatives of the revolutionary government at Panama that the United States recognize the new state of Panama, pending official advice from the United States consular officials at Panama that a new government had been established and is a de facto government. The State Department declined to commit itself.

However, attention is called to the fact that it is the invariable policy of the United States to deal with a de facto government in any country. This statement is taken as a favorable recognition should the new Panama government have an active existence.

Made No Efforts.

Colon, Nov. 4.—A dispatch from Bogota, dated November 2, says that Congress has closed without initiating legislation on the canal project.

Will Try to Hold Line.

Kinston, Jamaica, Nov. 4.—The American cruiser Atlanta is coaling to sail for the Isthmus tomorrow. Private advices indicate that the government of Colombia will make extraordinary efforts to retain hold of the line of the proposed canal.

Trouble Looked For.

Washington, Nov. 4.—The greatest activity prevails at the State and Navy Departments and it is evident the Navy is preparing for a large squadron in the Isthmian waters than for years. "You will protect the

American interests and do everything possible to avoid bloodshed." The dispatch cabled the naval commander, forecasts more active intervention by the United States Government in the trouble on the Isthmus than ever displayed before.

Must Keep up Traffic. Colon, Nov. 4.—The commander of the Nashville has notified the superintendent that railroad traffic must not be interrupted, forbidding him to proceed to Panama, will sail tomorrow morning.

Nero Sails Today.

San Diego, Cal., Nov. 2.—The United States collier Nero, under orders to proceed to Panama, will sail tomorrow morning.

MARK HANNA IS TO BLAME

For Great Republican Victory in State of Ohio

MADE PEOPLE BELIEVE

That His Election Was Their Only Salvation—According To Johnson

CLOSING OF MILLS, FAILURES OF BANKS, ETC., GAVE HANNA'S STATEMENTS COLOR—JOHNSON WISHES REPUBLICAN PARTY SUCCESS.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 4.—Johnson, the defeated candidate for Governor, tonight said:

"The result in Ohio is due to several causes, of which the chief was the successful attempt of Senator Hanna to impress upon the people of this state that the continuance of disturbed business conditions demanded his return to the Senate.

"In the last few days of the campaign, the closing of the mills, the discharge of thousands of workmen, together with the bank and business failures throughout the country, gave color to Senator Hanna's claim that the election in Ohio involved national issues of greater importance than the betterment of our local conditions.

"I hope that Senator Hanna's statement that his re-election will preserve the industrial and business situation from disturbance be verified, and that the confidence which he believes will be the basis of prosperity, will be preserved."

Were Badly Scared.

Columbus, O., Nov. 4.—The Republican plurality in Ohio is about 115,000 for Governor, and the majority in the Legislature on the joint ballot for Senator is 93. In a total vote of less than 900,000, Herrick's pluralities in the counties aggregate 135,132, and Johnson's 20,478, so that Herrick has a net plurality in the state of 114,706 on estimates that may be increased from one to two thousand by the official count.

The Senate stands: 29 Republicans; 4 Democrats. Majority, 25. The House stands: 89 Republicans and 21 Democrats. Majority, 68. Secretary Richardson, of the Democratic state committee said that the result was due to the fear of a single tax and a two-cent fare.

PLAN WAS WELL LAID

VIGILANCE OF GUARD FRUSTRATES WHOLESALE DELIVERY AT FOLSOM PRISON.

FOLSOM, Cal., Nov. 4.—By the vigilance of a guard, some well laid plans that would probably have resulted in a prison delivery equal to that of last July were frustrated yesterday afternoon. Ever since that outbreak the officials have been on their guard, while the desperate convicts have been planning to outwit them, having been encouraged by the fact that nine out of the fourteen felons gained their freedom. Caches of knives and clothing have often been unearthed by the officials, but it has been impossible to prevent the introduction of them into the place.

Lately it has been suspected from the actions of the desperate men employed at the rock crusher that some deep plotting was being done. Monday afternoon Guard Woods saw from his post about 150 yards distant the flash of something bright in the hands of a convict. He took it to be a knife, and telephoned Captain Murphy his suspicions. The captain immediately commenced an investigation. Work on the crusher was suspended, and every convict was searched. Nine knives were found, and as many convicts were thrown into the dungeon. It developed that the plan was to make a rush and overpower Edward O'Brien and Michael Halloran, the two free men in charge of the train used for freighting between the prison and Folsom, jump into the engine and rush out of the grounds to liberty.

There is some difference of opinion as to the feasibility of the plan, but it is almost certain that some of the participants would have been placed on the train, and it would have been necessary to pass four rifle guards.

HAS DENIED THE RUMORS

Senator Hanna Says He Is Not a Candidate For The Presidency

HIS SWEEPING VICTORY IN OHIO DID NOT SWELL HIS HEAD TO THAT EXTENT—THE REPUBLICANS OF IOWA WON OUT EASILY.

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 4.—Senator Hanna, referring to the renewed suggestions made from various quarters to the effect that he is the logical Republican candidate for the Presidency next year made this statement tonight:

"The result of the election in Ohio yesterday in no wise changes my views in reference to my proposed candidacy for the Presidency, of which position the public has been fully advised."

Lost Two; Gained Six.

Des Moines, Ia., Nov. 4.—Official estimates place Governor Cummins' plurality over J. B. Sullivan, the Democratic candidate for Governor, at 37,000. The Democrats will have twenty-three of the 100 members of the next House, a gain of six, and eight of the fifty members of the Senate, a loss of two.

A NEW CANADA

MAP WILL BE ROLLED BACK 500 MILES BY NEW RAILROAD.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 4.—"It will roll back the map of Canada another 500 miles," is the way R. G. Macpherson, member of the Federal Parliament of this district, speaks of the new Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. "There will be a new Canada, as great as the Dominion we now know, opened up. So far but a mere fringe of our territories have been developed. This area will be more than doubled when the new trans-continental line is built. Vancouver, indeed, the whole of British Columbia, will find that line of great benefit."

Within the next few days the Grand Trunk Pacific Company has got to put up bonds to the extent of \$5,000,000 to insure the immediate construction of the line. Surveyors are now on the coast as well as north of Winnipeg, and in several eastern sections. It is part of the contract that construction is to be commenced simultaneously at the Pacific and eastern ends.

BABY SCALDED TO DEATH

CONTENTS OF WASH BOILER TURNED OVER ON CHILD BY MOTHER.

NEWBERG, Or., Nov. 4.—The child of Mr. and Mrs. George Baird died yesterday as the result of a frightful accident. Mrs. Baird was doing the washing, and had a boiler of water on the stove.
