

WILL THERE BE ANOTHER LOOP

Rumors of Street Railway Extension in the Southern Suburbs

A LINE TO TAKE IN MORNING SIDE ADDITION AND SMITH'S FRUIT FARM TRACTS IS NOW AMONG THE POSSIBILITIES.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

The extension of the Salem, Falls City & Western railroad from Dallas to Salem will probably not be the only work of that kind that will redound to the benefit of the Capital City next year.

It is a fact generally understood that the Citizens Light and Traction Company, owning the electric lighting and gas plants and the street railway lines of this city, will next year continue the work of putting the traction lines in first class condition, including a loop to the State Fair Grounds.

And in this work there may be included another loop, to extend out through Morning Side addition and on through the Smith's Fruit Farms Tracts and around by the Catholic cemetery, to connect with the line already built to the L. O. O. F. cemetery. This would take in a lot of new territory, without a great deal of cost, and it would be getting out pretty well, which would give a lot of business to a traction line, both passenger and freight.

It is known that Mr. Springer, the manager of the Citizens Light and Traction Company, was lately asked concerning occupying the right of way of the former Morning Side extension for a wagon road, and that he replied that he did not want this done, for the reason that his company would need it for a car line. The track for a mile, more or less, extending into Morning Side addition, was torn up a year or more ago, before the property passed into the hands of the present owners.

A loop out that way would bring a large amount of new territory within the reach of the center of population, and the extension once constructed would be economical of operation, so that it would soon become a paying investment, if indeed it did not prove so from the first. In no other direction from the city are there so many small, thrifty holders of small tracts, devoted to fruit raising, etc.

It will be a fortunate thing for Salem when the commencement is made of getting traction lines out into the rich adjoining territory, and, once begun, there will be no stopping until Salem is the center of a complete system of lines, radiating in every direction.

SEARCHED HER FOR MONEY

POLICEMAN OF GRANT'S PASS FURNISHES FOOD FOR DISCUSSION IN COUNCIL

GRANT'S PASS, Or., Nov. 10.—The Grant's Pass city council is amusing itself at the present time over the question of whether or not the star of Police Officer Lockhard shall be removed. It is argued by some of the council that Lockhard overstepped his authority when a short time ago he searched a young lady for alleged stolen money, and furthermore did not call a matron to assist him in the task, but compel the girl to remove her clothing in his presence, for which act he has been obliged to become the defendant in a \$10,000 damage suit. The case will be tried in the next term of Josephine circuit court.

Some of the council feel that Lockhard should be suspended till the matter can be investigated, and if the investigating committee feels that the officer is being falsely accused or did not overstep his duties as an officer of the law, then reinstate him without any regard to the trial. The few of the council that take this view of the affair are outnumbered by those who favor the marshal's star remaining on Mr. Lockhard's lapel, and awaiting the action of the court before the council makes any move in the matter.

In the meantime Officer Lockhard is pining his heart.

GIRL TAKES HER LIFE

DECLARED IN A NOTE THAT SHE WAS MISTREATED BY HER AUNT.

BUTTE, Nov. 10.—Because her aunt threatened to send her to the reform school, Miss Blanche Shelton, not yet 16 years old, and acknowledged the most beautiful girl in Walkerville, one of Butte's largest suburbs, drank about a quart of a teaspoon of carbolic acid. Her body was found in her room, doubled up between a dresser and window, as though the girl had died in great agony. Her lips, neck and hands were frightfully scarred by

the acid. Beside an empty acid bottle a note was found, saying: "Dear Sister: I am good where you will get in no more fights over me. Kiss me. I shall be with mamma up in heaven. I gave myself to God. Don't cry for me. I am better off dead than alive. I am called all kinds of names."

Miss Shelton was an orphan and had been adopted by Mrs. Dennis Regan, her aunt.

ONE BOY KILLS ANOTHER.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 10.—Another of those "did not know it was loaded" fatalities is reported from Vancouver Island, which has an unenviable record of at least a dozen killings this shooting season. This time the victim was 6-year-old Percy Smith, of Ladymith. He was accidentally shot and killed by his playmate, Rennie Bernard, aged 10. Young Bernard was proudly exhibiting a 22-caliber rifle to his companion, and in doing so discharged the weapon. Percy Smith happened to be right in front, and got the contents of the discharge. The ball penetrated the eye and lodged in the brain, death being instantaneous.

HIS MISSION IS HOPELESS

General Reyes is En Route To Colon With Proposals For Peace

PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENT OF PANAMA ASSURED THAT CANAL BILL WOULD PASS NEXT CONGRESS, BUT THE PROPOSALS WERE REJECTED.

COLON, Nov. 10.—The steam launch sent to Bocas Del Toro Thursday last to capture the place in the name of the new Republic of Panama, has returned here and the officers report the place captured and the flag hoisted without a shot being fired.

The provisional government of Panama has received a telegram from President Marroquin of the Republic of Colombia, giving assurance that the Panama Canal bill would most certainly pass Congress next August, and that General Reyes was on his way to the isthmus to make proposals looking to peace and the saving of the national honor. The provisional government has sent a letter to General Reyes advising him that his mission is a hopeless one.

Paris, Nov. 10.—A dispatch received here from Cape Haytien says that after three days' fighting, President Wos-Y-Gill took refuge in the German Consulate at Santo Domingo. The revolution is considered at an end.

Cape Haytien, Nov. 10.—A dispatch from Monte Cristo says that is reported here that San Domingo has capitulated to the revolutionists and that General Jimenez has been proclaimed president of the republic.

Communication Better.

Washington, Nov. 10.—The State Department, tonight, received a cablegram from Minister Powell at San Domingo dated 4 p. m. today, reporting the situation at San Domingo to be extremely serious. The dispatch, it was stated, was the first which the department had received on the day since the disturbance began.

BROUGHT OUT A DISCUSSION RECORD IS IN DANGER

But Endorsement of Repeal Commutation Clause of Act Carried

COMMITTEE REPORT FAVORING REPEAL OF TIMBER, STONE AND DESERT LAND ACTS ALSO ADOPTED—PORTLAND ENDORSED FOR NATIONAL CONVENTION IN 1935.

PENDLETON, Nov. 10.—The morning session of the irrigation convention was taken up with the addresses of Professor A. B. Leckenby on "Leaching Agricultural Lands," and "Irrigation West of the Cascades," by Dr. James Withycombe, and one by O. K. Goodman on "Free-water on Irrigation in the Milton and Freewater Districts," the last paper bringing out considerable discussion.

The resolution committee made a report favoring the Lewis and Clark Exposition and endorsing the move to repeal the Timber and Stone Act, Desert Land Act, and the commutation clause of the homestead laws. The afternoon session opened with a heated discussion on the latter portion of the committee's report, and it was finally adopted although the opposition continued to the end.

The association then elected the following officers: President, H. Dwyer, Portland; first vice president, Will R. King, of Ontario; second vice president, A. C. Carbine, of Union; treasurer, T. W. Wright, of Union; secretary, E. P. Dodd, of Pendleton; assistant secretary, C. C. Hunt, of Ontario.

After endorsing Portland as the meeting place for the national convention in 1935, the association adjourned late this afternoon to meet at Ontario next year.

LOOK OUT FOR CHICKENS

Z. TAYLOR SMITH'S HEN HOUSE RELIEVED OF A VALUABLE DOZEN.

As Thanksgiving and the holiday season approaches it seems that the people will do well, who are so blessed, in putting their chickens and other barn yard fowls securely under lock and key for they will be in great demand hereafter and are liable to "come up missing" most any fine morning.

Probably the first to suffer from this experience so far this season, is Mr. Z. Taylor Smith, who resides on East State street, and who had the misfortune, on Monday night last, of losing a full dozen of his best fowls, full-blooded Brown Leghorn chickens, which some unscrupulous thief had stolen after breaking into the hen house.

The chickens were of the finest of their variety, and were highly prized by Mr. Smith, who had refused some very flattering offers for them of late. He has not the slightest suspicion of who the thieves might be, but the matter has been reported to the police and the case has been placed in their hands.

On Sunday last, a neighbor of Mr. Smith took a fancy to the fine fowls, and made Mr. Smith an offer of \$5 for the lot of a dozen, but this offer the latter politely rejected. Of course, Mr. Smith does not entertain any suspicion whatever of his neighbor, for whom he entertains naught but the highest respect.

The Take of Salmon Eggs Is Greater This Year Than Ever Before

MASTER FISH WARDEN VAN DUSEN MAKES MONTHLY REPORT UPON THE CONDITIONS AND PROGRESS IN FISH HATCHERIES OF THE STATE.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Fish Commissioners, which was held at the State House at 8 o'clock Wednesday evening, on account of the Governor just returning from a week's absence from the city, Master Fish Warden H. G. Van Dusen made his report for the month of October.

The report showed that receipts of the office for the month, on account of licenses, etc., amounted in the aggregate to \$677.50, while the expenditures for the same period amounted to \$321.46. In discussing this season's hatchery work, Mr. Van Dusen said:

"The hatchery work on the streams tributary to the Columbia river is well advanced and from reports so far received the season is going to be a very successful one and the take of eggs will exceed anything heretofore done by our department."

"At the Salmon river and Clackamas river hatcheries the work of collecting eggs was finished some time ago, as previously reported, and they have now begun to liberate the young fry, which were hatched and carefully reared until they reached such a stage that they had either to be fed or liberated, and as we were not prepared to feed them, nothing was left to do but to turn the young fry loose. At the Salmon river hatchery 1,498,000 were turned out during the month into the Salmon river in the immediate vicinity of the hatchery, the first plant having been made October 2, and at the Clackamas river station 796,000 were turned loose in the Clackamas river."

"At the Wallawa river station the take of Chinook eggs amounted to 3,707,000. This will be the extent of the Chinook work in that stream this season, but with the sockeye salmon, on which they have just begun work, somewhere between five and ten million eggs will be taken."

"At Ontario 13,675,000 eggs had been secured up to October 31. The first were taken October 14. On October 31 the day's work showed 1,800,000 to have been secured, while for the eight preceding days they had been averaging over a million a day; as everything seemed to favor the continuance of the work at this rate for ten or fifteen days longer the complete take will amount to between twenty and thirty millions."

"On the Willamette river they got started well and had a prospect for a good season's work, but the freshet that occurred October 4 and 5 was too severe for the racks and carried about two-thirds of them away. The eggs secured up to that time amounted to \$29,500; these we will take good care of and hatch out and keep the young fry until they are old enough to care for themselves, when they will be turned into the Willamette river."

"On the Siuslaw the outlook is very good this season and if Superintendent Simmons is able to maintain his racks through the freshets that are now liable to occur, he will make a very fair showing, for up to October 31 he reports having taken 707,950 Chinook eggs, with plenty of salmon in the racks."

"At the South Coast river hatchery they had taken 3,080,000 Chinook eggs October 31, and from the number remaining on hand between racks, Superintendent Smith seemed to think that he could safely count on getting 5,990,000 this season, which is far better than anything heretofore done."

WILL SETTLE IN SALEM

CAR SERVICE NOT THE BEST

Salem Shippers Have Been Especially Favored in Car Supply

CARS WILL SOON BE AVAILABLE FOR MOVING FREIGHT FROM INTERIOR POINTS TO SALEM—PORTLAND MILL MEN TO SUE THE COMPANY.

The car famine on the Southern Pacific Company's lines, is attracting the attention of the entire state, and appearances indicate that in the near future, some relief is going to be granted by the company, which will in a measure relieve the persecuted shippers.

Salem shippers have probably been the most favored of those of any section in Oregon, or possibly in California. Several of the heaviest shippers in Salem were questioned yesterday upon the car situation, and not one was found who would admit having had any difficulty in getting cars. Some who stated earlier in the season that the shortage of cars was injuring their business, now declare that they have all the cars they want, and have no complaints to make. Just why this condition exists when other cities are setting up such a wail, is hard to understand, except that the local freight agent, R. B. Houston, has loyally championed the cause of the Salem shippers, and Salem being a central point where all of the local freight trains of the valley stop, many floating cars find their way to the switching yards, and are immediately made use of for the benefit of the company's patrons.

No Freight Being Received.

While the above satisfactory condition exists in regard to freight shipments, especially of the through freight, local firms are experiencing some of the troubles of other Oregon towns in receiving freight from interior points. This is particularly the case on wood and grain. Large quantities of both wheat and oats annually find their way to this market, but this year the business has been at a standstill. One local firm now has 47,000 bushels of wheat bought and paid for, none of which can be received because cars cannot be secured for this purpose.

The Booth-Kelly Lumber Company, of Eugene, which has a contract to deliver 1,000 cords of slab wood to the State Asylum, has so far been unable to make deliveries on account of a lack of cars. Many other lines of business have been affected in this city in this manner, but the conditions are far better than though no freight could be shipped out.

The immense prune business has been going on without a pause for the past two months, and the prune dealers claim that in the neighborhood of 160 cars of packed prunes have actually been shipped east from Salem in that time.

There has also been heavy shipments of hops, no trouble being experienced in securing cars when the goods were ready to go forward. The company has already carried out of Oregon slightly over 30,000 bales of the new crop of hops.

The Salem Flouring Mills Company has, since the beginning of harvest, been operating the immense mill almost continually, and about 50,000 bushels of wheat has been ground into flour, and most of it shipped out through freight to China and Japan. For this immense business, cars have been forthcoming as fast as asked for, at the rate of one or two daily, making a total of about sixty-five cars used.

Relief Expected Soon.

A prominent official of the Southern Pacific Company was in the city yesterday, and was questioned upon the difficulty experienced by the company in handling the freight business of the valley, he said he did not think the trouble was as bad as represented by some parties, and that in California shippers were having more trouble than in Oregon, both on the Southern Pacific and the Santa Fe, and several other systems were also embarrassed by the avalanche of business. He thought Salem people would be able to get plenty of cars soon to haul freight from interior points, as the prune and hop shipments were becoming easier, and consequently many cars now in use in that business would be turned loose. He said Manager Koehler was preparing a statement of the situation, and would shortly explain the position of the company on this subject.

Company Being Sued.

In Portland the mill men have begun a movement to enter suit against the company for damages, and to compel them to furnish cars. The Chamber of Commerce has prepared a lengthy document, setting forth in strong language the unfortunate state of affairs, and the resulting damage to the state, and this is to be forwarded to J. C. Stubbs, traffic director of the Harriman system. It covers the history of the service for the past four years, and asks move him to take action for relieving the situation.
